UNLV MUSEUM

RECEIVES \$18,000

The community will continue to have a first-rate museum of natural history thanks to the civic-mindedness of the Junior League, Inc. of Las Vegas.

Representatives of the women's volunteer organization presented a gift of \$18,000 recently to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas to finance the growing museum for the next 18 months.

The recently-enlarged museum operated by UNLV has become a favorite visiting spot for children and adults with its collections of Indian artifacts, archeological and geologic displays.

UNLV President Roman J. Zorn accepted a check at an informal ceremony at the museum from Mrs. Joanne Kelly, chairman of the league's projects committee. Members of the University Board of regents, administrators from the campus and local friends of the museum attended the presentation.

The Junior League, which has long identified with the museum and assisted in the creation of the first museum society, raised the money through special benefits and from sales at its thrift shop. "We feel we are taking the community's funds and rechanneling them back into the community," stated Mrs. Kelly. "A fine museum can be one of the greatest assets of any city."

"The 110-member league will continue to assist the university with volunteer work at the museum in the coming years.

Located across the street from the main campus, the museum has specialized its exhibits to illustrate the story of man and nature in this region so as to give a better understanding of the heritage of Southern Nevada.

The museum first opened its doors almost four years ago with displays of geologic materials, live fish and reptiles and archeological artifacts. Last fall, its operation was transferred from the Desert Research Institute to UNLV and since then, staff members have been busily assembling new display cases, painting the building's interior and enlarging the museum into a second room.

Among the new exhibits are items found along the Old Spanish Trail from the time of the first travelers in this area; artifacts from early Indian and white settlers; guns and mining equipment used in Southern Nevada during the 1800's; prehistoric fossils from the time when the region was an inland sea; and mammals found here today.

Last year, more than 12,000 people toured the museum to view its many reptiles and historical exhibits. Even more visitors are expected to flock through the building this year.

The museum is open from 1 to 5 p.m. on weekdays, 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Saturdays and 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays. Tours may be arranged during the morning hours.

Primaries for the offices of President, Vice-President and Treasurer will be held the 23 and 24 of March. The polls will be located at the circular information desk in the Moyer Student Union. In order to vote, students must be registered at UNLV and have paid their CSUN activity fee. The voter must show some form of Identification and his or her name must be included in the IBM list of CSUN students.

The candidates for President are Stephen Brittle, Lloyd Gangwer, Mike Mason, Patt Medchill, Ralph Montgomery and Joe Spears.

Mike Malone, a registered candidate for the office, will not be permitted to run because of a technical default.

Malone's G.P.A. score is a few points below that of the required average for a candidate. However, a grade from last semester failed to be entered on his record. This grade would sufficiently raise his G.P.A. for eligibility as a candidate. According to Malone, Dr. Donald Baepfer, Vice-President of Academic Affairs, recommended that the grade not be entered now because it would be considered as tampering with University documents.

For the office of Vice-President the candidates are Dave Cook, Bruce Daines, Al Duncan, Shayne Skipworth, John Tofano and Ronald M. Tully.

In the true spirit of student activism the candidate for Treasurer is Ed Crow.

If a candidate receives more than 50% of the votes in the primary election, he will be declared the winner. The ballots will be counted by the Election Board, a CSUN representative, and an administrative representative.

The candidates securing the most votes in the general election shall be declared the winner. In the event of a tie, a vote shall be taken in the Student Senate. A simple majority will determine the winner.

WHERE I SIT - - - - - -THE ELECTIONS

The Administration strikes again.

In its continued effort to keep student government free of long haired, radical hippies, once again the administration has succeeded in keeping same out of office.

I'm referring to Mike Malone, former candidate for the CSUN presidency. He had to withdraw from the race last week. It seems (according to Malone) last semester Mike added a three hour independant studies course to his schedule. When his grades came from the registrar, no grade had been entered for his course. Mike expected this would cause no difficulties as GPA's are rarely checked during elections. But this year they were checked. A 2.0 GPA is necessary to run for office. Mike tried to get the grade entered, but to no avail. His case was referred to Dr. Baepler, Vice-President for academic affairs. According to

Malone, Baepler's decision was that to enter a grade at this late date for a course which he was taking at this time (Malone had re-registered in order to get credit for the work he had done) might be construed as tampering with University Records.

I was going to use this week's editorial to endorse a candidate for president. This miscarriage of justice has left me without a candidate I wish to support. With Malone out of the race, the other candidates look like yesterday's jello.

BAYER UPSETS FAN

Letter to the Editor:

Head basketball coach John Bayer owes an apology to UNLV students and to Rebel fans in the community.

The apology is due because remarks Bayer has made to the local news media are insulting, untrue, and a breach of the rules of coaching etiquette.

At the end of the recent basketball season, Bayer blamed his mediocre record on UNLV students, Las Vegas fans, the local news media, and Convention Center.

The students and fans were at fault because they were not enthusiastic supporters. (It is hard to be enthusiastic over a 14-12 season, UNLV's worst in 11 years.) The news media was wrong because it didn't offer enough coverage. The Convention Center was wrong because it offered no home court advantage and the Rebels couldn't practice enough there.

All of Bayer's allegations are nonsense. Only a sense of propriety prevents me from using a stronger and more appropriate term than "nonsense."

UNLV students and fans in the community support Rebel basketball to the extent that UNLV home attendance figures are 50% higher than any other WCAC team. The two local newspapers award UNLV more headlines, photographs, and articles, than do any other newspapers for any other WCAC schools. Bayer even has his own radio and TV shows, and all the local broadcasting outlets give UNLV generous coverage. And Bayer's two predecessors, Rolland Todd and Ed Gregory earned bonanza records playing at Convention Center with the same practice problems suffered by Bayer.

Before the season started, Bayer gloated to the local media about how good his team would be. This was a violation of traditional coaching etiquette. A

prudent coach makes no glowing predictions because he never knows what will happen during the season to ruin his promises of success. But Bayer overpromoted the expectations of fans and students from the start, and they were justifiably angry when UNLV waded through another dismal season. Bayer has no one beyond himself to blame for the abundant jeers he received during the season, yet he tried to shunt the blame off onto the students, fans, media, and Convention Center.

For this, Bayer owes the students and fans an apology. If none is forthcoming from him soon, the student government should withhold funds from the basketball program and demand Bayer's dismissal. His conduct

can be redeemed only by an apology for his abusive and improper condemnation of the students and fans, and by an admission of his own responsibility for coaching UNLV down the path to basketball oblivion.

It's your turn, John Bayer. Do you apologize?

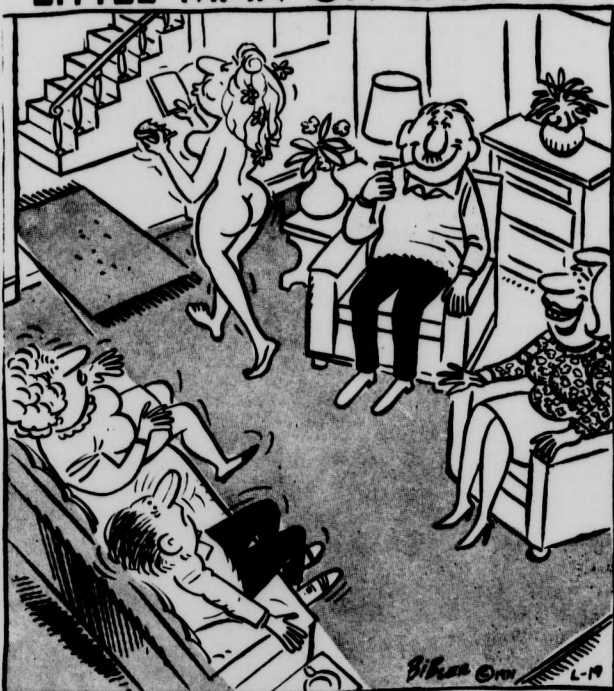

Committee report

UNLV ROTC Not Approved

During the past two months, a committee composed of students, faculty and administrators has been examining the possibility of initiating an ROTC program at the UNLV campus. I feel that the committee represented a broad spectrum of attitudes (one faculty member is a retired officer who attained his officer status through an ROTC program and one administrator is a former Navy commander) and that the committee report and recommendation is a fair evaluation of the situation at UNLV at the present time.

We are aware, of course, that interest and enrollment in ROTC programs has steadily declined since World War II and that during the current academic year fewer students are enrolled in ROTC programs than at any time since World War II. Recent statistics indicate the following ROTC enrollments: 1958-69, 212,417; 1969-70, 155,946; 1970-71, 109,598; 1971-72, 83,130. Despite the drastic reduction in

numbers, Assistant Defense Secretary Roger T. Kelley indicates that he expects no shortage of officers for the armed services. Mr. Kelley indicates that the services are shrinking in size and need fewer officers.

It appears that ROTC programs have suffered particularly in urban universities that lack a large number of residential students living on campus. The University of Nevada, Las Vegas, is of course, an urban university with most of the students commuting to campus at various times throughout the day to attend their classes. As is typical of urban universities, a very high percentage of our students are employed in Las Vegas on either a full or part-time basis. A survey conducted last fall indicated that at least seventy percent of our students are thus employed. Since the survey included both men and women, we would assume that the percentage of male students employed is higher than the per-

centage of female students employed.

The committee also noted that alternatives are available to those students who wish to be involved with the military during their academic careers. For example, the Army Reserve unit in Las Vegas is actively recruiting students on our campus for participation in its program. The reserve program is open to students without prior military experience and represents not only an avenue for involvement with the military but also provides an opportunity for students to earn some money each month for their participation. Additionally, those students who wish to become officers can participate in programs with the various branches of the military wherein by active involvement with the military during summers, the student can receive a commission when he graduates from the University. It is my understand-

ing that several students have participated in this program and have been commissioned upon graduation from UNLV.

An informal survey conducted by the committee in freshman P.E. classes composed of male students indicates a very limited interest in participation in ROTC programs. In fact, the interest indicated on the part of these students would cast doubt on our ability to generate enough officers through the ROTC route to have the initiation of such a program be acceptable to any of the armed forces. I must point out that the survey indicated no great hostility towards the presence of ROTC on campus, but rather an indifference with less than five percent of the students indicating possible enrollment in the program even at the freshman level. Finally, whereas we recognize that ROTC programs do not re-

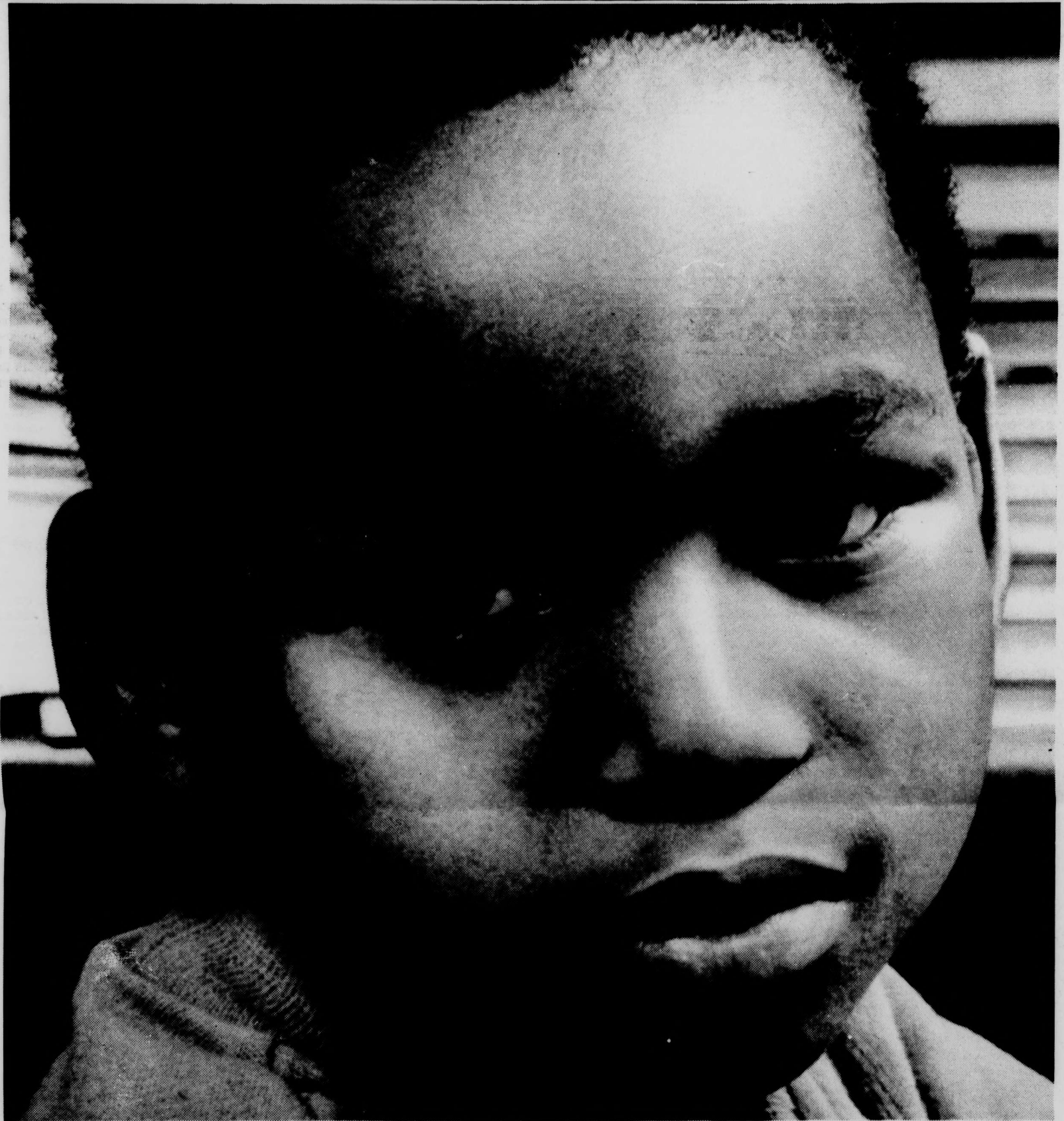

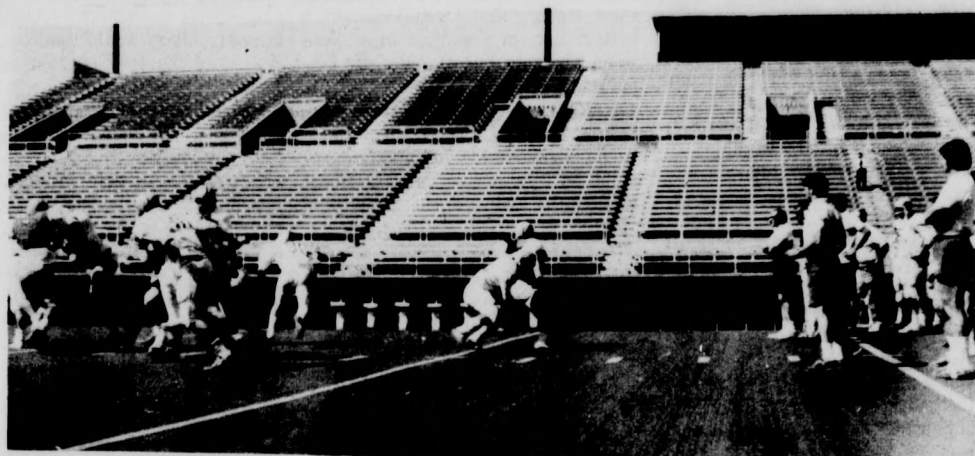


Photo taken at last Saturday's intra squad practice. Shown in photo are the coaching staff and offensive unit led by QB Jim Starkes.

The UNLV golf team took a three way match at the Dunes against Utah State and Chapman College on Saturday. UNLV managed a low total of 316, while Utah State was 9 strokes off the pace with a 325 and Chapman was 24 behind with a team total of 340.

Bob Cork shot a low of 74 for the Rebs.

The team does not play at home again until April 7 in a league game against Pepperdine at the Las Vegas Country Club.

TRACK

The Rebels finished first thru third in the Shotput and the discus throw, but managed only 5 wins in 17 events as Montana State captured victories in 11 of the remaining 12 events to take a triple meet victory over UNLV and Chapman College. Montana scored 95 and a half points to the Reb's 68 and a half. Chapman College, managing only one win was last with 11 points.

Kevin Patterson established a new University mark in the triple jump with a 46 feet and a quarter inch effort. Patterson was also second in the javelin with a 173 foot toss and managed a second as well in the high jump with a 6'2" effort. UNLV also managed a first in the mile relay and Mel Turner took a first in the 440 with a 50.1 second run.

The UNLV track team travels to California's Claremont College over the weekend for the Claremont Relays. The team will have a 3 way meet, April 15th on their home field at 1 p.m.

While basking away in the sun either Friday and/or Saturday watching the Rebels play St. Mary's one may develop a case of the munchies. So this article is dedicated on how to make that great munchie quencher Italian Brownies.

Makes 15, 2 inch squares

You'll need:

- 2 Ounces (2 squares) unsweetened chocolate
- 1 stick butter (1/2 cup)
- 1/4 cup cleaned Oregano (very optional)
- or 1/4 cup other herb (not so optional)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup sifted cake flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 3 eggs

Steps:

1. Preheat oven to 325 F.
2. Grease a pan approx. 10x6x2
3. Put chocolate and butter into mixing bowl and set into oven to melt. Take out, beat in sugar. Add eggs one at a time and beat well after each addition. Stir in vanilla.
4. Combine flour and baking powder and stir into mixture. Stir in chopped nuts, and the not so optional herb.
5. Turn into baking pan and bake in preheated oven for 30 minutes, or until cake tester (a toothpick) comes out clean. Remove, let cool, and go nuts.

P.S. I've never tried this recipe with Oregano, so if any of you are brave enough to try it let me know what it tastes like.

UNLV Baseball Team Drops 2 of First 3 League Games to Lions

The UNLV baseball team dropped a single game on Friday and managed a split with Loyola on Saturday's doubleheader.

The Loyola Lions scored twice off losing Rebel pitcher Jim "Bones" Bonnell and then held the Rebs to 6 hits in their 2-0 decision. The Rebels had many chances to score as they left 11 baserunners stranded during the 9 inning contest. The winner for the Lions was McNaugh who walked 9 Rebels and had 6 KOs as he evened his season mark at 3-3. Bonnell, who allowed only 1 earned run as he fanned 5 and walked only one Lion, is now 1-1.

The Lions took the opener of Saturday's doubleheader, 4-1 and the Rebs managed a come from behind, 5-4 victory in the afternoon game. In the opener, Herb Pryor allowed only 3 earned runs as he fanned 7 and issued only 1 walk. However, the Lions behind 3 pitchers allowed only 1 run

as they combined to allow the Rebs only 5 hits. It was Pryors third loss in five decisions.

In the second game Jack Lazarotto went the full 7 innings for the Rebs as he allowed only 2 earned runs in route to his 3rd win of the season. The Rebs scored 3 times in the 6th inning on an error, three walks, and Di-Fiores 2 run scoring hit. Rebel centerfielder, Art Platanitis, stole his ninth base of the season and is now only 2 off the season mark held by former Rebel Al Walker.

The Rebels are now 8-8-1 on the season and 1-2 in league play. St. Mary's also a league opponent visits our university diamond on Friday for a single conference game and Saturday for a doubleheader at noon. Then the Rebels travel to S.F. for three games on the 29-30th of the month.

With the 4 frosh, 3 red shirts, 10 returning varsity players and 6 recruits, that will be a total of 23 players on scholarships or 2 complete traveling squads. It is obvious that only 1/2 of these athletes can even suit up. However, we must wait until next fall to find out who.

USF Takes 3rd in Far West Regionals

The University of San Francisco, after losing to powerful Long Beach State, defeated the representatives of the Big Sky Conference, Weber State, to take third place in the Far West playoffs. USF was paced by Mike Quick with 24 points and Phil Smith with 17. in the 74-64 decision.

Bob Davis led the losers with 21. In the finals, UCLA destroyed LBS 73-57. UCLA's attack was

led by all tourney selections Henry Bibby and John Walton, who scored 23 and 19 points respectively. Ed Ra'ief led Long Beach State's effort with 17. He joined the all tourney team of Quick, Davis, Walton and Bibby. UCLA will now face Louisville, as they continue in their drive for a 4th straight national championship.

quire an undue amount of University resources, we feel that the twenty to thirty thousand dollars per year and the space occupied by the program is still vitally needed in other academic areas which are under-equipped and which need to raise their levels of quality to more acceptable standards.

Given, then, the extreme national drop in ROTC enrollments and programs, the urban nature of our campus with the high percentage of employed students, the cost factor involved, the gen-

eral lack of interest among beginning male students, the committee recommends that ROTC not be initiated on this campus at the present time. We feel that, if desirable, the alternative pathways available to students who have an interest in this area could be better advertised to the incoming freshmen and that the University certainly is in a position to cooperate with any of the several branches of the military to facilitate active student participation in their programs on a voluntary basis.

According to Mrs. James Hill, Friends of Channel 10 president, the name of the auctioneer is being held back as a surprise to be announced later.

Before assuming his present executive position with the NAEB Chalmers was for five years executive director of Educational Television Stations (ETS), a division of the NAEB.

He came to ETS from WTTW, the educational television station in Chicago where he was director of programming. He joined WTTW in 1955 as producer-director and later became the station's director of develop-

ment. Prior to that he was a local and network television director and producer for WBBM-TV and WGN-TV, both Chicago, and previously an announcer and director at local Illinois radio stations.


Instrumental in the establishment of the Educational Television Stations Program Service, which now supplies some 25,000 programs a year to all PTV stations, Marquis also played an active role in fostering the creation of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and the extension of the grants program which provides matching grants for public radio and TV equipment.

Marquis has also served as chairman of the National Educational Television Affiliates Committee. In addition, he has functioned as a teacher, consultant, and researcher in various phases of educational television.


A native of Bloomington, Illinois Marquis holds degrees from the University of Chicago and the University of Illinois. He now lives in Falls Church, Virginia with his wife and two sons.

Goal of the Friends of Channel 10 is to raise enough funds from their venture to enable Channel 10 to expand its schedule to seven days a week and to make additional funds available for more local production.
