Nevada Southern Delegation To Model UN Issues Report

Nevada Southern was well represented at the 13th session of the Model United Nations held

at San Jose, California, April 24-27. Phyllis Segal acted as student chairman of the Nevada Southern delegation and Dr. Charles Frazier accompanied the delegation as faculty adviser. Other members of the delegation included Benny Sydel, Allen Killen, Bill Daly and Phillip Earl.

The Model United Nations (MUN) was attended by representatives from 108 colleges and universities in the west, each representing a different country. Nevada Southern represented the country of Paraguay at this session of the MUN. Thus the research and study of the delegation was focused primarily, but not exclusively, on this country. Also studied were the problems and policies of Latin American countries in general, problems of underdeveloped nations, of which Paraguay is one, and policy of the United States concerning Paraguay and the world in general.

Nevada Southern was represented on four of the six committees at the MUN, the Economic and Financial Committee, Social and Humanitarian Committee, Special Political Committee on the question of Angola and South West Africa and the Special Political Committee on the admission of Red China to the UN. Numerous resolutions were passed by these committees concerning such matters as economic development, increase of the flow of funds and technical aid to underdeveloped nations, flow of food surpluses to food-deficient areas, a declara-

Over \$2 Million Granted To NS In Biennial Budget

Buildings, Land, Books Appreciated

The 1963 session of the Legislature passed legislation providing funds exceeding \$2 million for the growth of Nevada Southern over the next fiscal year.

Appropriated NSU this year were dormitories, dining facilities, a social science building, a radiological building, lawns, \$2 million dollars for the purchase of land, and \$125,000 for books.

In an interview with Jack DeFevre, Superintendent of Building and Grounds, it was learned that the lawns will be the first thing put in. The contractors will probably get started by mid-summer.

The dormitories and dining facilities will be started around the first of next year. The Radiological building will be probably not be started until the middle of next summer. The Social Science Building will be started soon after the Radiological Building is begun.

The books will be drifting in from time to time over the next two years.

A member of the Clark County delegation to the State Assembly said today that the purchase of land will begin soon.

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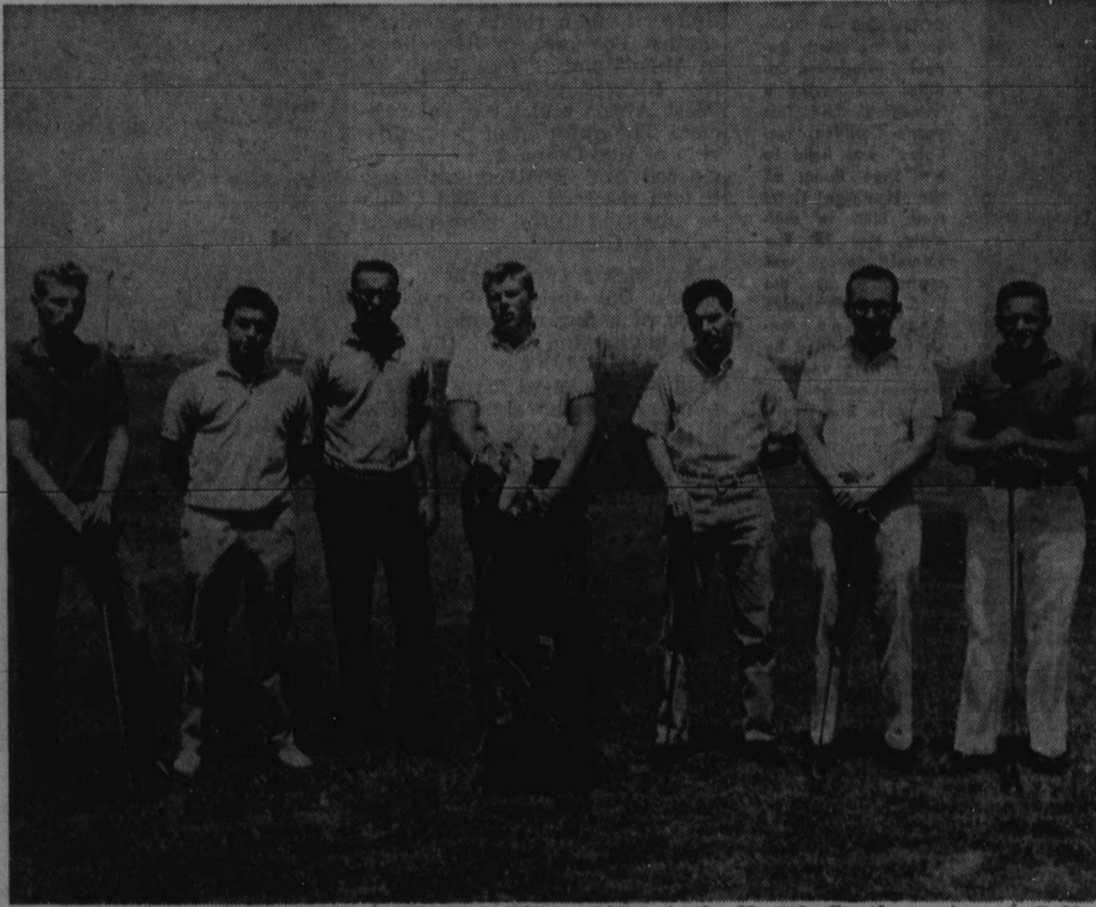
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Rebels End 'Hard-Luck' Season Thursday

'Rough Schedule But Progress Seen'-Coach

The Rebel baseballers meet the Chapman College nine tomorrow in a double-header at Municipal Field. The game date was changed from Saturday, May 18, so that the playing field can be available to high school teams for playoffs. Game time for the final game of the season is 1:00 p.m.

Saturday, May 4 the Nevada Southern baseball team travelled to Flagstaff for a double-header with Arizona State College as ASC went on to beat the Rebels again by scores of 19-9 and 18-2.

Head Baseball Coach, Michael Drakulich, feels that the team and its individual members have improved even though it is hard to convince people of any improvement with the 1-19 record the Rebels now hold. "The team lost many good players and had only two returning lettermen this year," Coach Drakulich reported.

This year, as Coach Drakulich said, "we have no easy schedule," however, the coach feels that toward the end of the season the Rebel's opponents are having a hard time beating the Nevada Southern team because of their improvement.

The coach singled out Mike

Howery as an outstanding prospect for next year's team. Presently Howery leads the Rebels in home runs by smashing five round trippers, and he has the third best batting average with .272.

Coach Drakulich also praised Dave Shay, Rebel catcher, Marshall Deutsch, third baseman, as well as Hank Sena, Bob Brown, and Rick Stanfill.

Drakulich also pointed out that the baseball team will be better organized next year because the team will be able to use the athletic field on the campus. Team members will no longer have to travel from field to field for practice sessions.

Coach Drakulich feels that the outlook for baseball will be better for next year because there will be more conveniences, more practice and more players coming out.

The basketball team had a tremendous season and ended up with 21 win-4 loss slate, a new record. 6'5" center, Silas Stepp, was named Little All-American by the Associated Press, and, in general, the 1962-63 NSU basketball team put Nevada Southern on the map.

Coach Drakulich may have wished Nevada Southern had not been on the map at all when he saw his young baseball team lose 15 games straight, before the Rebels finally managed a win.

The Nevada Southern boys' bowling teams all came through in last place, as the girl's bowling team managed to end up in second from the last place.

The Nevada Southern golf team started out well but they, too, cannot seem to get rid of their losing record.

I think that coach Drakulich can bask in the glory of Nevada Southern's basketball achievements, for they make up for any losses that other teams acquire. With all but two lettermen returning from this season's basketball squad Coach Drakulich can be very optimistic about next year's outlook.

Next year the Physical Education Department plans to expand the P. E. program in three areas, according to Athletic Director Michael Drakulich. Plans are being discussed in these areas:

- 1) The initiation of intermural programs in the fall, winter, and spring, if student enrollment warrants it.
- 2) The broadening of tennis and golf programs — more competition for golf and the arranging of the tennis schedule to coincide with the golf schedule. This second point also depends on student enrollment.
- 3) The initiation of a limited track program. This will depend on how many students are enrolled on the campus, on the facilities available at the new athletic field, and on how many P. E. faculty members will be available.

Soccer will probably become a P. E. course next fall as well.

Future expansion will be gradual, in the P. E. Department as well as the academic departments of the University. If initiated, these new additions to the P. E. department will allow the student to expand his physical ability as well as his mental ability.

Swiderski Fights In Amarillo, Texas

Al Swiderski, Nevada Southern's professional boxer, fights Charlie Leslie from Baton Rouge, Louisiana in an eight-round bout in Amarillo, Texas.

On May 4, Al Swiderski, in a rematch, beat Ed Donaldson as a standby in a nationally televised fight at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

"Ring" magazine, a national publication, chose Swiderski as the "Prospect of the Month" in its May issue.

This summer Swiderski will meet Luther Davis June 27 in a battle for the state light-heavy-

weight title. He will travel to the East coast for several fights, and finally rest in Wisconsin.

tion of human rights, sanctions against Portugal for its policies in Angola and against South Africa for its policies in South West Africa and its racial policies. The question of the admission of Red China was also considered and rejected, although it was resolved that Red China be admitted to the disarmament talks at Geneva.

An element of realism was shown the anti-UN demonstrations of a few misguided souls. The auditorium where the General Assembly meetings were held was picketed daily by people carrying such signs as "MUN GO HOME," "GET THE U. S. OUT OF THE UN AND THE UN OUT OF THE U. S.," "WE PAY, THEY SLAY," etc.

The demonstrators were relatively peaceful. However, police were present at all times since they feared possible violence from the "Antics."

The following speakers addressed the General Assembly: Jonathan B. Bingham, S. representative to the Economic and Social Council, Dr. Dorothy Collins, Education Liaison Office, United Nations, and Godfrey K. J. Armachree, civilian director of the UN Emergency Force in the Congo.

Nikolai R. Fedorenko, Soviet ambassador to the United States, addressed the final banquet Saturday night. The Nevada Southern delegation was not able to attend this final banquet as we had to leave for Las Vegas early in the evening.

In the interest of enriching the aesthetic value of our beautiful campus, I am moved to point out what I fear may be one of the most seriously overlooked architectural wonders of NSU.

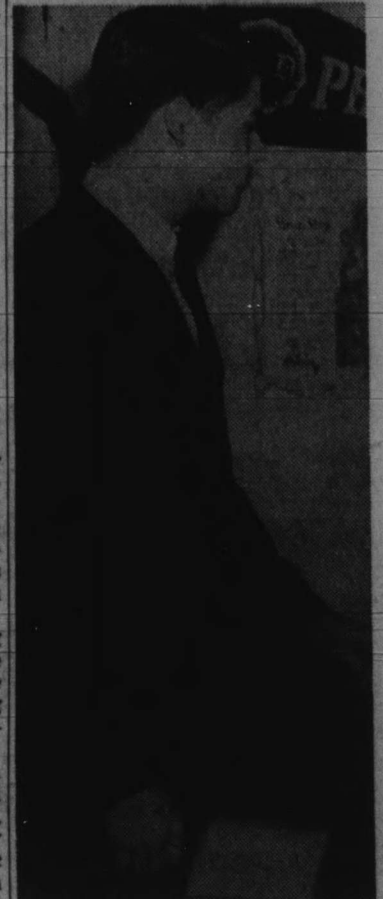
