Future 'Looking Good' For N.S.U. Campus

Landscaping, Dorms Underway

The recent activity around the campus has many students guessing and wondering what is going on. Well, believe it or not progress is really visible, now. Some of the older students around campus remember the small beginning in the past. Nevada Southern University is growing at a very visible rate.

The first more visible and sensual progress is happening between Frazier and the library. The Las Vegas Fertilizing Co., is definitely involved. The 160,000 square feet of landscaping will be beautifying our growing campus. Trees and new sidewalks are being incorporated into a mall affect. The 100 trees being planted are of a hardy variety that are able to withstand the climate of our area. The grass was not planted like a normal lawn. Instead, a hybrid bermuda, called Tiffany, was sodded. The total estimated cost for trees, grass and sprinkler system will be \$43,809.80.

The completion date will be aimed at one week away.

The new dormitory and dining commons will start construction soon. During exam week, the bids were opened and to the surprise of many local contractors a Montana firm got the job. The proposed 150 room dorm will house 240 students and proctors. The dining commons will also be constructed at the same time. The deadline for end of construction will be September 15, 1966 and the estimated cost of the six story dormitory and dining commons has been set at \$993,000. The estimated cost for room and board will be from \$400 to \$425 per semester. It will be announced later in the year when applications will be taken for dormitory space.

Another item in the fire is the new addition to the Library. The new two story addition has been aimed at a completion date in December, 1966. The estimated cost will be between three and four million dollars. The new facilities will include language rooms, microfilm viewers and printers, and additional space for books.

Looking Down the Barrel

I was treated to some temporary laughs during finals week when the classic message: "Finals Exams . . . U.S. Army Here We Come" was posted on the marquee for the amusement of passersby.

The meaning of this message was perhaps two-fold. It may be taken to mean just 'study or your grades will be bad' or 'study today or tomorrow you die.' Depending on whether you are a girl or boy.

Actually the message was just a make-shift way of repeating 'President Johnson's New Year's present: the increase in the draft to include all male college students. Oh, I forgot, . . . all male college students who are carrying less than 16 units. Six of one . . . half a dozen of another.

Let's face it fellows, it won't be long 'til that old hand's a holdin a rifle. It is just another pause 'til the 16 unit requirement is 16 units of 2.5 grades and then 16 units of 3.0 grades. And before you know it . . . you're seeing the world from the butt of a gun.

Of course we all know that there's a war on and we are fighting for a good cause. (At least most of us believe that). And don't get my intention wrong, it is our duty to help if we are called on; my only beef is that we should be last on that long list.

Some people would call that selfish, or warped, or (if you are a non-college draftee) a few other (more crude) expressions. But there are good reasons for this opinion.

Assuming that most students who go to college are there to learn. Assuming also that their reasons for learning are not altogether selfish (financial security and better chance for success); And assuming that those who are stupid enough to think college is an easy way out of the draft are stupid enough to be first-year-drop-outs; then we might conclude that a university education benefits the American society as much as it benefits the individual.

Let's just clarify that by adding the observation that there are basically only two areas where the United States has an advantage: in our educational advancement (over-all) and in our well rounded natural resources. Forgetting natural resources (they won't last forever) we have only one thing left: good old knowledge, i.e., technology, culture, initiative, and practicality.

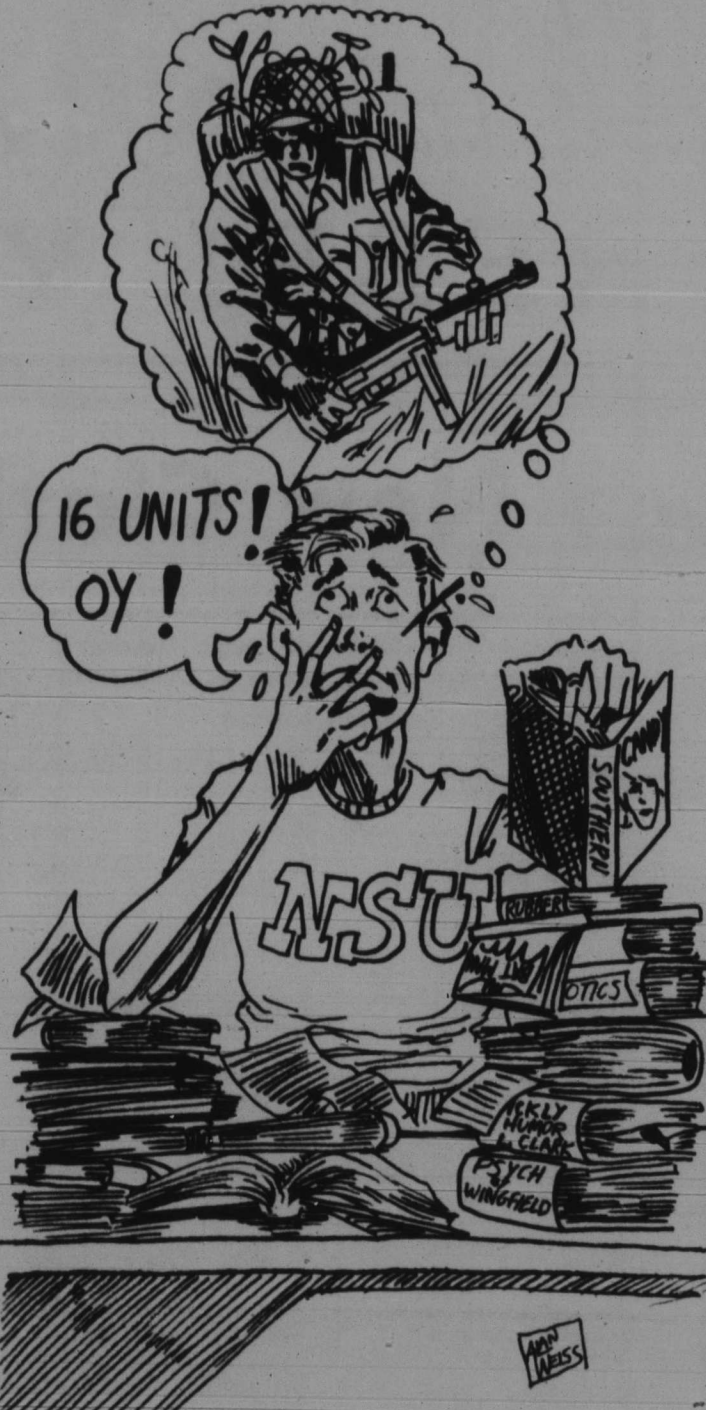
That's not to say that we don't need skilled labor, but let's face it, it is a lot easier to learn how to fix a car or drive a piece of equipment when you are older than it is to force yourself to go back to college to learn the way to fix a human being, or defend justice in courts, or increase the national standard of living.

Simply, this means that if someone is going to be interrupted in his career isn't it logical that it be someone who can continue on with his learning after the interruption?

They learned after World War II that the ex-college students were the hardest ones to re-habilitate, since they had never bothered to learn skilled labor occupations. How come the same mistake is being encouraged again?

Draft dodgers are effectively screened with the limit at twelve units; anything over that screens out the unfortunates who are capable, willing, but financially unable to go through school full time.

Maybe, then, the draft board is making a mistake and is trying to ignore the fact that by simply increasing the number of high school graduates who aren't going to college, and who haven't started a permanent profession, they can fulfill the need right now. College isn't as easy as the draft board thinks, or as useless.

CENTER PLANS SUBMITTED

Preliminary recommendations for N.S.U.'s planned Student Center were submitted at the end of last semester by the Chancellor's Joint Student-Faculty Planning Commission. Under the direction of Dr. Ben Owen and student Bob Jensen, the Commission made a study of the needs and preferences of N.S.U. students, and approved a list of "soft planning" recommendations concerning the size and scope of operations and facilities of the structure. Although the recommendations are not necessarily to be a part of the specifications of the Center project, past experience has shown that architects and engineers are eager to incorporate the preferences of the University in their own ideas and plans.

As of this date, we are waiting for action by the state legislature on approval of the proposed budget for the Center, in order to approve a bond, financing the construction of the Center on a pay-as-you-go basis.

George Clark Gets Internship

George Clark, Junior in Political Science, was selected last month by Senator Howard Cannon to a special University of Nevada senatorial internship for the Spring semester.

George will work in Senator Cannon's Washington, D.C. office on special assignments and attend George Washington University in the evenings.

Mr. Clark was nominated by the Nevada Southern University Political Science Department and un-amiably recommended by the University of Nevada, Reno, Political Science department to represent the University in this new program. Approximately 20 students had applied for the award.

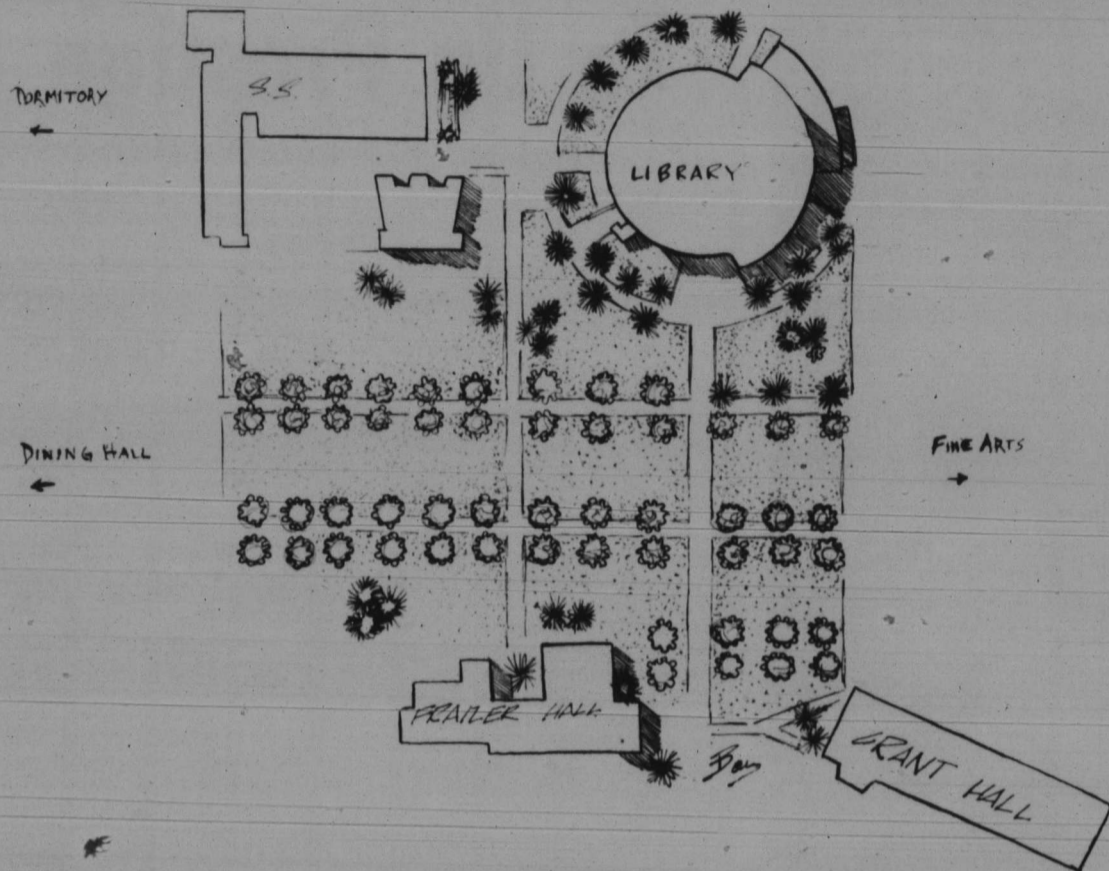

Hotel Association Donates \$280,000

The University of Nevada Board of Regents has accepted an offer by Las Vegas Hotelmen to launch a department of Hotel Management at Nevada Southern.

The University was pledged \$280,000 last month by the Nevada Resort Hotel Association, which represented the ten major strip hotels.

The proposed program was outlined for the Regents by Gabriel Vogliotti, executive director of the Association. He emphasized the grant, to be used in a four year period, is made without any conditions or strings.

Dr. Rex Johnson, chairman of the Department of Business Administration, stated that they hope to have the program rolling during the coming year. The University has had the counsel of Dean H.B. Meek, executive director of the Council on Hotel and Restaurant Education at Cornell University.

Dr. Fred Anderson, chairman of the Board of Regents, stated that: "The University, particularly Nevada Southern, has been looking forward to this for many years, but we just haven't been able to fund it. This type of a program is certainly very desirable for our state."

The Reno campus has a two year program in Institutional Management currently.

The curriculum here at N.S.U. is designed to prepare students for work in any American hotel. The gambling and entertainment phases will be elective. The hotels will provide intern and laboratory facilities as well as part-time employment for those seeking a degree in Hotel Management.

Rebels Attempt To Up Prestige

In an attempt to regain some of their lost prestige on the West Coast, Nevada Southern's Rebels go after wins against two opponents they have never played before in the second Annual Nevada Southern Invitational.

N.S.U. faces Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, in the Convention Center tomorrow after the College of Southern Utah and the Milwaukee Branch of the University of Wisconsin clash.

Tipoff for the first game is 7 p.m. The second game starts at 8:45 p.m.

Saturday Nevada Southern clashes with the Wisconsin five and Cal Poly tangles with C.S.U.

The only opponent that Nevada Southern has in common with Cal Poly is the University of Nevada at Reno, which beat the California five earlier this season.

N.S.U. tackles the Far West Conference's title favorite Tuesday, in

what looks like the completion of a two-game sweep for the tough Nevada five.

The Rebels then come to their own gym for two of three games there. Feb. 11 Westminster, Utah, visits then New Mexico Highlands comes to town on Feb. 14.

Nevada ruined N.S.U.'s first homecoming in history with a 74-70 victory, as the rallying Rebels could not press hard enough to defeat the Nap Montgomery-led Wolf Pack.

Silas Stepp came back into the form he showed at the beginning of the season, scoring 23 points in that game, then by averaging nearly 20 points in the three games afterwards.

The Rebels whipped Cal Western in San Diego for the first time, 58-52, but found young San Diego State too dangerous and lost, 91-62.

The College of Southern Utah was also tougher than N.S.U. expected, as both teams went on a scoring spree which the Rebels won, 99-96.

Cal Poly (S.L.O.) brings one of the tallest-small college teams in the nation to Las Vegas. Four men stand 6-7, led by starting center Bill Bruce and by junior forward Ed Fair.

Normann Angell (6-5) will probably fill the other front-line spot, while 6-4 Bob Gravett and 5-7 John Garcia take the backcourt starting positions.

Coach Rolland Todd will probably send Silas Stepp (6-5), Clarence Dawson (6-4) and Bob Brown (6-5) against the Mustang's tall front line while smooth Ken D'Andrea and Chuck Campione fill the backcourt.

Starting for the Milwaukee, Wis., squad will be center Nells Siegert (6-7), forwards Alan Suttle and Larry Reed and guards Phil Michalovitz and Dennis Murphy.

Stepp, N.S.U.'s all-time scoring leader, once again tops Rebel statistics with an 18.2 average and 10 rebounds per game.

Dawson comes next with 11 rebounds per game and a 13-6 average, followed by Brown with seven rebounds and an 11.5 average.

Ron Wielochowski and Chuck Campione are the remaining two of the five Rebels averaging in double figures. Wielochowski averages 11 points while Campione averages 10 points.

After their win over the College of Southern Utah in St. George, Nevada Southern was 8-7.

Stepp, Dawson Star, But Rebs Tumble Twice

Silas Stepp and Clyde Dawson were the only bright spots for Nevada Southern's basketball team on a two-game road trip to New Mexico highlighted by a track meet and a name change.

When Nevada Southern reached Albuquerque, N.M., last Saturday St. Joseph's College had disappeared, but the same Dons who whipped the Rebels earlier in the season were there, under the new guise of the University of Albuquerque.

The Dons won again, 87-73, as Dawson scored 24 points and Stepp added 20 more. Albuquerque had to wipe away a 10 point deficit to finally beat NSU.

The Wednesday before a fast breaking New Mexico Highlands University battered the Rebels, 117-102, led by forward Phil Schoer who scored 32 points.

Dawson led the Rebels again with 21 points, while Stepp tallied 20. Highland's All-American, Steve Cochran, scored 25 points.

After the road trip Nevada Southern's record became 8-9, the second time in three years the Rebels have had a losing record.

What? No Gymnastics At Nevada Southern U.

Last year there appeared in the REBEL YELL an article with the question—quote, "Why no NCAA participation by Nevada Southern University in GYMNASTICS?" end quote. In return let me ask another question of my own of the students and people with the power to institute the program, "What is gymnastics???" Is it an individual or a group who come out at half time in flashy uniforms and put on a circus act? Is it a four or five minute performance to be viewed with a somewhat lackadaisical type interest with comments such as; "Gee, they're pretty good but I could never do anything like that," "So what, those guys are just a bunch of show offs," "Do we have to sit through this. The people I've seen on TV are a lot better." Again I ask, "What is gymnastics and why doesn't it exist at Nevada Southern?"

Quite truthfully, it is because only a handful of people are interested in it and know it exists to some degree on the campus. The rest of you could care less. It is not a sport in which you walk into the gym for the first time, play at for an hour and walk out a gymnast. It takes as much as 5 to 10 years to develop to the point of where you might start approaching the point of becoming a fair gymnast. There are many hours spent in the gym doing moves which stretch, build, produce sore muscles, many bruises, sprains, and disappointment by the individual in their progress. The coach is hard, unsympathetic, demanding, unsatisfied, and always finding fault with even the most perfect move by an individual. An individual may repeat a single move as many as 1,000 times before they began to do the move as it should be done.

The kids who train in the above fashion in this area strive to perfect every move in their routine for a performance. They perform before

an audience which may be as large as 100, of whom around 60 are required to attend, 30 are parents and relations, and 10 just happened to stop by on the way through. The loudest applause comes from the parents and the other team members. It really gets discouraging to not only the kids but to the coach. The road is long, hard, cruel, and disappointing and not many are able to reach the top. In this sport, the top is the Olympic Team. There are only six men and six women who can make this team. There is no professional area for these people. There is still another aspect to the picture.

This sport can do more to completely educate the whole body physically than the majority of the other sports individually or together. Gymnastics is a sport in which you can really have a lot of fun. Even

if you never intend to compete, you as an individual can derive a tremendous amount of good physically and satisfaction mentally from some of the basic courses in gymnastics.

I don't know whether the original question in the YELL came from one or several students, but I do offer one suggestion. There are three sections in basic gymnastics offered at present in the university schedule. If you want an expansion the best way is to create a demand by stuffing the present classes to overflowing or making it known that you're really interested enough to back up an effort in this direction. Lip service does not do the sport much good.

If you really want it, get on the ball and support it. It will depend entirely on you as to whether gymnastics will go or flounder. *You Want it?—Do something about it!*

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
