Bill Daley, Bob Pardini, and Steve Rimel, three ardent NSU students recently conducted a petition-signing campaign on the campus. This petition, a voice of the entire student body, was available for signing for three days during the middle of February. More than three-fourths of the students signed the petition.

This petition, in essence, asked the Legislature to reappropriate the one-million dollar cut by Governor Sawyer of Nevada Southern's allotted budget. The petition also stated that a number of legislators, if opposed to NSU's growth, have gone back explicitly on the many campaign promises during the last election. Those who vowed to help NSU have backed down on their promises.

After the names were procured on the petition, the petition was sent to the Legislature explaining NSU's position on the budget-cut.

Jake Von Tobel, an Assemblyman, thus far has been the only one to voice an interest in NSU as a direct result of the petition. He has promised to do all he can to help the campus grow.

The two local newspapers, the Review-Journal and the Sun, did commendable coverage on the petition, much to the advantage of Nevada Southern. Meanwhile, a group of students are currently contacting the various service clubs in town, along with the newspapers, to keep pressure on the legislature.

NOTED ANTHOLOGIST SPEAKS HERE

Untermeyer Opens Lecture Series

Noted anthologist, poet, and critic, Louis Untermeyer, spoke at the Nevada Southern Gymnasium February 21, 1963, on "Do Americans Speak English?"

Mr. Untermeyer, in his witty, almost gay manner pointed out many differences between English and American. Untermeyer pointed out that Americans find it just as hard to communicate with

the British as with the French or Germans.

Mr. Untermeyer feels that Americans don't speak good English, but Americans do indeed speak good American. He indicated that Americans should "use American slang with less self-consciousness." Untermeyer prophesied, "English will become a subdivision of American

instead of American being a subdivision of English."

Louis Untermeyer was the first of four speakers in the "Campus Lecture Series." The next speaker in the series will be Eleanor Lansing Dulles, who will speak on "The U.S. and the Challenge of the Common Market," on March 7, 1963.

We are fortunate to have two such hard-working, conscientious, female student body officers. They are both plagued by sloppy committee chairmen, and official financial woes, however, it appears that further clarification of, and stricter adherence to the rules regarding student body funds would be a help.

Noted as aspiring B. M. O. C.'s and frustrated demagogues don't count too much on the support of the "UN-people" in return for a "Voice in the Government." The adult citizens, high school kids, and the students of N.S.U. seem to feel that the governor has made and broken numerous pledges in reference to the future growth of Nevada Southern University.

It seems to be common knowledge to these people that the governor has pledged that N.S.U. would be a four-year institute in 1964. They also believe that the governor has pledged, during the heat of the campaign, more working capital for N.S.U. This working capital as well as the supposed pledge of an accredited four-year institute has not materialized. Instead 1.8 million dollars has been deleted from the campus budget. The people feel cheated. They feel as if they had reached an oasis only to be denied the life-giving drops of water. They are angry. I, for one, can not blame them for feeling this way.

The papers of this community have printed articles which can only lead one to believe the governor has made and broken promises. I do know that the promises have been broken. I do not know if the governor made them. One might conclude that since the governor perhaps did not make these promises, he cannot be blamed for the failure of Nevada Southern's growth. I believe that nothing could be further from the truth. Why? A head of government owes to the people complete honesty. It is his faithful duty to stand forth on issues which are necessary for the maintenance of the welfare of the people. JV's Finish Year With 13-7 Mark

The J. V. squad ended the season with a 13-7 record after losing their final game to the L.D.S. All-Stars. The Mormons finally received their revenge for the cubs three earlier defeats of Mormon teams, by coming from behind to finally win 68-57. The Cubs earlier received their revenge over the Nevada Test Site five by a 72-55 decision to win.

The Little Rebels broke even with Rancho High by winning 54-43 at Rancho and by losing in a real squeaker at the NSU gym, 55-54. Western's Warriors became the only high school team to beat the Cubs twice as the Warriors racked up a 53-47 win at the Decatur Avenue gym. The J. V. squad beat the Las Vegas High Wildcats a second time by easily winning 56-39, at L. V. High.

The Cubs toughest game was their loss to Palos Verdes Junior College at Blyth, California. The Cubs, paced by a ball-hawking Shelly Wright, a rebounding Bill Davis, and hot Steve Allen, led until 3:53 remaining in the game. The Palos Verdes cagers moved ahead on eight straight points and finally won before the JV's could catch up 61-55. The JV's received their revenge in their best game of the year by stomping the Palos Verdes five at home 98-65. Steve Peterson led the Cubs with 24 points as Shelly Wright, Bill Davis, Steve Allen, and Mac Pettey all hit in the double figures.

Bill Davis and Steve Allen, led the Cubs in scoring and will probably move up to the varsity squad next year.

After a poor start the J. V. squad, under coach Ed Gregory's direction, finally became a smooth working ball club. Hats off to Coach Gregory for an excellent beginning season.

Nevada Southern Five Win 21, Lose Four

The Rebels completed the season on the road as the play-making of Jerry Dick and Dave Shay pulled the Rebs out from a seven point deficit in the first half to finally overcome the University of California (Riverside) Highlanders 74-57. The Rebel's six point lead in the second half fell as the Cal Western five, who led through most of the game, finally downed the Rebels 83-79.

Siles Stepp broke previous records of most points scored in one season and most freethrows tried, scored, and missed in one season. Dave Shay is now the Rebel's Iron Horse because he has played in 71 consecutive games.

After the Rebels split on their first road trip of the season they came home to soar over the San Diego Navy five by 86-70 and 89-82. Silas Stepp paced the Rebels with 21 and 26 points respectively as Jerry Dick, Arlyn Hafen, and Gary Tapper followed right behind in the double figures. The Rebs finally broke away in the second half to drop the Westminster College five (Utah) by 82-74. Big Silas scored 20 points and Gary Tapper and Arlyn Hafen followed with 18 points apiece. The Rebels then managed to win over Fort Lewis A&M (Colorado) by coming back from a four point half-time deficit to end up on the top end of a 93-84 score. Arlyn Hafen hit his all-season high of 21 points, as Silas Stepp trailed with 20 points and Jerry Dick with 19 points.

On their second road trip of the season the Rebel five barely

made it past the surprising Laverne College Tigers at Laverne 63-62. Jerry Dick scored his season high of 24 points as Don Helm hit his season high of 21 points. The Rebels made their record 16-2 by rolling over the Claremont College five at Claremont 84-66 as Big Sy hit 28 points.

The Rebels ran, stretched and contorted themselves to gain a frantic 103-96 victory over L. A. State in their toughest game of the year. The Los Angeles State College "Diablos" wore down the Rebels 12 point lead in the second half to force the game into the first overtime with an 83-all score. The hard, fast first overtime period saw the score remain in a tie at 91-all. Layups by Dave Shap and Silas Stepp with two added free throws by Don Helm in the second overtime put the Rebels ahead to finally (gasp) win by 103-96, a new game scoring record. The Diablos couldn't stop Silas Stepp as he racked up 28 points.

The Rebels again stretched the winning streak to eight straight games by easily rolling over the University of California (Riverside) Highlanders by 82-68. In the next game the Rebels saw the L. A. Staters get revenge by a 104-72 score, as Jerry Dick led the losing effort with 21 points.

Silas Stepp hit his season high of 30 points when the Rebs easily outran the Claremont College Stags here by an 81-64 score. The Rebels racked up their twentieth win by rolling over the Arizona State College Lumberjacks by 86-79.
