PROCLAMATION:

WHEREAS, a branch of the University of Nevada known as Nevada Southern was established in Las Vegas in 1952 by the Board of Regents, and

WHEREAS, the Las Vegas School District made available rooms at the Las Vegas High School for use as the first classrooms for Nevada Southern, and

WHEREAS, the Nevada Southern Campus Fund Committee raised a substantial sum of money to purchase the first portion of land to be used as a permanent campus site, and

WHEREAS, the Nevada State Legislature appropriated the monies for the construction of the first classroom building, and

WHEREAS, the Las Vegas Service League has contributed considerable sums of money each year for several years to assist Nevada Southern, and

WHEREAS, the students of Nevada Southern wish to honor the many citizens, organizations, and public officials who have given their time and money toward the building of Nevada Southern University with appropriate ceremonies this Saturday,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, C. D. BAKER, Mayor of the City of Las Vegas, do hereby proclaim Saturday, November 16, 1957, to be NEVADA SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY DAY and urge all citizens to participate in the various activities planned by the students of Nevada Southern to celebrate this first day of recognition.

A few years have passed since this proclamation was set forth, but our purpose has not changed. This year, due to the natural rotation of the calendar, University Day will be celebrated on November 19, 1960.

University Day is a day filled with fun for all. The festivities will consist of booths entered by the various organizations on campus. In addition to the booths there will be many events for all to enter. If you are athletically inclined you might want to enter the cross-country race, the three-legged race, or sack race.

If you enjoy over-eating you will want to enter the pie-eating contest. There will be events for matching other outstanding skills that you might possess: bridge, ping-pong, volley ball, and dance competition.

Participants in the cross-country, three-legged race, sack race, pie-eating contest and such events will enter as members of a class or organizational team. The team scoring the highest total number of points will win the University Day trophy.

The tug of war will be between the freshmen and upper class teams. There will be a separate contest for men and women in this event.

IKs have plans for a bridge tournament. All faculty members and interested students are urged to register for the tournament by contacting any member or page of the fraternity. Pre-registration is to enable the IKs to plan details for the tournament.

IKs will be in charge of the Hobo Dance, which will begin at 8:00. Sloppy dress is a must.

During the day, the IKs will have balloons for sale, to add to the color of the day.

Biology Club is planning to have two booths, one of which will be an egg-throwing booth. This booth is designed to allow the students taking biology courses to get back at their

professors. The other booth is designed to allow students to release their inner tensions. It will consist of a car and a sledge hammer; for a small fee you will be able to do what your heart desires to the poor defenseless car.

The Epilogue staff will have old yearbooks on sale for those interested in getting back copies.

The Freshman Class is planning to conduct a slave sale before the cross-country race. If you purchase a slave and enter him or her in the events of the day, the points they win will go to your class or organization.



Should We Change Student Body Name?

LET'S NOT BE REBELS ANYMORE!

The idea of a new school name sounds terrific! Do we really think of ourselves as Rebels? The word connotes antagonism.

For centuries now this word has referred to rebellion against something or someone. It means to make war, to resist authority by force, or to renounce a way of life. Do we want to do these things?

In a land where democracy is the basic idea for our form of government, isn't this a little silly? Not only that, recently the word rebel has become synonymous with the Cuban uprising and Castro. I think Nevada Southern deserves more dignity than having this weird affiliation.

The fact that the name "Rebels" was picked because this school was established as a branch of the University of Nevada at Reno meant that we became a sort of extra thumb. At the time, the name served its purpose, for we actually had to fight and hope for everything this school was to get in order to exist and expand.

But this is not true anymore. We now have our own appropriations set up by the Legislature. We have our local assemblymen who have pledged themselves to fight for our existence and expansion in the Nevada Legislature. All we have to do is pick the best men to fight for us. So why fight when someone else can do it?

The campuses of Nevada Southern and Reno should not compete from the basis of who is north or south of Carson City. We should compete solely on a scholastic and intercollegiate basis.

Better education and better citizens should be the most important goal of our school. Our instructors have worked and are working diligently to perform this task. Our cooperation and maintenance of high scholastic averages should complete the picture.

I also feel that by assuming the name of "Rebels" we are only associating ourselves with the past; namely, the Civil War. The mere fact that Beauregarde is our school mascot is evidence enough. Although he looks like a fox to us, he was actually a famous general who fought in the Civil War on the side of the South.

The Civil War is over. The North won, and the Union is again established. It seems a bit unpatriotic to me for an institution of higher learning to associate itself with a bloody historical issue which should well-enough be a dead one. Perhaps we could start a new trend!

We have all heard of Dixie College in Utah, one of our neighboring colleges. They also call themselves "Rebels." This is confusing! More and more we are going to be deeply involved in intercollegiate sports and activities. How are we going to know who is rooting for whom if we play Dixie College? Perhaps we will get a few laughs, though, especially when our Pep Team gets us up to a really good rousing cheer in the midst of an intercollegiate crisis, and we shout with gusto: "On, Beauregarde, On!" Not very euphonious, is it?

So this brings me back to what I started to say in the beginning. It is simply that I think we should change our school name, symbols and mascot. What other college in the entire United States is situated in such a romantic, desert location? We have a host of ideas for a new school name right outside our classroom doors.

Our resort atmosphere and skyline, our miles of desert valley fringed by ever-changing mountain silhouettes, our desert animals and, most important of all, our new university so close to the great government project set up by the Atomic Energy Commission where the quest for space frontiers is constantly sought, should offer each and every one of you a number of ideas for a new school name.

Now, it is up to us, the Student Body, to decide whether we are going to move ahead and give our Nevada Southern a place in the sun, or remain forever in the background by clinging to our dear, dead Beauregarde!

Let's bury him once and for all!

WILL THIS CHANGE HELP US?

There has been a recent movement on the campus to change the name of the student body from Rebels to something else. Should the name be changed?

Some of the reasons given for this move are: Certain people in our community and state feel the name is an attempt at association with the old South and the Civil War, of which we were no part; the name Rebels denotes a rebellious attitude which is directed at the Reno campus and student body, or at least might be construed as such; Dixie College in St. George, Utah, is only 140 miles away and it also uses the name Rebels.

Although most of their reasons seem rather vague they are probably not without foundation.

Some students are against the move for various reasons; the school is young and whatever traditions have been established by our "Southern" name may be destroyed by a change. For example the name Confederated Students of Nevada Southern would have to go. Beauregarde, the school mascot, would probably change. The school paper, the Rebel Yell, would also have to be renamed.

For the first time in our history the student government is functioning smoothly, student interest is high, and we have a bright outlook for the future. New clubs and organizations are forming, our campus activities are growing by leaps and bounds — why are some of our students dissatisfied? Many people are naturally "Rebel Rousers" — they seem to derive a sort of pleasure from leading the "moves" into radical and unwise decisions.

Let's look at this situation realistically. Do we actually need a change? Will this sort of change help us? How many of the people who want this change are the leaders of the school? Ponder these questions seriously.

As you have probably guessed, I like the name "Rebels." I like our school, and I like the progress we are making. Let's not overlook the facts.

Minutes of executive meeting
October 20, 1960

The meeting was opened at 1 p. m.; minutes were read and corrected.

OLD BUSINESS:

Mrs. Bordeaux, Spanish and French instructor, has been teaching at Nevada Southern for the past two years. She received her B.A. from Transylvania College in Kentucky, M.A. from the University of Illinois, and diploma Institut de Phonetique from the University of Paris.

She has taught at the University of Illinois, University of Missouri, Texas Christian University, University of Iowa, and Chapman College in Los Angeles. She was also national secretary of the Alpha Zeta Phi Sorority and a member of Sigma Delta Phi.

Dr. Derfelt, Social Professor of Education and Director of the Audio Vision Center, received both his B.S. and M.S. from Kansas State Teachers College, and Ed.D. from the University of Arkansas. He came to Nevada in 1956, taught

a year at Reno, and was transferred to Nevada Southern in 1957.

He was a former principal of an elementary school, county superintendent, consolidated school superintendent, and community high school principal.

Mrs. Derfelt teaches first grade in Las Vegas. They have a daughter who taught two years at Las Vegas but now lives in Germany. Dr. and Mrs. Derfelt visited several countries in Europe the past summer: France, Austria, Italy, Holland, Belgium, Switzerland, and Germany.

Dr. Wright, History instructor, received his B.A. and M.A. from the University of Illinois, and Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. He has taught classes at Nevada Southern for the past five years. Mrs. Wright teaches kindergarten in Las Vegas.

They have three boys. The oldest one is attending college in California and the younger two are attending junior high here in Las Vegas. Dr. Wright likes to go exploring the country. "Prospecting," he says, "but I never find anything."

READING LAB

The 1960 session of the Reading Lab is well under way. Classes started the 24th, after the completion of two weeks of testing. This is the third year of the Reading Lab, which has proved to be very effective.

Almost everyone could benefit through it, as shown by the fact that everyone who has seen the course through has improved his reading ability. The activity is actually a voluntary guidance program, in which each student progresses at his own speed.

The diagnostic tests that were given prior to the starting of the classes pointed out individual weaknesses and will be used as a reference in determining what guidance each student will receive.

Reading speed, general usage of words as opposed to meanings, reading rate versus comprehension, use of index, and reference skill were some of the factors measured by these tests. Lack of instruction and practice are two major reasons for poor reading ability.


All that is necessary is a genuine desire, which comes with a realization of the benefits to be derived from improved reading, and a willingness to spend a little time, in order to improve one's reading skill.

An opportunity to read more, through increased speed, an improvement of efficiency in study habits, and a better knowledge of the world around us are the rewards awaiting those who care enough about themselves to improve.

Room 235, the reading laboratory, is open to students every day from 8 to 5 except when classes are in session. Students who are interested in the program but who have not begun it yet should see Mrs. Mitchell or Dr. Brink.
