RENO BUILDS AGAIN

Cornerstone ceremonies for the soon to be completed Nye Hall, an eight story mens' dormitory on the University's Reno campus, took place Saturday, Sept. 24 at 2 p.m. in front of the hall.

The ceremonies were conducted by the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons, with Grand Master Frank Logar presiding. Grand Chaplain Edward Block of Carson City served as chaplain.

Gerald Roberts, editor of the Central Nevada Newspapers, Tonopah, addressed the guests. The ceremony marked the 100th year of cornerstone laying in Nevada by the Grand Lodge. On Sept. 24, 1866, the organization laid the cornerstone for the old U.S. Mint in Carson City, which now houses the Nevada State Museum.

Dr. Fred Anderson, chairman of the University board of regents, introduced the special guests including Governor Grant Sawyer, Reno's Mayor Hugo Quilici, members of the State Planning Board, and the University board of regents.

A State Planning Board project, the structure cost approximately \$2 million, financed through the College Housing Program of the

Department of Housing Urban Development of federal government.

It is the first building of a planned dormitory and dining commons complex being built on North Virginia Street across from the University campus.

Two more multi-story dormitories and a dining commons are planned for the area.

Architects for the project were Selden and Stewart. Structural engineer was J. Webb Brown, and the contractor is the firm of Dixon-Tiberti.

Local representative of Federal Governments College Housing Program is Harlan LeGate.

Coordinator for the cornerstone ceremony was Silas Ross, former chairman of the University board of regents.

C.S.N.S. Plans Leadership Conference

Nearly 100 student leaders and other guests of CSNS are expected to gather this Saturday in the Mount Charleston area for the 1966 CSNS LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE. The conference, which will kick-off with a casual lunch, is being continued this year after a brief discontinuation in 1965.

The event this fall has been designed to offer a forum for student government, the University administration, and student organizations. The major goal of the 1966 meeting is to bring a spirit of co-operation and unity to campus activity. According to Jack

Abell, CSNS President, "the Leadership Conference is a vehicle of co-operation and co-ordination. CSNS feels that there must be a means of direct communication between the student group, student government, and the administration of N.S.U. It is because of that pressing need and N.S.U.'s impressive growth that the 1966 Leadership Conference is significant."

The Conference is being held in the newly-completed Deer Creek Road Picnic Area between Kyle Canyon and Lee Canyon. Here is a brief resume of the agenda:

The C.S.N.S. Executive Committee and Senate meet tonight at 7:30 in joint session. The first order of business will be the drafting of a joint resolution on the Student Union project, which will be forwarded to the University Board of Regents.

It is a hope of mine that the session will make a positive and favorable resolution in regards to the immediate construction of the proposed Student Center. The need for this structure is more than apparent. The Student Union is a must.

The second order of business concerns modifications and additions to the Constitutional Reorganization Act (by-laws). Under consideration will be the modification of pages 7 and 15 regarding the C.S.N.S. 2nd Vice President and the S.E.C. (Special Events Committee) Chairman.

The proposed change will eliminate the position of the S.E.C. Chairman (now vacant), by delegating the S.E.C. duties to the 2nd Vice President.

It is a hope of mine that this modification is accepted. The change would mean that the head of the S.E.C. would be an elected official instead of President-appointed. At the least, it would be a step away from C.S.N.S. Presidential bureaucracy.

And it would give the 2nd Vice President something to do besides keeping the official scrapbook.

The final item on the agenda is the addition of original page 16-A. (See As I See It on Page 2)

Doering, born April 9, 1928 in St. Louis, received his Bachelor of Science at Valparaiso University, Indiana in 1949. He played

centerfielder for three years there.

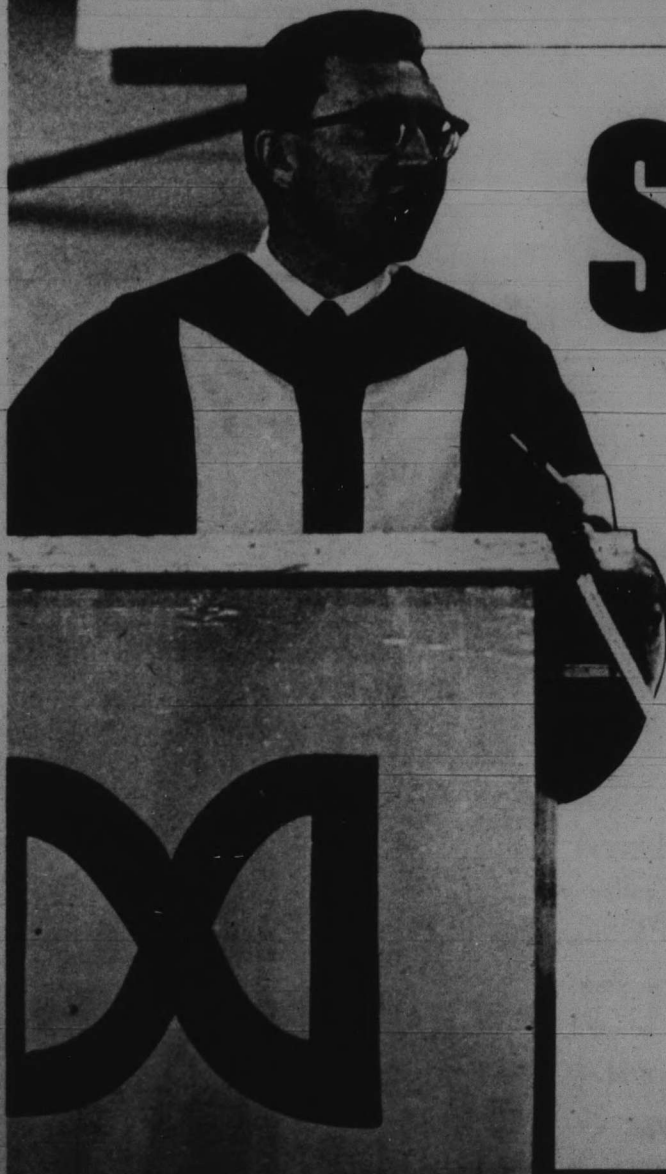

THE GAME even continues after this at college stadiums on bright

Saturday afternoons, because there lies an empty field where at another time the eleven men of dear old alma mater will once again set out on their version of a crusade.

But this does not -- cannot -- happen at Nevada Southern University.

On Saturdays, as fall rays of sunlight slant on a patchwork of lawn, sagebrush and bare desert, there is a deathly pall. It is interrupted only by maintenance crows or occasional students and professors and maybe a car or two swishing through the parking lot.

What most of us here know about college football is what we have seen on a rare opportunity during an out-of-town trip. What I know--and liked--about college football I learned from several falls of

watching home games of the University of Oregon at Eugene. In the first football game I ever saw the incomparable Norm Van Brocklin was the quarterback for Oregon.

I liked college football then. I miss it now. I feel NSU is lacking something each fall. I, and I know many others agree, feel that a football team is so deep in American collegiate tradition, that it helps cement one's heart of his Alma Mater (with a capital "A" and "M").

While I am an undergraduate student here, I know I will never see a college football game in which NSU is a participant.

If I could see NSU play THE GAME sometime, I know that when I am an old man its memory will stir an emotion so deep that the thought of my Alma Mater will bring me to tears.

Let's have a football team at NSU -- it can't come soon enough for me. I want to say that I knew some Saturday afternoons that had some rich glory in them. I want to come closer to finding out what going to school at NSU really means, but I know I never will.
