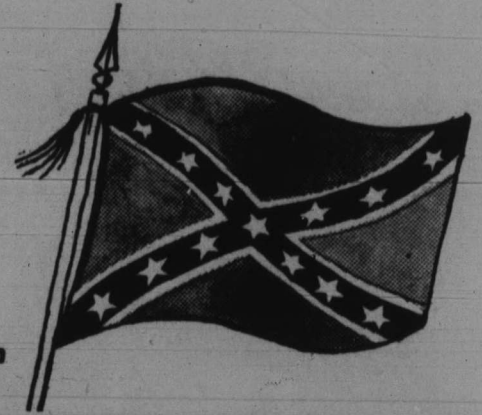

Curtain Up Friday On 'The Adding Machine'

Larry Lambeth, who will portray the male "lead," Mr. Zero, is a 1961 graduate of Las Vegas High School, where he was active in the drama department. Larry, who is an English major, is a member of the National drama club, the Thespians. His acting experience include parts in Edward Chodorov's "Kind Lady" and "Twelfth Night," by Shakespeare.

Mrs. Zero, the "Charming Wife," will be played by Mary Lou Savage, a 1961 Gorman high school graduate. She is a secondary education major in the speech and drama field.

Mary Lou enjoys singing and while she was at Gorman, helped provide some of the vocal entertainment at her Junior prom. On campus, Mary Lou is a member of the Newman Club. Her past theatrical experience includes a part in "Our Hearts Were Young And Gay."

Loa Allen, a soft-spoken gentle girl, will portray the part of a character with many of her same qualities. A 1961 graduate of Rancho, Loa came to Las Vegas from Alamo, Nevada. Home Economics is Loa's major, and she plans to teach. "Twist Teen," "Flapper Girls," and "The Ghost Wore White," are some of Loa's theatrical achievements.

Other members of the cast from Vegas High are Bob Elwart, Dixie Buhecker, Lee Strange, and Betty Hoffman. All of these people are very experienced with the theater.

Bob was an honored Thespian. In order to qualify for this he had to accumulate 800 hours of backstage work. He is one of the very few to be a Key Thespian, which is a national honor. Naturally this young man's major is drama, and he aspires to go into the technical end of the theater.

Dixie Buhecker was also a member of Thespians. An elementary education major at

NSU, she has past experience as director of a church play. Dixie is particularly proud of this because her play won first prize. On campus she is a member of the newly formed Psychology Club.

Another Key Thespian winner is Lee Strange, who belonged to the Thespians for three years before she graduated in 1961. While at Vegas High, Lee was either a member of the cast or did backstage work on every production. She won the best Thespian award and was also president of the national drama club. Le is a secondary education major in the field of—what else—speech and drama!

Betty Hoffman is another speech and drama major who hopes to go into the professional field in the technical aspect of the theater. She was a three year Thespian member, and received the best Thespian award. She is the third Key holder, which is awarded for distinction in Thespian work. To earn these honors, she participated in the school plays by directing and doing backstage work.

"The Adding Machine," the NSU drama department's fall production by Elmer Rice, will open on Dec. 1, in Grant 112. Show time is 8:00 p.m., and prices are \$1.00 for students with activity cards, and \$1.50 for non-students. The play will also be produced on December 2, 3 and 8, 9, and 10.

Seat reservations may be made by calling REgent 3-2224. Seats will be held until 7:45 for night performances and until 3:15 on Sunday performances. There are only 100 seats, so reservations are advisable.

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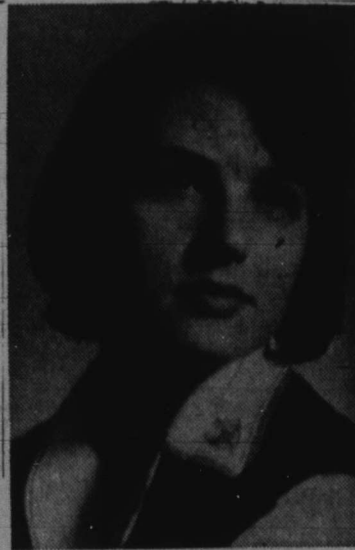
In Paraguay Perturbing

American policy towards Latin America for many years has been one of chaos and confusion. It has been one of non-intervention when intervention is needed and intervention when non-intervention would have been better. Our embassies have been staffed with many employees who speak no Spanish, and far too often they socialize only with the aristocracy. Millions of dollars have been, and are being spent to forward unrealistic projects, and support corrupt government. A typical example is the small country of Paraguay.

Paraguay is one of the most pro-American nations in the world, yet one of the poorest. They have a population of approximately one million, most of which live in the capitol city of Asuncion. Approximately 70% of her budget goes to support the armed forces who under the Dictator Strossner have had the country under martial law since 1946 (although not strictly enforced).

A few years ago Asuncion was the only capitol city in the world that did not have city running water. They had only about fifteen miles of paved road (excluding city streets) in the entire country, and yet our diplomats did nothing to remedy this situation. What a pity our government passed up such an opportunity to aid the people

PSYC CLUB ORGANIZES

Guest speakers at the opening meeting of the Psychology Club last week were psychiatric social workers from the State Mental Health Department. Jeannemarie Jones, M.S.W. and Philip Tice, M.S.W., reported on the nature of their work in this relatively new profession, explaining how it differs from psychotherapy, psychology, or social welfare. Working with a knowledge of skills, a general policy, and applied techniques of interviewing, the psychiatric social worker through disciplined reaction and the generic approach establishes the necessary relationship with the client. This type of social work is not a science — rather it is an art in the skilled use of oneself in a specialized field — the team explained.

Coffee was served and the guest speakers led group discussion.

Mary Barbone, chairman of the nominating committee, presided at the election of officers. Those elected to office were Bill Kassel, president; Dan Porter, vice president; Greta Blair, secretary-treasurer.

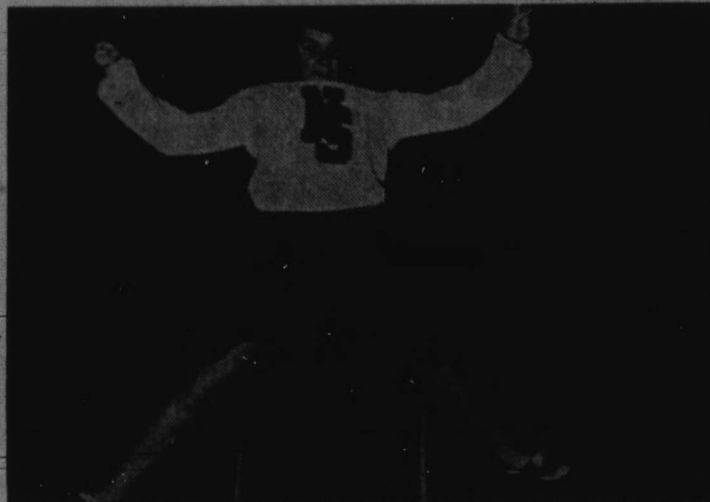
Coach Adams has not yet picked a starting five for the JV team.
