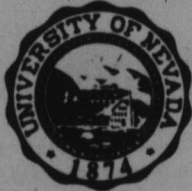

### Meet the Presidential Candidates

If there has been an obvious point of harmony among the four candidates for C.S.U.N. President in the past few weeks it is that we all seek to change the direction and scope of student government. One of my opponents says that it is

"time for a change," another claims to be the candidate of change. But "change" is a perennial call of candidates and should be expected rather than put at a premium, wrapped in the ribbons of ambiguous promises. It is for that reason that I promise "not just a change - but a change for the better!"

This, I believe, is the important distinction between the other candidates and myself. Any candidate can find the anomalies in the present structure and pick a general course of remedial action. But it takes previous direct involvement in student government to furnish the familiarity of problems and their alternative solutions that make possible implementation of a changed direction and scope. I feel that being the only candidate to have ever been elected to a student government office and the only one to have been regularly involved in student problems furnishes me with that practical background. It takes ideas to progress, yes, but they are worthless without the ability to implement. I believe that I have proven myself capable both to originate and implement solutions to our common problems and I seek to continue service.

Some of the specific ideas I have to offer are:

1. Studying the possibility of lowering activity fees. Presently students are paying over \$50.00 per semester in fees including the student union assesment. I believe the increased number of students, even with an increase in activities, will make this reduction possible. The next administration will receive some \$25,000.00 in unused student government funds.

2. Establishing a publications board for all campus medias. This board would not be a "censorship" board, but would be designed to protect the editor from the arbitrary censure that we presently have. At the same time, this furnishes the students, who in fact publish the paper, with protection from negligent editors or unrepresentative editorial policies.

3. Establishing a campus radio station. This station could be financed in cooperation with the Federal Government. Such a station would be a tremendous aid in improving intra-campus communication.

There are other proposals which special considerations force me to omit. The important thing I ask you to remember is that my ability to handle the job I seek has been proven by sincere and continuing involvement in the past. Most of my opponents campaign on the basis of being the man able to effect change and increase student participation. I ask "Where have they been in the past?" I ask for your support on Thursday and Friday. JOHN CEVETTE

#### Jerry Gordon

I, Jerry Gordon, seek your support for Student Body President. Below are some of the ideas of my campaign. I seek not only your vote in the coming election, but your participation in student

government.

I believe that students have a valid and vital interest in campus affairs. In order to make our educational experience more meaningful, I believe we must involve students, faculty, and administration in a coordinate effort to promote an excellent

being your Student Body President. I feel the student faculty relationship should be one of love and mutual respect, and I invite all of you to join me in making that dream a reality.

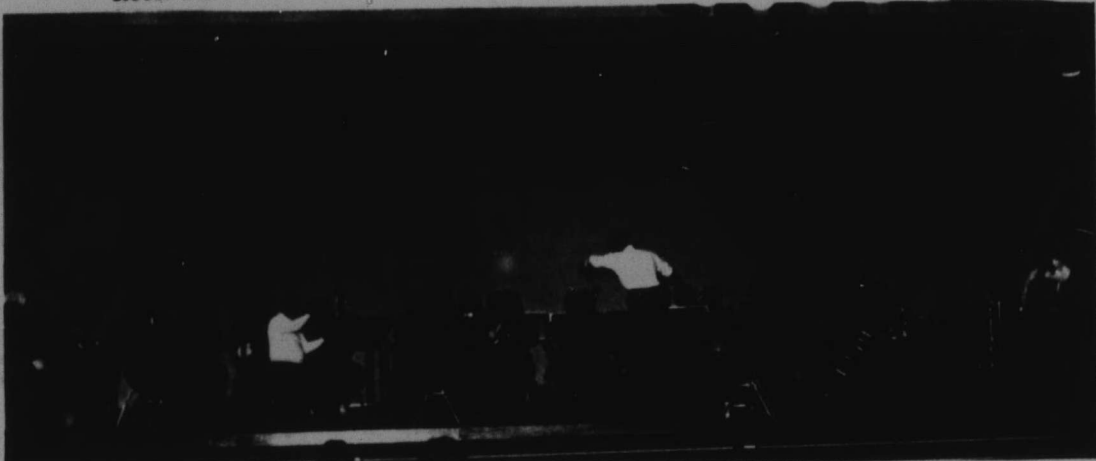

Twenty UNLV scholars will be formally initiated into Phi Kappa Phi national honor society on May 13. Guest speaker for the occasion

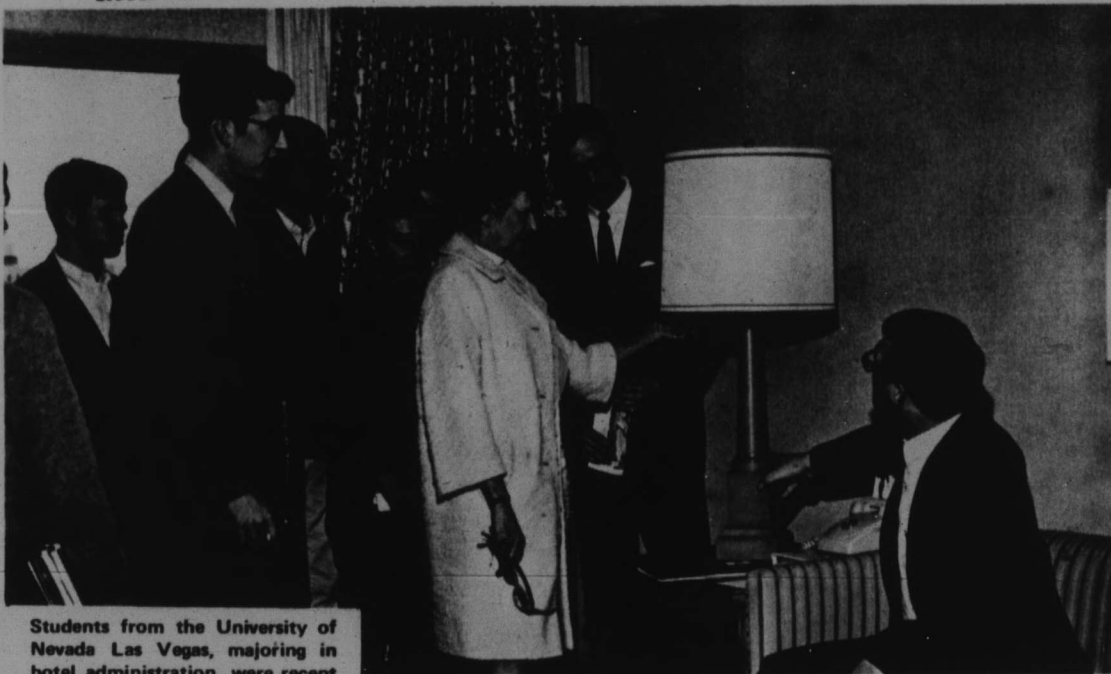
will be the group's national president Dr. J. Kenneth Munford.

# Hypnotist Comes to Vegas

The Psych Club wishes to extend its appreciation to Ronald F. Worpell, Ph.D. for his lecture and demonstration dealing with clinical hypnosis. The following is a brief summary of enlightening information gained from that presentation:

Many people have probably had hypnotic-like experiences without ever realizing that they have been in what might be termed a light hypnotic state. Examples are the individual who "falls asleep at the wheel" while driving or becomes so fixated on a T.V. set that he doesn't even move during the commercials.

Even in the medium or deep hypnotic states some people when questioned will deny the fact that they were hypnotized. This was verified by one of Dr. Worpell's subjects, who after being awakened from a deep hypnotic state said, "I felt relaxed, but I don't think anything happened." What did happen is that the subject was one of four individuals who appeared to be actually asleep on their feet.

At the other extreme is the question: "May a person fake a hypnotic state?" The answer is yes, but there are common signs such as voice change, fluttering of the eye lids and progressive relaxation which would make faking very difficult.

Contrary to what has become a popular myth, hypnosis can be dangerous if used by people who know how to hypnotize but don't have the proper training in psychiatry, psychology or relevant fields of the Social Sciences. This is especially true of individuals who advertise cures through hypnosis. For example, a subject with a weight problem may have this symptom alleviated through hypnosis, but if the weight problem was a symptom of underlying emotional problems, the symptom may displace to another symptom such as headaches. Obviously, an untrained person could not detect such a displacement.

Another possible danger is found in the field of entertainment commonly known as stage hypnosis. While the stage hypnotist does not usually attempt any type of therapy, he is frequently successful in putting several subjects, as well as members of the audience, into hypnotic states ranging from light to deep. The danger lies in the fact that some of these individuals may not be fully recovered when departing from the performance and as a result are potentially dangerous behind the wheel of an automobile without realizing it.

While hypnosis may be dangerous in the hands of charlatans, in the hands of competent professional therapists it has been used successfully in treatment of mental disorders such as phobias, deep depression and homosexuality (providing the homosexual wants help). This is not to say that hypnosis is the best or only type of therapy for every mental disorder but that it is a therapy that may be successful depending upon the patient's susceptibility and the nature of the disorder. In reference to susceptibility to hypnosis, the patient need not always be a "good subject" for the therapy to be successful, and the person who says "I can't be hypnotized" may very well be more susceptible than the one who appears to submit willingly.

## HOTEL MANAGEMENT

The Division of Hotel Management at U.N.L.V. is fast becoming a recognized institution of higher learning in the hospitality business. Presently in its third year existence, the program has been awarded more than \$7,000 in scholarships and incentive grants.

Mr. Jerome Vallan, Professor and Chairman of the Hotel Division, says that the amount of monies to be awarded in the coming academic year will most likely exceed this year's figure. According to Mr. Vallan, the division took the initial action to make the contributing institutions aware of its program, and the contributing institution determines the merits on which the scholarship is based. Then the division distributes the application blanks to interested students for completion.

The largest grant awarded this year amounted to \$1,100 from the Statler Foundation. The C. Kandel Scholarship Fund of the Sands Hotel, H. J. Heinz Company, Riviera Employees Association, the University of Nevada, and the Utah-Idaho-Nevada Hotel Association have all been continuous donors from the start of the Hotel Program at U.N.L.V.

As the size of the Hotel School

increases, the number of interested scholarship donors becomes larger. This year, The American Hotel-Motel Association, Anheuser-Busch, Inc. (Budweiser Beer), Food Service Executive Association, and the Hotel Sales Management Association have contributed scholarships and grants to the Hotel Program for undergraduates at U.N.L.V.

All that is required of a student is to complete the application form to the best of his knowledge. The remainder of the requirements depend on the contributing institution, and the ability of the student to fulfill them.

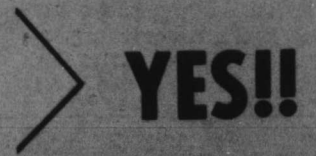

## Joint Session-What Student Government is Doing

JOINT SESSION  
April 15, 1969

The meeting was called to order at 5:40 p.m. by President Bill Terry. Mike Mullaley, Mike West, Dan Pitts, Bill Bowman, Shawn McCormick, and Randy Frew were absent excused. Larry Dungey was unexcused.

(M) Daleske (S) Goldstein to accept the minutes as read. P 14-0-0. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Standing - COC - report was delayed until Mr. McCormick is present. Special - Bill of Rights - Mr. Roman passed out copies of Article-IX, Section 1, Academic Appeals Board, to the members of the Joint Session. (M) Roman (S) Clark to adopt Article IX, Section 1 as an addition to the by-laws. P 13-0. (M) Roman (S) Riley to accept the Bill of Rights. P 11-1

Second Vice President - report was delayed until Mr. Frew is present.

Student Participation - this committee has not met.

### OLD BUSINESS

(M) Rhoads (S) Markoff to accept the following resolution on Open Meetings. WHEREAS, the C.S.U.N. Student Government has affirmed the inalienable right of students to participate meaningfully in any and all policy making forums that can be reasonably construed to affect said students, BE IT RESOLVED, that the C.S.U.N. Executive Committee and Senate, meeting in Joint Session, and in keeping with past policy, declare that all policy making meetings affecting students be open to attendance and constructive participation by all students, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the presiding officer shall retain the prerogative to close meetings to non-committee members in all situations that involve personal matters or participating students whose purpose or effect is to disrupt and impede said meetings. There was discussion. (M) Ruff (S) Goldstein to amend the resolution, changing "presiding officer" to "majority of the committee". There was further discussion. (M) Jasper (S) Arceneaux to call for the question. P 17-0. The amendment passed 15-1. (M) Goldstein (S) Ruff to call for the question on the resolution. P 17-0. The resolution as amended passed 16-0.

There was discussion on the by-law change concerning the credit requirements for Executive offices. (M) Cevette (S) Goldstein to accept the amended motion which was tabled at the last Joint Session. That motion was that the President must have a total of 36 credit hours, with 20 of them being on this campus, and the Vice Presidents must have a total of 28 credit hours, with 20 of them being on this campus. (M) Ruff (S) Clark to amend the motion to read that the President must have a total of 36 credit hours, with 24 of them being on this campus, and the Vice Presidents must have a total of 28 credit hours, with 24 of them being on this campus. (M) Goldstein (S) Knutson to call for the question. P 16-0. The amendment to the amended motion passed 19-0. The amended motion passed 19-0.

(M) Janes (S) Arceneaux to appoint Miss Pennie Bailey as Election Committee Chairman. There was discussion. (M) Janes (S) Knutson to call for the question. P 14-0. The main motion passed 13-2.

(M) Clark (S) Knutson to give SEF an additional \$3300. There was discussion. (M) Arceneaux (S) Markoff to call for the question. P 12-1. The main motion passed 13-1.

Mr. Terry appointed a Dorm Committee chaired by Mr. Knutson and Mr. Rhoads, to prepare a document pertaining to the Visitation Policy and the rule that all students under 21 years of age must live in the dorm, unless they are living at home, to be presented to the Regents at their May meeting. Students appointed to the committee are Mr. Knutson, Mr. Rhoads, Mr. Ruff, Mr. Goldstein, Mr. Arceneaux, Mr. Bowman, Mr. Lindberg, and Miss Janes.

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# "All Hail Lysistrata"

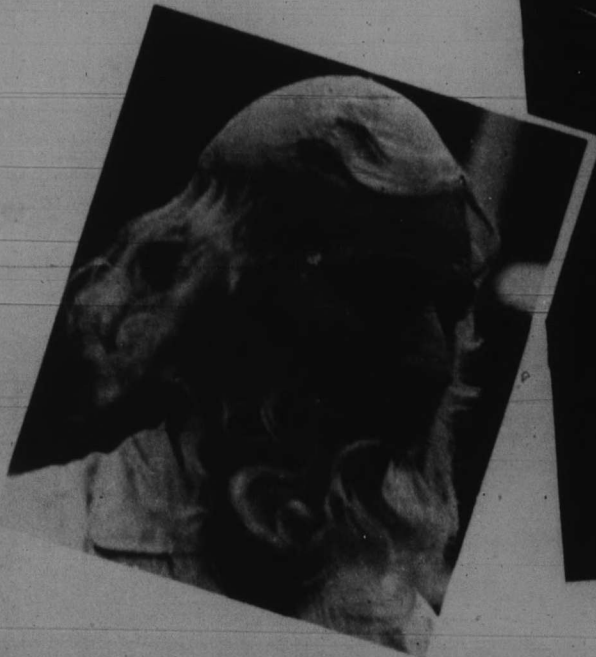

"All hail Lysistrata!" It was on just that note Aristophanes, Gilbert Seldes, and Dr. Jerry Crawford ended the slightly "naughty" uproariously hilarious comedy-tragedy devoted to "She Who Puts an End to War". It is on the same note that congratulations are extended to the above-mentioned gentlemen: to Mr. Aristophanes for his timeless, poignant, soul-searching, soul-searing indictment against the incredulous fervor of man's inhumanity to man (and most especially to himself); to Mr. Seldes for his modern translation of this corner stone of satire which is packed full of "todayisms in spite of yesterday". It blends politely the idea of antiquity with the fear of tomorrow; to our own Dr. Jerry Crawford who, with definite "sock-it-to-me" tactics, rocks the Acropolis, and points ever so sharply the inevitability of truth. Truth in literature, truth in the theatre, whether fortunate or unfortunate, and truth in man are overpowering forces in this lively and timely production. The parallels between Lysistrata's predicament and the predicament of our own time of war and civil disturbance are only too obvious. Is there an answer, even if only temporary? That's the question for Lysistrata.

As Lysistrata, Miss Elizabeth Wilson displayed a finely developed sense of control, power, strength of purpose, and leadership while somehow managing to maintain a paradoxically fine balance of femininity, poise, and frothy yet heavy charm. She would not have had to blow in anyone's ear to be followed anywhere, rather just whisper sweet somethings or bat a pretty eyelash. There was only a moment near the final resolution in which she seemed to hesitate. This encompassed an abrupt lessening of pace which created a somewhat awkward moment for the entire cast.

Although presenting some of the high points of comedy in the show, the chorus of old women arouse such pathos that even a war spear would wince. Led by Miss Ernestine Elms, Mrs. Carolyn Sue Pfaffl, Miss

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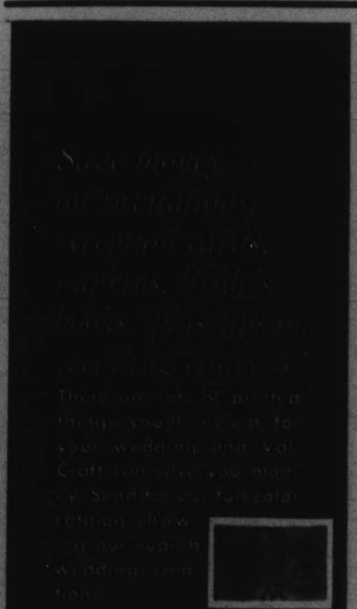
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# UNLV to Provide Clark County Teachers

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas may soon be providing a majority of Clark County's public school teachers.

Within a matter of years, U.N.L.V.'s College of Education will produce hundreds of

well-trained teachers to meet a growing student population here, according to Dr. John M. Vergiels, director of the student teaching program for secondary education.

"The student teaching program gives our future teachers the vital on-the-job experience they'll need when they enter the demanding teaching profession," Vergiels said.

Presently, some 45 students are teaching in high schools and another 36 are gaining experience in elementary schools. Two hundred are expected to be teaching next year, and 350 to 400 the following year.

"With the experience that comes with teaching, our students will soon be able to work themselves into full teaching loads and responsibilities," Vergiels explained.

Education students at U.N.L.V. are now required to student teach in a Clark County school for one semester during their senior year. Students instruct one class in their major field of study and one in their minor. Plans call for a full-day of teaching soon.

"Student teaching aids both the community and the student," Vergiels said. "Not only do our students gain invaluable experience, but the community gains by having bright, young people with new

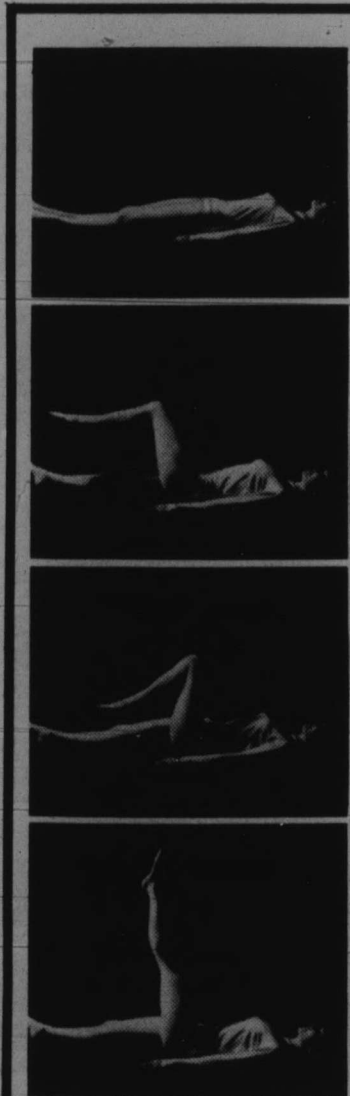
ideas working it its schools.

The student teachers from U.N.L.V. are under the joint supervision of the public school teachers and their own college supervisors. Working for class credit and experience only, they participate fully in the public school's schedule and are encouraged to attend special activities and regular faculty meetings.

"We have many potential innovators in our student teaching program," he commented. "Their attitudes are positive and optimistic. They have to be if they're going to meet the bold, aggressive leadership which will be demanded of future teachers.

"We're in the midst of a teaching revolution with changes in methods and instruction," Vergiels noted. "Clark County's schools are very progressive in both teaching concepts and building techniques. All this is directed at helping children learn."

The concepts of progressive education are now available to U.N.L.V. student teachers, Vergiels emphasized. No longer will Clark County's public school teachers be the products of out-of-state universities.



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## PROCTOR PROMOTES OSS

Gifford Proctor has done his fair share for the Office of Strategic Services.

He contributed both his citizenship and his artistry to the OSS long before accepting his post as director of the Donald C. Moyer Student Union at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

As professional sculptor, Proctor designed the OSS "General William J. Donovan Medal," which is awarded by the service's veterans each year to an outstanding citizen of the world.

The 5 by 3/4-inch likeness of "Wild Bill" Donovan, the first commanding officer of OSS, has been presented to such dignitaries as Dwight D. Eisenhower, Allan Dulles and Everett Dirksen.

Proctor creates the medal's original form in plaster of paris. He then casts the work in bronze.

By repeating the process yearly, he is able to include both the name of each recipient and the date of presentation upon the award itself.

Among the details surrounding the figure of Donovan, dressed in a field jacket, are the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross and other awards which the World War I hero received.

As a citizen, Proctor served as Operations Officer in Company D of the 2677th Regiment of the OSS Allied armies in Italy during World War II.

In this capacity, he organized and developed an essential branch of the OSS from which he conducted air, ground and sea operations in both frontal and behind the line actions.

Proctor coordinated various Italian partisan groups in addition to American undercover agents. His spy operations include night air drops, receiving and sending coded signals to agents, obtaining enemy action reports and secret offshore

boat patrols.

In addition, he directed special campus training for agents throughout Italy.

His ability to operate in the fields of infiltration and supply where he "contributed invaluable information to Allied military forces," won him the Bronze Star from the American government and knightship in the order of the Saints Maurizio e Lazzaro from the government of Italy.

At the University, Proctor brings unique qualifications to the directorship of the student union.

Lee Strange, Miss Shayne Collins and Mrs. Annette Goldstein, they often had one uncertain whether his tears were of mirth or of sorrow. Through them the long range detrements of conflict were evidenced. The deep, hear-felt anguish of death and loneliness could be seen even through the comedy situations in which they participated.

The young women, the selfish young, interested in the pleasure of now, though often more than hilarious, contrasted with the old women as Dr. Crawford and Mr. Aristophanes so competently did, could not refrain from exposing the temporality of life, and the futility of war on vainglorious fronts. Trudi Smolens, as Kalonika, was exceptionally sumptuous in her sincere efforts to separate from sex. Her beguiling guile was glibly glossed by actress and director. Chris Evans, as Myrrina, ran the gamut gamely. Her near meeting of the sexes with her husband Kinesias, portrayed more than ably by Herb Fitzpatrick, was tantalizing to say the least.

The jiving, rocking, Spartan envoy, Ken Zinc, was anything but Thieveless, and had the house in stitches. Nearly all the characters were well into the production, and the majority of the performances were relatively good and fairly even.

Todd Dougall's set was well used by the cast. The construction of the set was rather interesting in the perspective effect it gave. Even at the close of the play, with the entire cast on, the stage did not have its usual crowded appearance, very effectively done. Special congratulations to the Technical Director, Mrs. JoAnn Meswarb, who always manages to overcome the lack of facilities and equipment without letting any of her problems show.

In his program note, Dr. Crawford points out some of the similarities between the music of Aristophanes' time and ours. In this entire production, he heavy handedly melds the periods into well-punctuated statements of unquestionable similitude. How much of the production is Mr. Aristophanes, how much is Mr. Seldes, and how much is Dr. Crawford, might be open to argument. One thing not open to argument is the energy and vibrancy of Lysistrata.

I particularly found Dr. Crawford's addition of "rock music", and use of a modified chorus to be interesting. He handled the use of mixture of styles, semi-realistic, and modified presentations extremely well, at times very subtly. The cast seemed to be working for each other and the show, and evidenced fine control even in the fight scenes.

Aristophanes, according to Dr. Crawford, becomes today. Lysistrata becomes now. It is a play full of life. It is a play full of comment and questions. It is a play well worth seeing.
