

STUDENT PETITION RUMORED

Regent Re-Apportionment Sought By Student Community Organization

SPECULATION CONTINUED today amid growing on-campus rumors that a significant element within the student community is preparing to launch a campus campaign to obtain a petition demanding a re-apportionment of the University of Nevada Board of Regents.

Reliable campus sources told the REBEL YELL that the petition drive is being jointly organized by CSNS President Jack Abell and the Nevada Southern University chapter of the Young Democrats.

Full CSNS Support

Abell, when quizzed by the R-Y last evening, would make no direct statement on CSNS involvement in the planned petitioning, but did say that "if such a plan were true, it would have full CSNS support." He also added, "I think that all interested parties in Southern Nevada will find that the students of N.S.U., unlike University administrators with jobs to preserve and Southern Nevada Regents with their nebulous "Board harmony" at stake, will take a stand."

The alleged petition has been linked with the name of Flora Dungan, a former Assemblywoman from Clark County, who is again seeking a legislative post in November. Dungan was instrumental in the re-apportionment of the Nevada State Legislature, and recently began a drive for court or legislative re-apportionment of the University Regents.

Don Almar, President of the N.S.U. Young Democrats was not

available for comment on the petition during the weekend. However, he is reportedly working with Dungan on the document.

Many observers consider the petition drive to be a natural result of the on-campus discontent over N.S.U. representatives in budgetary and physical policy making within the University system. The dormitory mix-up at N.S.U., still a point of contention, and the apparent inability of the University administration at N.S.U. to sell students on the "fair distri-

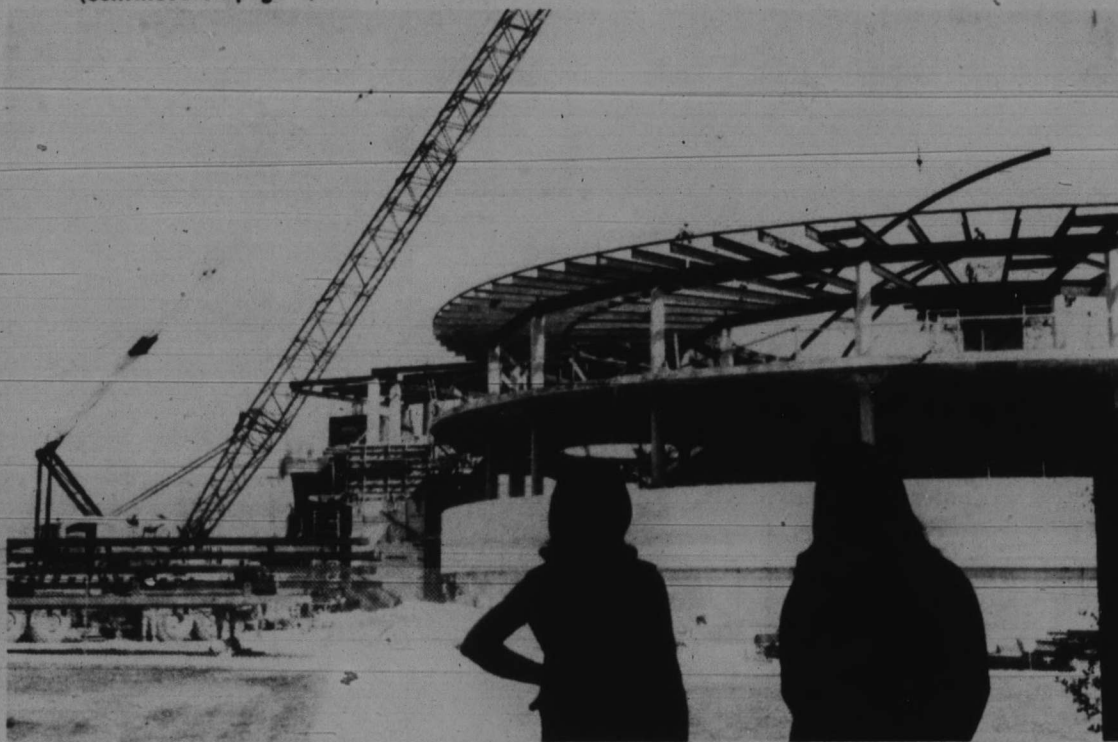

Class, U-Day Queen

Elections Thursday, Friday

C.S.N.S. government officials are preparing for a record voter turnout this Thursday and Friday as class and University Day Queen elections near.

This semester's filing of 21 position-seekers is tops in recent years.

The candidates for University Day Queen are: Patty Allen, Chris Bruno, and Pam Tuttle.

The breakdown of offices and candidates is as follows: Senior Class President, Steve Moore; Senior Class V.P., Jim LaBounty and Don Malone; Junior Class President, Andrew Barnes; Junior V.P., Mary Doty; Sophomore President, John Hartman and Chuck Kennerson; Soph. V.P., Judy Burke and Tom Irwin.

Vying for top offices in the Freshman class are: Mike Riordan, President; John Quinlan and Rona Shore, Vice President; Mark Dunn, Ridge Frew, John LaBounty, Francie Schwaegerle, Carol Thornock, and James Toller, Senators.

Only matriculated, full-time students are eligible to vote and voting is restricted on class lines,

i.e., a junior may vote only for a junior class candidate. Write-in ballots are permissible.

Election Committee Chairman Greg Waddilove emphasized that, "all candidates must observe and adhere to campaign procedure prescribed by the Election Committee."

Any questions concerning the campaign or election may be answered by consulting the official regulations available in the student government office, Gr. 235.

The polls will be located in front of the library. Polling hours will be from 9 to 4:00 p.m.

MOCK ELECTION

In addition to the regular student elections to be held this Thursday and Friday, CSNS is holding a mock election for the most significant state-wide offices to be filled in the swiftly approaching November General Election.

Each student voter, when voting for his class candidates, will be asked to fill out a separate ballot featuring the following offices: Governor, Lt. Governor, and Congressman.

The results of the opinion sampler will be made public one week after the actual voting, according to CSNS. Student Body President, Jack Abell, stated that the election opinion poll will be the first in a series of student opinion samplers to be taken by CSNS this year. "The polls," said Abell, "will concern topics of on-campus, international, national, and state-wide interest."

Student-Faculty Colloquium Scheduled

Wednesday, October 12th will kick off Nevada Southern's first Student-Faculty Colloquium as Dean Jerry Crawford addresses both students and faculty members on "Opportunity Transient -- Student, Faculty and Administrative Responsibility for Instructor Evaluation in the Modern University."

The series, which was originated

at the request of students is designed to offer another vehicle by which students and faculty can freely exchange ideas on contemporary problems.

Faculty members have been invited to address the Colloquium on issues that are of particular interest to them and then host a session to discuss the issues which they put forth.

The meeting was not then adjourned as there was some further business to be discussed.

Also, a statement by me, "You could always sit on the radiator in the student body President's office," was taken out of context in a conversation regarding the present office space that the executive body now occupies. At present, there are ten (10) people in one of the three partitioned cubbyholes that some students call an office. By the way, there isn't a radiator in the student body President's office. Sorry about that miscarriage.

Three previous articles have misrepresented the facts concerning the Senate, First Vice President and the President. These articles have not contained the true story that the students are entitled to know.

At the last joint session of the Senate and Executive Committee of your student government an interesting development came about concerning the seating of current Freshman Senator Mike Devers.

Precedence has been that the Freshmen Senators are to serve a term of a year, like the other Senators. Yours truly is a case in point of this precedence. My term, as a Freshman Senator, was until new Freshmen Senators were elected. However, Jack Abell ruled, while presiding over the joint session, that this precedence was ridiculous and therefore did not seat Devers.

Normally I would just report the actions that happen in the Senate and Executive Committee, however, Mr. Abell and Mr. Ruymann feel that I should: (1) Not use what they call "trivia," (2) Consult them about what I intend to comment on, (3) And not criticize without offering a plan. So, in an effort to please them I will offer my plan with all due respect.

The problem of Freshmen Senator terms is not a new one. One school of thought on the matter has been that they should not have a vote in the summer because they do not have a Freshman Class to represent. There is double representation for the four months until new Freshmen Senators are elected by a new Freshman Class.

But, being a little less idealistic about the matter, there are very good practical reasons as to why the term has been set until the end of September.

It's true, first of all, that theoretically the Freshmen Senators have no constituents for the last four months of their term. On the other hand, the way our student government works NO Senator of ANY class is considered an "ambassador" from his class. Therefore, he does not necessarily represent his constituents on matters before the Senate.

He is not trying to please just the Freshmen or the Sophomores or the Juniors or the Seniors. His votes as a Senator are as student leader, and on behalf of the student body. Each Senator is responsible to the student body as a whole, not just their respective classes.

Furthermore, if Freshmen Senators were denied votes during the summer and September, that would leave only six Senators to legislate for the student body. The quorum would likely be three Senators. This is not what I consider the most efficient number.

It seems to me that Freshmen Senators, just as all Senators, are elected by their respective classes as a convenience. It is a fairly democratic method of selecting a student officer.

It is better than having Senators appointed. It is better than having the whole student body elect each Senator. In such cases, probably only upperclassmen would be elected because they would be better known.

Admittedly we need to have underclassmen represented in student government, but this can be done by having underclassmen (Sophomores and Freshmen) elected to student offices, not necessarily by having four officers attempt to take the temperature of their constituents on each issue that comes before the Senate.

For this reason I support the precedence of having Freshmen Senators serve a full year, like the other members of the Senate.

But, above all, this is a matter for the judicial board to decide. Not the student body president or any other member of the executive branch or the Senate.

the morning of the meeting. It was a phone call that prompted the meeting and not a letter from Mike Clarke for Tuesday's session. As to the reference to the Junior Senator by the C.S.N.S. President as being "an implanted obstructionist," it is sort of premature as the good Senator hasn't had a chance yet to be implanted or be an obstructionist as the first meeting of the Senate was only on the 27 of September. Incidentally, Abell and Clarke apparently put petty differences aside at a recent Joint Session and insured the passage of vital legislation in the constitution, obviously considering Mr. Crawford's muddy invective to be irrational and imbued with poor taste.

As to the statement, "No meeting was needed because everything had already been done by the executive branch," in regards to the Senate's first meeting, it may be pointed out that there are definite legislative issues that need-

ed to be met head-on by the Senate as the chief legislative organ of C.S.N.S. The constitution states that the Senate and not the Executive committee is the chief legislative body. Apparently, the columnist, in his zeal for REBELLION, and as a result of his limited knowledge of the constitution has overlooked these delegated roles. The fact remains, the President of this Confederation is given the onus of seeing that the Confederation is properly administered by the fact that he is specifically mentioned as an ex-officio member of all C.S.N.S. committees.

Concerning the "big school" image, I am answering a question put forth by the columnist of REBELLION, "Is your (Jack's and mine) 'big school' image worth spending \$5,000 to achieve?" No body has ever said that a "big" image would be imparted upon our school if the student paper were to

bution of funds" in the University's total legislative request for January are cited as political catalysts. Whether the reported petition has an affect on jurists or legislators is open to conjecture. However, its appearance indicates that academic autonomy of N.S.U. was only a means to an end, namely what the N.S.U. "revolutionary reformists" term "physical autonomy and real representation for Nevada Southern University." While the scope of the petition is not certain at the present time, its intent is. The authors apparently feel that a student voice will serve well to augment any case for re-apportionment of the Regents.
