

**STRONG STAND NIXED**

**C.S.N.S. LEADERS BOW TO NEW PLAN**

**AN EDITORIAL**

Student leaders at Nevada Southern, in a swiftly-called student-faculty conference on the evening of Thursday, April 22, decided to forgo a planned legal action to be taken against the university Board of Regents. Rumors had been circulating on the N.S.U. campus for over one month in idle speculation of exactly what the "big plan" was to be. In simple terms, it was to be a suit for the reapportionment of the Board of Regents, filed on behalf of the Confederate Students of Nevada Southern.

At the meeting in the student government room on April 22, Bill Daley, then still C.S.N.S.

President, heard arguments for and against the plan from both faculty and students alike. Those faculty members at the conference included: Dr. John Wright, Chairman of the Division of Social Sciences, Mr. Paul Burns of the History Department, Dr. Edwards of the Political Science Department, and Dr. Kittredge of the Counseling Department.

Arguments for the measure stressed the alleged exploitation of Nevada Southern not only by the state legislature, but also the internal offices of the university administration itself, i.e. the university presidency and the Board of Regents. Most of the student leaders at the initial

conference favored the proposed action, because of what they considered ample "proof" of the charge exploitation.

While the faculty members often sympathized with the general student stand, all cautioned against any short-term action that carried with it a long-term effect that would be detrimental to the university campus in Las Vegas. Dr. Wright cited such a long-term effect as being a distrust and anger directed at Nevada Southern by the Board of Regents. Dr. Edwards maintained that if such action were to bring "proper" publicity to the Nevada Southern campus so as to point up the problems here, it would be an astute

move. However, he also felt that such action as a suit of the regents could "backfire".

At a Friday afternoon session of the Senate and Executive Committee, neither of which had a quorum, Mr. Daley made the decision to not take the action first discussed, the suit. No vote was taken on the measure by either the student Senate or Executive Committee. The students of Nevada Southern were not notified in any way of the plan, and both of the candidates for the elective office of C.S.N.S. President for 1965-1966 favored, in the end, alternate action.

To this date, however, the REBEL YELL has only been

able to obtain the following two forms of "alternate action": meetings with the Board of Regents for better relations, and possible discussions with the Governor for calling a special session of the state legislature, a move to improve fund allocations for the "university as a whole".

Still, the problem remains, an often "shadey" university administration of funds between the two campuses. Apparently, current student leaders have decided that it would be better to sit and play a more "civil" game of waiting and conversation than to demonstrate or demand action.

**CLARK EDUCATORS  
 BLAST BOARD**

Local educators continue to fire protests at the University of Nevada Board of Regents over what they have recently termed an exploitation of the Nevada Southern campus by the administration of the university itself.

The Clark County School District Trustees, the major group voicing the anger, expressed heavy distaste at a board meeting on April 15. The major brunt of their attack was aimed at the current lag in building expansion and growth of any graduate programs at N.S.U., two points they say Clark County teachers could use in order to gain further training.

"The problem of an inadequate university is common knowledge", said Mrs. Helen

Cannon, a board member. "The thing we are facing is a university president who refuses to recognize our (southern Nevada's) needs".

Dell Robison, another member of the board, called the current situation at Nevada Southern "plain and simple buck-passing". The other board members concurred.

The school trustees have indicated they are seeking a meeting with the Board of Regents to possibly alleviate the fund situation, and the course structure at the N.S.U. campus. The regents are set to meet in Las Vegas at Frazier Hall Friday and Saturday. Numerous student leaders and Las Vegas students are scheduled to go before the regents for a face to face meeting.

Dr. W.C. Woodbury of the Clark County Trustees, offered a different solution to the problem. "The day Nevada Southern University will grow and be recognized as it should be, is the day we have a reapportionment of the Board of Regents and get more southern support."

**RADIOLOGICAL  
 LABORATORY  
 STARTED**

A ground-breaking ceremony for the new Southwestern Radiological Laboratory was conducted on the Nevada Southern University campus Wednesday, April 21 at 3 p.m. The ceremonies were attended by N.S.U. officials, Senators Alan Bible and Howard Cannon, Governor Grant Sawyer, C.S.N.S. officials, and representatives of the Public Health Service of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The university Board of Regents also attended the affair.

The facility, a complex of four separate structures, is to be built and financed by the state, and leased and equipped by the Public Health Service. Senator Bible commented on the structure, "This is the first of its kind to be approved, and it will be the most complete radiological laboratory of its kind in the United States.

The entire complex will house chemical and engineering labs, machine shops and the latest radiological equipment. Also included, and expected to be used by the university on a part-time basis, are classrooms, a library, lecture halls, and offices.

Total cost for the structure will be over \$3 million for construction and outfitting. Work will begin immediately, and is expected to take nine months.

**Regents To  
 Meet Friday**

The University Board of Regents is set to hold two days of meetings and discussions on the Nevada Southern campus beginning Friday and ending on Saturday of this week.

The conferences are tentatively scheduled for Frazier Hall, Room 105 at 9 a.m. each day. All Regent meetings except special conferences are open to the public and interested students.

**Daley Resigns**

Tom Hribar became the new President of the Confederate Students following the sudden resignation of William Daley which was submitted on April 25, 1965.

The resignation was prompted by advice given to Daley by his physician to the effect that he must curtail his present activities for reasons of health. Daley stated that rather than do an inefficient job he must turn the duties of President to someone who was capable of devoting full effort to the office. He further asked the present elected officers to cooperate as much as possible with Tom Hribar, who automatically filled the vacancy.

Though the members of student government were disappointed that Mr. Daley was forced to take this action, all were confident that Mr. Hribar will adequately carry out the duties of the office.

While in office, Daley initiated major reforms in the structure and functioning of C.S.N.S. government. Major changes which are generally credited to his administration from 1964-1965 included a new C.S.N.S. Constitution, highly expanded cultural activities, and a student "leadership corps" designed to gain greater recognition for the N.S.U. campus in both Las Vegas and in northern Nevada.

As a result of the resignation, the office of First Vice President has been left unoccupied until next semester. Hribar's ascendancy to the office of C.S.N.S. president has placed Ben Knowles, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, as presiding officer of the senate.

As student body elections are already upon us, each of us, by virtue of being a student here at Nevada Southern, are faced with the responsibility of choosing adequate leaders for next year.

Always around election time the threat of apathy looms over the possibility of a good turn-out for the election. The problem to the average student on this campus, seems far removed and insignificant; but in reality there is more at stake than an impressive show of interest. A lack of enthusiasm for this election, or misinformed voters, can mean a year of poor student government. Just how does this affect you personally? Well, many of you have complained about the apparent scarcity of social events, or a poor stock of library books or the need for more buildings. These all affect you personally. It is only through a progressive, practical, and well organized student government that we have much hope of neutralizing these detriments to this campus. A good student government is essential to our growth, and if you think we have problems now, wait until we try to overcome them with a weak student government!

Assuming, however, that the turn-out will be good, there is no assurance that the vote will be intelligently cast. The problem is one that has resulted from a lack of communication on campus and a lack of opportunity that might acquaint you, the voters, with the candidates. It is with this in mind that the REBEL YELL has chosen to endorse certain candidates.

These endorsements are based on the accumulated studies of the editors of the REBEL YELL regarding the candidates, their past records, and ability (PROVEN). We have withheld endorsement until now because of our wish to hear the issues:

### COLORADO STATE

Changes concerning the make-up and purposes of the Student Life Committee at Colorado State University have been submitted to the administration. A Task Committee report recommended that the Committee on Student Life consists of 12-voting members.

According to the report, five faculty members are to be elected by the Faculty Council irrespective of college affiliation. (The appointments to the Committee are now made with regard to equal representation from each of the colleges.) The elections, under the new plan, would be on nomination by the

Academic Vice President, in consultation with the Faculty Council's Executive Committee. The terms of office will be for five years with a new member elected each year. Four students will hold seats on the powerful Committee. The Student Body President will be an Ex Officio member of the Committee. There will be three administrative members of the Faculty Council on the Committee. These will be the deans of students, men, and women.

The Committee, an arm of the Faculty Council, will remain so despite suggestions that it fall under either presidential or administrative control. The suggestions were rejected because the faculty is legally responsible for student life here.

# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

DEAR MR. ABELL:

For some time now I have refrained from openly expressing my views regarding the operation of CSNS Student Government, but at last my conscience forces me to speak out against certain inconsistencies which I fear will set back the progress of this student government.

I have been associated with CSNS Government for, perhaps, the longest time of any student on this campus—my affiliation beginning with Nevada Southern's first student government in 1955. From time to time I have worked on various committees and publications as well as having served this Confederation in the capacity of Senator for several terms and as its First Vice President for one year. Therefore, it is not without some degree of feeling that I address myself to this publication and to this student body.

I realize that effective student government simply does not happen and student leaders, to be effective, must have exhibited a great degree of interest and effort before they are apt to be qualified to lead this government.

It is for this reason that I have taken the time to write this letter to the REBEL YELL.

I believe that the present leaders, with a few exception, have worked hard and diligently for the students of Nevada Southern, and this does not apply to this year alone. The truly able leaders of this administration are ones that have served for more than just a few months.

I would defend the proposition that by working for several years in this Confederation, a person would be better able to fully serve in a larger degree of efficiency than would someone that has not exhibited past interest in this government. Furthermore, I would not think that mere service over a span of several months would qualify someone to lead this administration.

And let me stress this one point. I feel that a person's merits should be based on past performances. The Student Body must weigh the past records of accomplishment for all of the candidates running in this coming election, and if past record means anything (and most surely I believe that it does), the voter must base his choice to large degree on past performance.

Perhaps more than any other political race of this election the one of CSNS President looms more important than do the other races. For that reason I urge that all of the students examine the past records of service and that they ask of themselves this one question: "Am I voting for a candidate who has demonstrated his interest in this government by long periods of past service?" If the voter can answer affirmatively, then the voter should cast his vote for that one candidate.

I am voting for Tom Hribar because I feel that he has demonstrated quite clearly that he places service to this Confederation above personal interests. I shall not sacrifice my vote upon the altar of political opportunism!

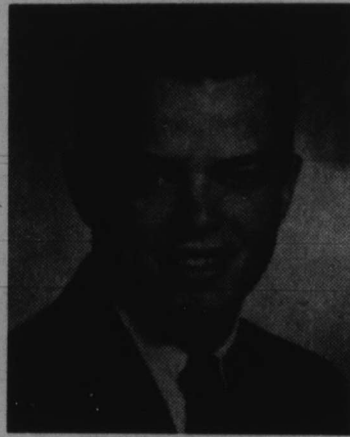

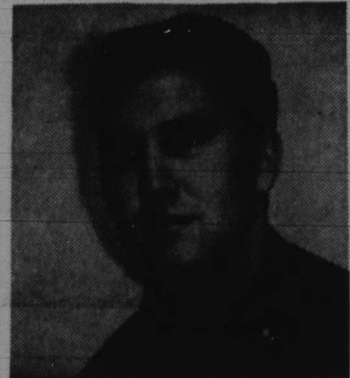

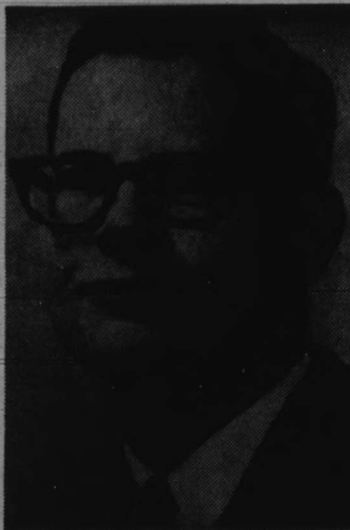

## ESHELMAN SPEAKS OF FALSE CITIZEN

A disappointingly small audience of about seventy-five persons attended a lecture Monday evening entitled "The Myth of the Law Abiding Citizen." The speaker was Reverend Byron Eshelman, the chaplain of California's San Quentin Prison. He has been the prison chaplain for fourteen years.

The reverend said that crime is committed quite regularly in America; from cheating in colleges and universities to theft in business. He said that no one is "lilly-white" when it comes to living completely within the law.

Dr. Eshelman told that the 4,000 prisoners in San Quentin can be classed into three groups; crimes against property, crimes against persons, and crimes against oneself.

The first group of property crimes include everything from robbery, to auto theft and forgery. This is the largest group, numbering about 65% of San Quentin criminals.

Crimes against people deal with murder to rape. These are the most serious of crimes. Right now there are fifty-one men on death row in California, all appealing their punishments to higher courts.

The third group contains crimes against oneself. This encompasses alcoholism and narcotics. Dr. Eshelman reported the California law is very strict on narcotics. "A three time looser on narcotics must wait 15 years before the person can go before a parole board."

The reverend related that crimes of property are caused by our national culture of the good life of materialism.

## POLLING PLACE CHANGED

The polling station for this year's C.S.N.S. elections has been relocated in the area just outside the library entrance. The change in the location was made by C.S.N.S. Election Committee Chairman Don Malone after hearing arguments for and against such action.

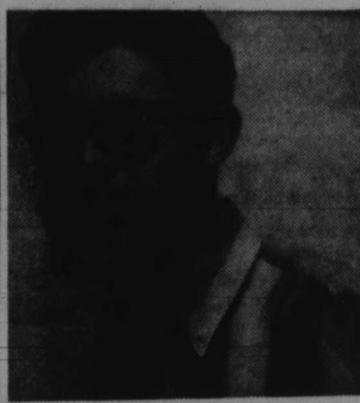
Those proponents of the move feel that it will insure a greater turn-out at the polls, and afford students a centrally-situated voting place.

## CANDIDATES DECLARED INELIGIBLE

C.S.N.S. Election Committee Chairman, Don Malone, in a move prompted by the election by-laws taken from the C.S.N.S. Constitution was forced to declare four of the candidates for office ineligible last Wednesday afternoon.

Malone, acting on the rule that candidates must retain at least a 2.2 GPA in order to be eligible for a C.S.N.S. office. Those candidates declared ineligible by Malone and the review of the university registrar were: Drew Rounds, a candidate for 1st Vice President, Steve Moore, a candidate for Junior Senator, Dean Amaru, a candidate for Senior Senator, and George Mills, a candidate for Senior Senator.

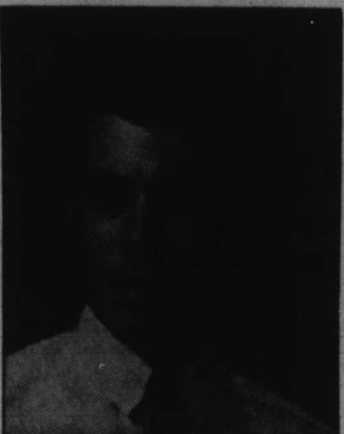

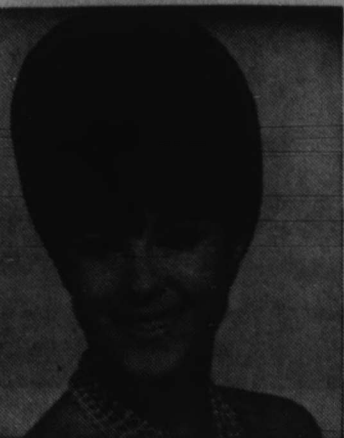

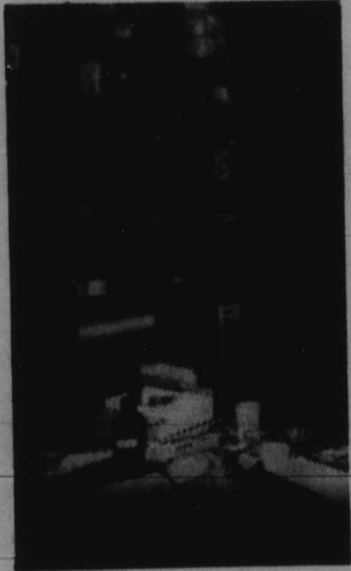

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# SCIENCE TECH NEEDS ROOM



SUPPLY ROOM?

The keynote phrase within the confines of the Science-Technology Building at Nevada Southern is "progression or regression?" At least, that is the slogan for the 1965 fall semester, and the students and personnel in that hard-pressed structure are at the point of decision. The decision at this time is to cut back on needed programs in advanced studies. The reason, continued cutbacks on the budget and staff requisitions of the university (Las Vegas) science department.

No other issue is more extensively discussed than that of the expected cuts in programing for the next academic year at N.S.U. The cut in the university's budget has forced many programs in both the arts and sciences, and the field of physical and applied sciences to actually return

to pre-1962 curriculum schedules.

While other departments of the university have been hard-hit, the science division is the most complete example. The needs include; a new science wing not expected until 1967, more study and research facilities, and at least 6 new faculty positions for 1965-66. The reality is no new addition, literally cramped facilities, and only one new position for 1965-66.

The problem would not be of such acute nature were it not for the fact that both faculty and advanced students are currently working on projects that require constant "physical" expansion in order for them to remain comprehensive. For example, Nevada Southern student biologists have to date built one of the most imposing collection of desert mammals in the nation. Indeed, it is a collection that far surpasses that at the

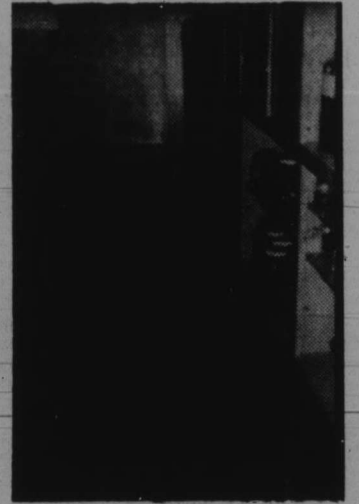
Reno campus. However, even this example of extensive research faces a cutback, because the museum has reached capacity, specimens cannot be housed in other quarters due to the problem of class space.

No other disappointment has hurt the students and staff of the science division more than the over-all course cutback set for next semester. Upper division courses in every field from zoology to biology face stunted growth.

Existing courses have been reduced in size and often number, and the geology department which has phenomenal potential, now faces continued limitations, a ridiculous situation. Math offerings have also faced a regressive revamping.

The picture is not bright until another budget is passed. A big one. Indubitably, the feeling is that the lid just might blow off,

with angry scientists coming out in search of blood. Don't be surprised if it happens!!

## Nevada Southern Affected By NCAA-AAU Battle

Nevada Southern became part of the "feud" between the AAU and the NCAA when the track team received a telegram from Walter Byers, an NCAA official,

informing them that the meet in which they were about to participate had not been sanctioned by the NCAA. NSU first entered the meet with the idea that it would be sanctioned, and even though the notice carried with it no threats the Athletic Department decided not to go for fear of being "black listed" by the NCAA. Being on the NCAA "black list" endangers a school's chance for any play-off bids.

## Golfers Lose To Loyola, L.A.; Meet ASC At Flagstaff

The golf team today travels to Flagstaff, Arizona, for a return match with Arizona State College. On March 26 and 27 the two teams split in Las Vegas.

On April 26 the team was in Los Angeles to meet a good Loyola of L.A. team. They played on the toughest course in the area when they ran into the Los Angeles Country Club.

The final score was 33-3, but the playing was much closer than the score indicated. Van McCarlie, Jim Schwerin, Blaine Yoho, and Rick Holland all lost their match on the last hole as did the teams of McCarlie-Schwerin and Yoho-Holland.

On April 14 the team met Nellis Air Force Base at the Tropicana. They had little trouble in turning the airmen back 30-15. McCarlie, Schwerin, and Yoho once again led the team.

The return match with Loyola here and the Barstow match April 30, have been cancelled.

The meet NSU withdrew from, The Mount San Antonio Relays, was to have had both college and open divisions. (The college division is governed by the NCAA and the open division by the AAU.) The NCAA chose not to sanction the meet because it had been sanctioned by the AAU for its members to compete in.

This feud started in 1960 when that year's Olympic team was being selected. The AAU had the majority of control as to who would go since the team was picked from those placing highest in the AAU National Finals, and they still have that control. They have the power to select only those who they went in the meet, and just might, in 1968, not let any college athletes into the meet. They would let them participate if they quit the NCAA, but then the NCAA would not let them compete for any one of its schools. Then the athlete would lose his scholarship and would be out an education. In any event the athlete is the only one being hurt.

The feud gained steam right up to 1964 when it looked as though the U.S. might be sending an inferior team to the Olympics in Tokyo. At that point the federal government asked the late General Douglas MacArthur to step in and see if he could set up a compromise. A temporary solution was found and the 1964 team was probably the best we could have sent. But the Olympic torch was hardly out when the feud started anew. It will probably run wild until 1968 when again they will have to sit down to solve their differences (and patch their egos) in an effort to send the best team to Mexico City. Whether they will again be able to compromise in 1968 remains to be seen, but it is evident that all the fighting down between now and then will only hurt our chances in the 1968 Olympics.

## Peace Corps Service

### New Loan System

College juniors who wish to use the summer before their senior year to prepare for post-graduation Peace Corps service now may borrow up to \$600 to help pay their senior year school expenses. Loan repayment may be deferred until after Peace Corps service has been completed.

The loan program, announced today by Peace Corps Director Sargent Shriver, is the product of an agreement between United Student Aid Fund, Inc. (USA Fund) and the Peace Corps Volunteers Fund, a non-profit

foundation established by the Peace Corps National Advisory Council.

Privately funded, the loans are guaranteed by USA Fund, a non-profit corporation provid-ing loan guarantees to students on 700 campuses, with the partici-pation of more than 6,000 banks throughout the United States.

The loans are expected to enable more third-year college stu-dents to enroll in the Peace Corps Advanced Training Program, a two-phase plan that pro-vides intensive Peace Corps

training during the summer months between the junior and senior year, and just after grad-uation. Many students who have had to work during summer months now may participate in the Peace Corps Advanced Pro-gram.

Trainees in the Advanced Training Program begin their Peace Corps training in June. They receive travel allowances to cover transportation to and from the training center, and a living allowance while training. Selection for the Advanced Training Program is the same as that used for all Peace Corps applicants, based on an evalua-tion of the candidate's back-ground as revealed in the Peace Corps Questionnaire, Placement Test results, and character refer-ences.

After graduation, participants return to a training center for eight weeks more of intensive

instruction. Those who success-fully complete the final train-ing program then will begin their work abroad as regular Peace Corps Volunteers.
