# What I Think U.S. Policy In Paraguay Since September 14, I have been approached by many stu-dents complaining about our university school spirit. They have pointed out the fact that campus activities are unsuccess-ful because of the lack of parti-cipation and interest. This is nothing new to me, for I have heard the same complaints in four other schools that I have attended. However, it has al-ways-been just a little puzzling because when people speak of Perturbing By the EDITOR

American policy towards La tin America for many years has been one of chaos and confu-sion. It has been one of non intervention when intervention is needed and intervention when non-intervention would have been better. Our embas-sies have been staffed with many employees who speak no Spanish, and far too often they socialize only with the aristo-cracy. Millions of dollars have been, and are being spent to forward unrealistic projects, and support corrupt govern-ment. A typical example is the small country of Paraguay. is needed and intervention small country of Paraguay.

Paraguay is one of the most pro-American nations in the world, yet one of the poorest. They have a population of ap-proximately one million, most of which live in the capitol city of Asuncion. Approximately 70% of her budget goes, to surport the armed forces who un-der the Dictator Strossner have had the courty under martial law since 1946 (although not strictly enforced).

strictly enforced). A few years ago Asuncion was the only capitol city in the world that did not have city running water. They had only about fifteen. miles of paved road (excluding city streets) in the entire country, and yet our diplomats did nothing to remedy this situation. What a pity our government passed up such an opportunity to aid the people

of Paraguay. I observed at this time that of our employees at the embassy, many were military officiels. Advisors to General Strossner's Army. This was literally a stamp of approval by our government for the tyranical total-itarian government of Strossner

Guest speakers at the open-ing meeting of the Psychology ing meeting of the Psychology Club last week were psychiatric social workers from the State Mental Health Department. Jeannemarie Jones, M.S.W. and Philip Tice, M.S.W., reported on the nature of their work in this relatively new profession, ex-plaining how it differs from psychotherapy, psychology, or social welfare. Working with a knowledge of skills, a gener-al policy, and applied tech-niques of interviewing, the psy-chiatric social worker through disciplined reaction and the gen-eric approach establishes the ne eric approach establishes the ne cessary relationship with the client. This type of social work is not a science — rather it is an art in the skilled use of one-self in a specialized field — the team explained.




