

# HOMECOMING CONCERT CANCELLED

Cancellation of the concert was brought on by illness of Miss Bever-

ly Bivens, vocalist for the We Five. Miss Bivens will undergo surgery the first of January and will not be able to appear until a later date.

"We are not giving up the idea of having the We Five for a N.S.U. concert" said Wingfield. This was also emphasized by Tom Hribar who mentioned the possibility of

bringing the group to campus for a concert to be scheduled later in the spring.

Other events for the first N.S.U. Homecoming Celebration are still scheduled as originally planned. There will be a Homecoming Dance, an Alumni Day set for Sunday on the N.S.U. campus, a pa-

jama rally to be held on Fremont Street in downtown Las Vegas, and a victory dancing following the game between the University of Nevada Wolf Pack and our own N.S.U. Rebels. This event will be held in the Las Vegas Convention Center following the game on Monday, January 10.

C.S.N.S. will publish a special Homecoming magazine which will cover the entire event and which will go on sale to students and alumni during the four day event. The publication under the supervision of First Vice President Jack Abell, is now being readied and will be twelve pages in length.

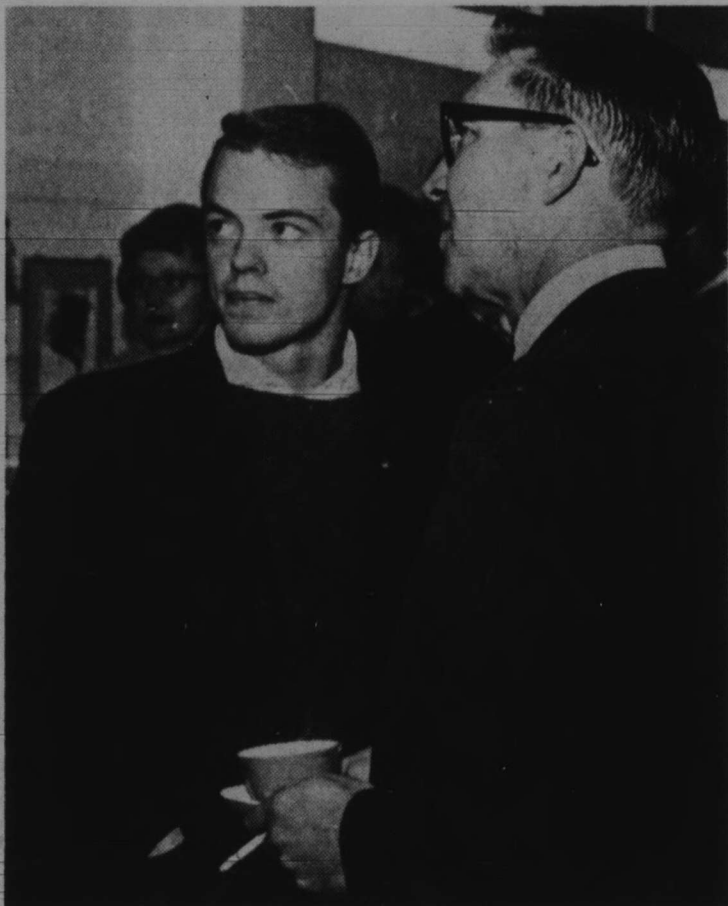

## STUDENT UNION NEEDS CITED

# GOV. SAWYER TOURS NSU CAMPUS

Governor Grant Sawyer took a first-hand look at our NSU when he met with C.S.N.S. leaders and with the Administration last Thursday. The tour took the Governor over the N.S.U. campus and was followed by a reception in the Art Gallery.

Sawyer was met by Chancellor Donald Moyer and by members of Student Government who showed the Governor facilities on campus. The needs of N.S.U. were pointed out to the Governor in all areas of the campus.

The first stop on the agenda was a tour of Social Sciences Building. This was followed by a visit to Science Tech Building where the touring party was met by Mr. Herbert Wells who showed Sawyer through the building. Highlight of

this phase was the visit to the Science Tech museum. During the tour, it was pointed out to the Governor the crowded lab facilities and need for added space was emphasized. The Governor visited other facilities on campus and met students in various classes of several departments.

Following the tour, the Governor met with N.S.U. students and faculty at a reception held in the N.S.U. Art Gallery where he met informally with a crowd of more than 100 who attended the function.

The Governor's visit was climaxed by a luncheon at the Desert Inn Hotel where he met with members of the Board of Regents, university administration and with student leaders. During this luncheon meet, members of each group re-

resented cited campus needs to Sawyer in relation to new facilities and additional staffing to meet current demands.

C.S.N.S. President Tom Hribar cited the need for a student union building for this campus and expressed the hope that a special session, currently consideration for the Nevada Legislature, would authorize such a building. Hribar's views were supported by the Regents and by N.S.U. administration.

Those attending the luncheon hosted by Chancellor Moyer, were: Governor Sawyer, Regents Juanita White, Dick Ronzone, and Archie Grant, Dr. Ben Owen, Dean of Faculty (pro-tem) Jerry Crawford, CSNS Tom Hribar, First Vice President Jack Abell, and C.S.N.S. Senators Bill Cunningham and Ben Knowles.

## C.O.C. Chairman Praises Groups

Mr. Bill Cunningham, Chairman of the COC, has announced that more than 90 per cent of all campus organizations have submitted constitutions to that CSNS Committee.

Cunningham stated, "I would like to thank the organizations for their co-operation in seeing that this operation was carried out in the most efficient manner possible. Organizations are a vital part of campus life and I urge all those who desire to form a campus group to do so. It is only in this way that Nevada Southern can develop into the fine school it can be."

At the present time the COC is setting up definite rules of procedure for becoming a CSNS organization. These rules will be published in a pamphlet and will be available around the first of February in Grant Hall, Room 235.

Mr. Jack Abell, First Vice President of CSNS, has said this of the COC, "This year's COC has been the most effective to be operating on this campus, and its efficiency is mainly due to the hard working efforts of its chairman, Bill Cunningham."

## Nevada Legislature Lauds NSU Students and Faculty

The First Special Session of the Nevada Legislature has adjourned after passing the controversial Re-Appportionment Bill which will change, drastically, the legislative make-up. Before adjourning, the Assembly passed a concurrent resolution which rebuked "demonstrations against selective service."

Inasmuch as Nevada Southern University, both students and faculty, are mentioned specifically, THE REBEL YELL takes this opportunity to reprint Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 2, which was formally adopted on November 5, 1965:

**ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION**—Deploring organized opposition to selective service and commending personal sacrifices for the war effort.

WHEREAS, American troops in Vietnam are actually engaged in a shooting war, though none has been declared; and

WHEREAS, The members of this legislature deplore the advocacy of violation of the laws of sovereign states and of the United States, in particular violation of the Selective Service Act; and

WHEREAS, The members of this legislature are amazed and disgusted by the actions of that small minority who burn draft cards and offer economic and moral support to the enemies of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Such conduct is particularly unfitting to university students and faculty members, showing as it does no devotion to education or freedom of speech but only immaturity and lack of wisdom; and

WHEREAS, The members of this legislature are proud of the vast majority of the youth of our nation and particularly of the students and faculty of the University of Nevada and Nevada Southern University for supporting the national security of the United States; and

WHEREAS, The members of this legislature believe that these sentiments are shared by the vast majority of citizens of the State of Nevada; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of Nevada, the Senate concurring, That this legislature condemns all acts and overt advocacy of opposition to the Selective Service Act and acts detrimental to the war effort of the United States in Vietnam; and be it further

Resolved, That this legislature commends those patriotic Americans whose personal sacrifices are contributing to the war effort; and be it further

Resolved, That a certified copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith by the legislative counsel to the President of the United States in his capacity as Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces.

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# HOLIDAY CLASSIC NEAR

# REBELS TEST GONZAGA NEXT

It may be a tough Christmas vacation for Rolland Todd's Rebels who will face six of the far west's top names in basketball during the yule recess.

Nevada Southern starts out with hustling Gonzaga, Spokane, Wash., at the Las Vegas Convention Center. Tip-off is 8 p.m.

Gonzaga, a perennial power in the Big Sky Conference, is the second team from that loop to face

the Rebels. Idaho State, another contender in the Big Sky, has already whipped NSU.

Gary Lechman, the Big Sky's top scorer last season, is sidelined with a broken arm suffered in pre-season practice. Senior guard Bill Suter and juniors Chick Thomas, Larry Brown and Jed Steele have been pacing the Zig attack.

All four are averaging in the double figures, led by 5-foot-8 Suter with 15.5 points per game.

Todd will send two-time honor-

able mention All-America Silas Stepp, NSU's top all-time scorer, along with Bob Brown and Clyde Dawson against Gonzaga's shorter front line. Stepp and Brown are 6-5 and Dawson stands 6-4.

Forward Steele, 6-4, is the tallest of the Zags.

Ron Weiloehowski, 6-0, and Charles Campione, 6-2, will probably take the starting guard stops for NSU. Charles Payton, a returner from last year along with Weiloehowski, will also see much

action.

Bill Davis, a speedy 6-3, is the top reserve for the front line.

Five days later California Western University, San Diego, clashes with the Rebs in the first round of the Fifth Annual Holiday Classic while Portland State, Portland, Ore., takes on tall and rough St. Joseph's Albuquerque, N.M.

First round winners meet for the finals and losers go after the consolation title.

Cal Poly, Pomona, Calif., com-

pletes NSU's longest home stand of the season on Jan. 4.

Charles Scranton, 6-4 center, is back again for the Broncos, whose loss to the Rebels last year sent Nevada Southern to the Far West Division of the National Collegiate Athletic Association regionals in Seattle.

Cal Western and the Rebels have waged a long series, each winning on their own home court. The rivalry is even at 4-4. Cal Poly has a decided advantage over the Rebels, winning seven of 12 contests.

Portland State and Gonzaga have never met the Rebels before. The Rebels nipped St. Jo last year at home, 57-53, in the only clash with the New Mexico team.

Gonzaga nipped Arizona State College in Spokane by 107-106. Nevada Southern fell to the Arizonans in Flagstaff recently by a 103-93 count.

Stepp, NSU's leading scorer with an 18.4 average, sank 26 points against ASC. Brown came in with 17, Wielochowski netted 14 and Dawson nabbed 12. ASC's Bob Love scored 30 points to lead the lumberjacks.

Gonzaga comes here tonight after a battle with mighty University of San Francisco. The Zags have also beaten Eastern Montana College, Helena, and have fallen to big Washington State University in Pullman, 106-78.

## N.S.U. REBOUNDS

### CAGERS DROP THREE, OVERWHELM ROCKHURST

After N.S.U.'s first three home contests this season, and the Rebels loss in Flagstaff against Arizona State College, most of the fans of N.S.U. were placing their final hopes for a bright season on a "gambling-man's number," game seven last Friday night with Rockhurst College of Mo.

As it turned out the Rebels rebounded with a brilliant 84-79 win, and moved their record to 3-4 for 1965-66.

On December 10, the Rebels dropped their home opener to a tough Baylor quintet, 75-74. The major cause of this loss was a miserable percentage from the free-throw-line, 16 for 32, 50%.

Idaho State used the fast break to run and overshift the N.S.U. defense on Saturday, December 11 in the Convention Center. The result was a 101-90 upset of the Rebels who were obviously let-down after the Baylor contest. High for the game was forward Wilbur Frazier of the Vandals with 30 points.

At Arizona State last Wednesday the major problem was again defense, as the Rebels let the Axers overshift, and exploit. Every time the Rebel zone would shift, the ball go to little guard Bob Love. The result was 30 points for Love, and a 103-93 loss for NSU.

The major difference against Rockhurst was a stiffening defense to go with the usually smooth Rebel offense. The Rebels forced the Hawks to feed the ball to their center Pat Caldwell for most points. Caldwell did a fine job snaring 15 rebounds and dumping in 34 points, but the Hawks were mild from the floor and line.

Clyde Dawson played his greatest game yet in an N.S.U. uniform, contributing 23 points, and grappling 15 rebounds against the taller Rockhurst front line.

Perhaps the greatest surprise of all was the performance of reserve guard Ken D'Andrea and back-up center Ed Terwilliger Both calmly sank two free throws within the last two minutes of play to protect the slim Rebel lead.

Sy Stepp hit 18 points for the Rebels and Chuck Campione had 10 points for the night, mostly on 10-15 foot jump shots from the side of the key
