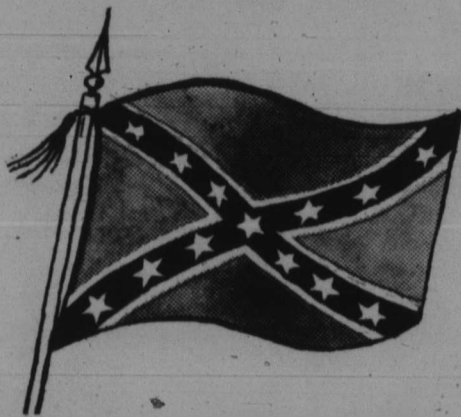

Rebels Host Islanders to Open Season

LARGE CROWD EXPECTED AT PLAY

The curtain will rise for the first time tonight at 8:30 on the set of "Antigone," a Greek tragedy being presented by the NSU Little Theatre in Room 125 of Grant Hall.

Reservations can be made through the switchboard operator in the Administration Office, Overland 7-2222. Tickets can also be purchased for \$1 each from members of the cast and crew. The play will run December 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 10.

"'Antigone' is a wonderful Greek drama," the director of the play, Dr. Paul Harris, asserted as he reviewed his pages of production rehearsal notes, "but I am doing the play because it is basically a great play and only incidentally because it is Greek."

"It is," he continued, "according to my knowledge, the first Greek tragedy that has ever been produced in Clark County."

Sophocles, the author of "Antigone," is deemed by many critics to be one of the supreme playwrights of all times. As for the date it was written, the best guess by scholars of the play is 441 B.C.

"Antigone" concerns itself with the legend of Thebes, a Grecian city-state. As the story goes, Oedipus Rex forsakes his throne by common consent to his brother-in-law.

Creon then takes over the duties of ruling the state.

In order to solidify his political position, Creon issues an edict in which it is proclaimed that Polynices, his nephew, shall remain unburied, unhonored; shall not have the proper and customary funeral rights. The decree issued by Creon is supposedly Polynices' punishment for attempting to conquer Thebes.

According to the ancient Greek philosophies concerning the Greek views toward life and death, no worse punishment could be contrived than to leave a man unburied. To the people of that time it was a terrible thing not to be buried because it meant that Polynices would not be allowed to join his ancestors in Hades, the land of the dead.

Believing that the higher law of the gods was more important than the secular edict of Creon, Antigone defies the king and buries her brother Polynices. Creon discovers her disobedience and orders her to die.

The theme, "What is to be more important, the State or the individual?" is one that fascinated Sophocles and reflects the universality of his play by continuing to fascinate men up to date.

Miss Nancy Jeffers plays the part of Antigone, and Creon, Antigone's uncle, is portrayed by Mr. Terence Vliet.

Eurydice, the wife of King Creon and Haemon's mother, is portrayed by Mrs. Sybil Boozenny. Mr. Allen Van Vorst

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CCNS REPORT

OCTOBER 27, 1960

The meeting was opened at 1 p. m.; minutes were read and approved.

Old Business:

The following applications were approved for participation in University Day:

- 1—Freshman Class Slave Sale.
- 2—Friday Afternoon Club Refreshment Booth.

Don Caldwell has a master plan for booth position on tennis court.

In order to properly take care of money earned by the Freshman Class on University Day, a separate account will be set up with the CSNS treasurer, therefore eliminating any worry on the part of the Freshman Class because all classes are without officers this year.

November 4 is the deadline for all applications for booths to be turned in. CSNS will consider only organizations that are approved by both activities committees and also organizations seeking approval with constitution submitted to either/or both Faculty Committee on Student Activities and Student Committee on Student Activities.

Norman Johnson made a motion that CSNS follow these policies, seconded by Nance Jeffers; carried.

A complete schedule of events for U-Day will be available after November 4.

Chaperones must be asked; queen election is in the hands of Election Committee, Sam Marber, chairman.

New Business:

Dick Keys has proposed that CSNS establish a campus judicial committee. Main purpose is to enforce proper campus driving, plus eliminate minor violations now occurring. If established, the following necessary procedures will be used:

1—A list of regulations and citations to be given will be published and posted in a conspicuous place.

2—The judicial committee will have power to enforce fines and hear defense.

3—It is desired that the administration will cooperate with CSNS in this venture. If they do, grade credits will be suspended until payment of fines.

4—All work will be of service only; non-payment to workers of judicial committee and organization.

The Senate is computing a list of regulations to be presented at the next Senate meeting, November 1, 1960. They will then report at the next Executive Committee meeting, informing the CSNS of their progress.

After the regulations, citations, and workings of the Judicial Committee are organized, the approval of the dean will be sought.

The meeting was adjourned at 2 p. m.
