Pat Whipple, CSNS president, announced yesterday that she had selected Mr. Donald J. Caldwell to fill the vacancy of the student body vice president.

James Bilbray, the elected president of CSNS, announced to the executive committee on Feb. 23, that due to his health, he would be forced to resign his presidential office.

In so doing, Miss Pat Whipple has been moved to the position of president of the CSNS, leaving a vacancy in the vice presidency.

The office of CSNS President was vacated early last week by James Bilbray in an unexpected move that left a stunned student body. The duties of CSNS President were immediately assumed by CSNS Vice President Pat Whipple.

Mr. Bilbray resigned from the office of President and withdrew from Nevada Southern on the advice of his physician following the results of a medical examination which indicated that Mr. Bilbray had developed a blood infection. A period of rest will be necessary in the treatment of the illness and for this reason Mr. Bilbray decided that it was advisable to resign his office and to with.

resign his office and to withdraw from school. The illness is not believed to be serious,

The resignation of Mr. Bilbray brought to a close an administra-tion that had been one of the most active in the history of this school. Under Mr. Bilbray sev-eral projects were brought to successful conclusions. The purchase of Nevada Southern class rings was negotiated during the Bilbray administration, as well as the purchase of NSU sweatshirts, sweaters, and other student items. The formation of
many school organizations took
place during the Bilbray regime
such as the Intercollegiate
Knights (Red Eagle Chapter).
Mr. Bilbray was a charter member of this organization.

Napoleonic Book Collection Added To NSU Library

The Napoleonic collection of books, which has recently been made available for use in Ne-

books, which has recently been made available for use in Nevada Southern's library, is one of the finest of its kind, according to Miss Billie Mae Polson, catalog librarian. Miss Polson, who had the tremendous task of preparig the books for use, said that the collection includes over 560 volumes, as well as 50 or, 60 lithographs, paintins and busts. The materials depict every phase of the Revolutionary and Napoleonic periods, beginning with the National Assembly of 1789 and ending with the death of Napoeon III late in the 19th century. This entire period of history is covered, gving the background of the revolution, the execution of the king and queen (Louis XVI and Marie Antolnette), the French invasion of Russia, the decline, downfall and death of Napoleon I.

There are literary classics of the era, as well as histories, biographies and novels. The lithographs and paintings show the emperor and his family, war scenes, and scenes showing something of the cultural life during the Napoleonic era. There are busts of Josephine and Napoleon and others of his family, and these are on display in the main reading room of the library.

"I wore out a pair of breeches playing 'Mr. Hardcastle.' I've had that role 40 times."

"Mr. Hardcastle" is a character lead in "SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER," currently entertaining NSU audiences, and the man who made that opening statement is director of "SHE STOOPS ...", Dr. Lauren L. Brink.

Two walls of Dr. Brink's office contain shelves of books which served as Nevada Southern's library back in 1955. The wall over his desk contains an Oriental print on an unrolled scroll. The fourth wall guards a tape recorded and harbors a door. In this room he carries on much of his business as an educator and a dramatist-two real-life roles which keeps him one of the busiest men on campus, and a legend in his own right.

The term "legend" is a good descriptive to use for Dr. Brink, for it's in keeping with one of the important elements in his life:

Lauren L. Brink had his first theatre experiences in high school and church. Later, at the University of Minnesota, he had over 30 roles ranging from Demetrius of "A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM" to Mr. Hardcastle.

In preparation for his transfer from Reno to Las Vegas and the beginning of his classes that Monday morning in 1955, he had to collect all his belongings and settle some business. This meant leaving Saturday and going first to Los Angeles, then up to San Francisco, across to Reno, finally down to Las Vegas.

It was typical hot-dry desert weather when he began unloading his gear from his station wagon to the dressing room which was to serve as his classroom. After his first trip upstairs he found it necessary to remove his coat, his second trip landed his tie, and the fourth brought off his shirt. This kind of heat was something new to him.

At that time the small staff taught almost around the clock, Dr. Brink teaching as many courses in education as he did in Speech and English.

Although he began as a Physical Education Major at the University of Minnesota, Prof. Brink graduated from that University with a BS in English and Social Studies. An MA in Spech and English, and a Ph. D. in Speech and Education—almost taking a degree in music too.

One of his first jobs out of college was a Technical Supervisor for the Plymouth Drama Festival, which is to theatre-goers as

Newport is to jazz lovers.

Later, he returned to Minnesota to teach in the high schools for two years, and at the university for five years—centering his activities around Speech, Education, and the University Theatre.

While there he was a founding director of The Minneapolis Theatre Guild and the Lake Playhouse. Using his musical training, he also directed the St. Paul Civic Opera.

After Minesota came six years of teaching at the San Francisco State College. Four of these years were invested exclusively in teacher-education in the language arts, and after this came Reno, and Las Vegas.

Having designed over 40 productions (and directed them), Dr. Brink believes firmly that "a director must design in order to keep every element of a production properly balanced." His training in exterior and interior design helps him to do this.

Because of a lack of professional attitude on the part of the students at that time, the first Nevada Southern production "UNDER THE GASLIGHT" never came off. Now, Dr. Brink can't help but feel "a deep gratitude for all the hard work the students of Nevada Southern University have put into this production."

"SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER" is really a major production and, as Dr. Brink put it, "H all goes well, it should be a good evening of theatre."
