'THE QUEEN AND THE REBELS' STARTS FIRST RUN TOMORROW

Tomorrow night at 8:15 the curtains will be thrown back on Nevada Southern's fall play, "The Queen and the Rebels," written by Ugo Betti.

Betti, a twentieth century Italian playwright, has been of great interest the past few years. Many universities have produced his plays.

This play takes place during the revolution. The plot is centered around Argia's search for her lover and the complication she meets when she is suspected of being the escaped queen.

Several talented students have the lead roles in this play. They include Sherry Stiles, who portrays the part of the prostitute;

James Wilson playing General Biante; and Ricci Sadur as the queen.

Behind the scenes are the crews who have done much to make this production a success. They are: Ernestine Elms, publicity and ticket sales; Romona Ruiz, costume and make-up; Kathy Chretien, lighting and sound; Ronald Johns, property; and Betty Hoffman, stage manager.

Tickets for the production of November 14, 15, 16 and 21, 22, and 23 are on sale in the library every day and reservations may be made by calling the University Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

ROBERT ST. JOHN TELLS OF PERSECUTED BLACK AFRICAN

"Who is out of step? One million people in the tip of Africa or the rest of the world?"

Correspondent Robert St. John told of the terror and deplorable conditions that the South African Negroes live under due to the "Apartheid" of the million whites there last Thursday evening as the second lecturer of the Campus Lecture Series.

St. John told of special segregation laws, unfair regulations and midnight police raids which the Negroes in South Africa expect.

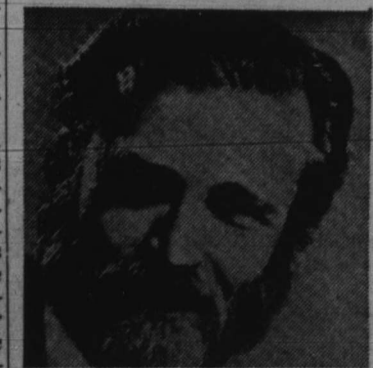
His views of the almost hopeless position of the black African was stunning and disgusting.

St. John went on to say that WW IV would be a race war as 50 per cent of the world's population would be of oriental de-

scent. (WW III is the cold war being fought now.)

One, titled "Through Malan's Africa," was banned by the South African government. St. John labels the Union of South Africa as "The land of fear."

Peter, Paul and Mary; No Skepticism Now

Journalistically speaking, the Peter, Paul and Mary concert is old news. Its consequences, however, reach far into the future.

These sincere and talented folk singers, who appeared here on October 26, were an experiment. Never before had entertainment of this nature been featured at Nevada Southern. In the weeks before the concert the prospect of such an undertaking was met with not a little apprehension. The question was: could NSU, as a young but growing institution, attain enough support from its students and the public to make such a venture successful?

The only thing to do was to give it a try. As the old saying goes, "Nothing ventured, nothing gained." Bill Daley, social chairman, and Ron Stevenson and his public relations committee literally gave their "all." With the combined efforts of local newspapers and radio stations, the Peter, Paul and Mary build up became one of the most extensive publicity campaigns ever sponsored by the university.

Evidently these people did a splendid job. The concert met all the qualifications of a smashing success. Surprisingly, the people of Las Vegas not associated with NSU gave their wholehearted support, comprising over half of the audience of 3,000. The reception of the trio was so warm that Paul Stookey (the two-dimensional fellow with those delightful sound effects) termed our audience "one of the most spontaneous, receptive groups we've ever played to." Proceeds from the concert contributed \$1500 to our scholarship fund.

In short, the concert was just one more success added to Nevada Southern's history. It proved that students here can work together harmoniously to accomplish a mutual goal. It also showed that the people of Las Vegas are behind NSU all the way in its revolutionary endeavors.

Above all, and most important, it proved that Nevada Southern is ready for and will have further events in the future to enrich the culture of its students and the general public.

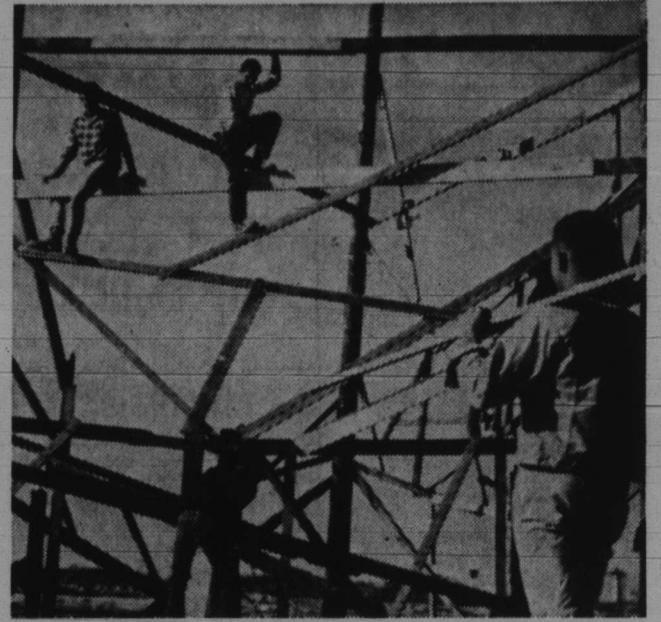

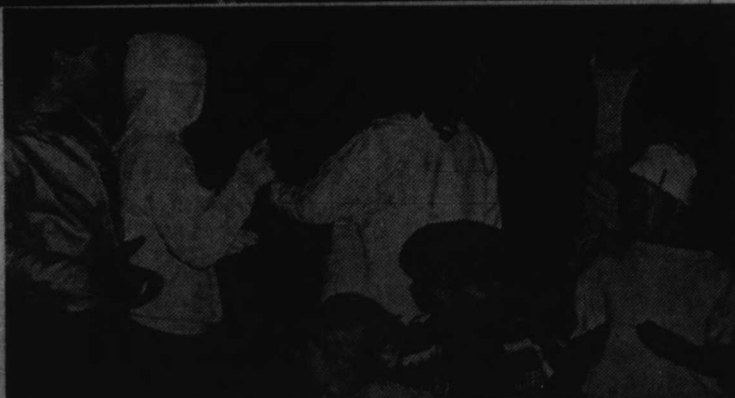

INTERVIEW . . .

Rene Paulo

The exciting strains of music stimulate the lounge with enjoyment and appreciation. Tonight, as every night, the Rene Paulo Quartet delight and possess their audience at the Flamingo Hotel. This is the group's first appearance on the mainland, although visitors from all over the world have seen Rene and the group perform in their native Hawaii, where they are the most popular attraction at the Shell Bar in the Hilton Hawaiian Village.

The highly original style of the Rene Paulo Quartet is evident in every selection played. Rene Paulo, the gifted pianist, arranger and originator of the group, began developing his own expressive touch on the piano at the age of four. He made his first radio appearance at six, playing his own original composition. By the time he was in high school, Rene had appeared with some of Hawaii's most famous orchestras and had organized his own eight piece band. After his graduation from high school, Rene spent two years studying at the famed Juilliard School of Music in New York.

Returning to Hawaii, Rene served with the Armed Forces in Japan where he played at various bases, had his own radio show, and appeared in some of Tokyo's leading night clubs. During his short time in Japan, Rene became the country's most celebrated recording artist, and was voted into Japan's "Who's Who in the Musical World."

Returning to Oahu, Rene resumed recording, while assembling as gifted a group of expert musicians, each in their right, as possible. Deadpan Tomo Fukui, the guitarist with the group, rarely smiles on stage, but can produce fantastic sounds with his instrument, while being an accomplished instrumentalist on the bass and trumpet. On the bass is big Ed Shonk, 400 pounds of musical talent who assists Rene on the tune arrangements, plays the trombone and all percussion instruments. Ed studied at the University of Hawaii and at Columbia majoring in music education before forming his own group, and finally joining the Quartet. Bruce Hamada, who gets around to as many kinds of drums as are accessible, once had the enviable occupation of surfboard instructor on Waikiki Beach, and still is easily recognizable as the football star he once was on the Islands. Rene himself, as well as being a popular and classical pianist, plays the vibes and a novel instrument, the clavietta.

Rene's classical music training is reflected in his many interpretations of one certain song, taking the melody and setting it to every tempo from bossa nova to modern jazz, to the English minuet. Performing in the Shell Bar as compared to a lounge in Las Vegas, Rene affirms the notion that the Shell Bar is strictly for the listening pleasure of the music with little noise. Since coming to Las Vegas, the group presents a selection of numbers fitted to the livelier audiences in a Las Vegas lounge such as the electric "America" from West Side Story, "Exodus," and the theme from "Petticoat Junction," a selection first recorded by the Quartet and on their soon-to-be released album on HiFi, as well as a thrilling rendition of the theme from "El Cid," and the ever-requested "Hawaiian Wedding Song."

The LOWDOWN ... on Sports

Face Three Opponents In 1st Week

Time marches on. The REBEL YELL stumbles along close behind. Our sports department is not any more outstanding than the rest of the paper; in fact, we have many very distressing problems.

In analyzing our problems, with some hope of deriving a solution, I have talked to past sports editors and have examined our sports pages through the past several years. At times we have had sports stories that would rank among the best in college newspapers, then on the same page would be an article a first grader could improve upon. At times we would have a string of well written, well formed editions only to have the entire paper fall apart for the rest of the semester.

It seems obvious to me from what I have read and observed that Nevada Southern is capable of putting out a decent, consistent, and intelligent sports page. The problem lies in continuity. One semester we may be overwhelmed with talent and the very next semester the talent is dispersed to other colleges or to other student groups.

The solution to the problem of continuity is organization. At present the sports department has very little organization. Ideally, at any given time the sports department, or the entire newspaper for that matter, should have three levels of personnel. At the bottom should be freshman students who are learning to gather and write.

On the intermediate level should be students who have experience on this paper and who are the ones who actually do the bulk of the sports reporting. On top, of course, is the sports editor who has gone through the two preliminary stages on the paper. In the set-up I have described there is no excuse for having an inexperienced sports editor, because there is a continuous crop of aspiring editors.

If this concept of organization were put into effect this year it would be three years until the sports department reached maximum efficiency. Three years is a long time, but in our case that is how long it will take for this miracle to take place.

Another factor to consider is the fact that Nevada Southern is growing at a terrific rate. If the school continues to grow and the paper continues to flounder we will be without any paper at all.

The situation is indeed depressing, but I cannot believe that it is hopeless. As far as the sports department is concerned the first step toward organization has been taken. Two weeks ago I advertised for a sports reporter and the response was heartening. Larry Clark volunteered and has already done a fine job of reporting for this edition. Next I would like to add a girl to the staff to cover the woman's intramural program. To complete the staff I also need a photographer to work exclusively for the sports department. Just as soon as these three people have sufficient experience I will add one or two more people to the staff to do layouts and proof reading.

My goal for next spring is to have a staff of five people in the sports department who are capable of gathering, writing proof-reading, and putting into final form an acceptable sports page for this paper.

This goal is indeed lofty and idealistic. Yet if it is not accomplished, and if the rest of the paper does not follow suit, there will be absolutely no use in continuing publication of The REBEL YELL.

Two slight changes have altered the varsity basketball schedule for the fall season. The first game of the season will be played against San Diego Navy instead of Long Beach Navy. The first game will be played here on December 2 instead of November 30 as first announced.

The date of the contest with Arizona State has been changed from February 17 to February 18.

The highlight of the fall season will be the third annual holiday classic held in Las Vegas at the Convention Center December 26-27-28. This year there will be a special division for high school teams. Basic, Western, Las Vegas, and Rancho will be the high school teams participating.

In addition to the 1964 schedule is the Kris Kringle Tournament held in Anaheim, California. The date for the new tournament is December 19-20-21.

At present, the Rebel cagers are at full strength with 18 players. Six returning lettermen can be expected to bolster the squad to top their outstanding 21-4 record of last season.

The returning lettermen are Ray Demman, Silas Stepp, Gary Tapper, Jerry Dick, and David Shay. Silas Stepp won a berth on the Little All-American squad last season.

Intramurals

The Nevada Southern Cross Country team has scored a first and a third place in their first two outings. The Rebels placed third in a four-way meet at Chapman College and come out on top of U. C. Riverside on the Nevada Southern campus.

Depth and lack of same were the deciding factors. In the first meet at Chapman College the Rebel runners made a strong bid for first place on the 3.5-mile course but were hampered by the loss of Larry Clark, who was participating in a boxing match. As a result, a penalty score was added to the total, putting Nevada Southern out of the running for first place. The final result was Chapman winning with a low score of 48, U. C. Riverside second with 56, Nevada Southern third with 61, and Azusa College last with 66. Jim Whipple placed fifth in a

field of 28; Sornell Wong 7th, Mike Reese 11th, Bill Chapman 16th, and Chuck Cooley 23rd.

Last week the problem of depth was solved and Coach Robert Comeau's team took three out of the first five places. The Rebels defeated U. C. Riverside 25-31 in the first meet to be held on this campus.

Although McCleary (UCR) ran a terrific race to finish with a time of 17:25, Jim Whipple (NSU) was close behind with a 17:25 for second, Cornell Wong (NSU) third, 17:28, Hill (UCR) fourth, 17:38, and Larry Clark (NSU) fifth, 18:01. Other NSU finishers were Mike Reese 7th, Bill Chapman 8th, and Chuck Cooley 10th.

The next cross country meet is at Biola College in La Mirada, California, November 9. Twelve colleges will be competing over a rugged 4.2-mile course.

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Linda Rowe Named Woman of the Month

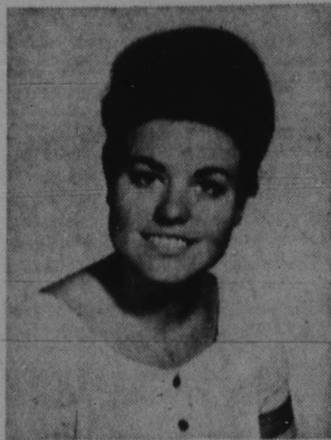
Linda Rowe has been chosen as AWS "Woman of the Month" for November, The REBEL YELL learned exclusively last week.

President Nancy Smith has not stated when the directory will appear.

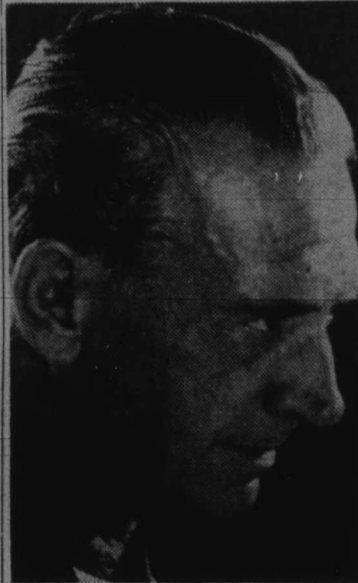
