For Reference des 10/9/73 REGENTS MOVE ON CSUN MONEY

This morning a special closed door meeting of top level university administrators and the student body presidents from to discuss the move made by Chancellor Neil Humphrey that resulted in the administration having the final say on how student funds will be spent.

While the results of today's meeting are not known at this time the indication from both administrators and regents is that from this point on complete control of student funds will be taken out of the hands of the students.

But, Humphrey says, "I don't feel the administration will misuse their responsibility in a way that will limit academic freedom."

However, Dan Wade, student body president, says he wants a guarantee, "something in writing, so that control of the lecture and concert series is in the hands of the students and not the administration,"

The controversary started brewing six months ago when Humphrey sent a memoran-

dum to Dr. Donald Baepler, acting president of the Las Vegas campus. The letter requested that Beapler take the student funds from the "separate bank

account" and deposit them in the university's "agency account."

The agency acount, accord-ing to the UNLV administrator's manual," consists of funds in the custody of the institution but not belonging to it."

In requesting the change, Humphrey used as his reason, "expenditures by CSUN of monies for loans to students to use to pay bail bond premiums."

Humphrey's "request" came three weeks after the student senate voted to loan money to those students who were busted during a controversial campus dope raid and could not raise their own bail.

The student senate's action, according to one source close to the scene, "sent the Board of Regents into a rage."

The source said that many of the regents demanded immediate action after finding out student funds had been used for "pot smokers." But Humphrey says the use of

the student funds for bail simply alerted him to the fact that UNLV was not following the rules. In his capacity as ex officio treasurer of the university he had the authority to change the financial structure of the student funds.

Humphrey was asked if he would change it back, and he said not without an order from the Board of Regents.

ing Humphrey says the Board of Regents will discuss the matter, and he assumes a vote will be taken when the board meets in Reno on the 19th of this month.

While an informal poll indicates that some of the regents would be willing to compromise in some way, way, it is expected that Humphrey's action will be supported by the regents and the university administration will from this point on have the final say on how student funds are spent.



Pre-Law Association Meeting

On Tuesday, October 2, there was a meeting of the Pre-Law Association. The group was organized last year in an effort to consolidate those students desiring to obtain a legal education, and directing their energy toward common goals.

Among the things announced was a special LSAT review session next Saturday, October 13, from 10 am until 2 pm. It will be held in the West Lounge of the Student Union Building.



Mike Taylor, president of the association explained the progress made in the organiztions' main objective, a law school in Nevada. The core of the work now is aimed at convincing the 1975 Legislature that Nevada should have a law school, and raising the financial backing so important in initiating this project. Discussing the visiting law sc-

hool representatives this year, Dr. Ralph Roske, one of the two faculty advisors for the assoc-iation, said prospects were bleak. The only scheduled visit so far is McGeorge Law School from Seattle. Sometimes these visits are the only way for law school hope-

fuls to come in personal contact with a law school. Thus, the push for our own.

Dr. Lorne Seidman, the association's other advisor, em-phasized that the only kind of law school discussed for Nevada is a good, accredited one. It is not a matter of Nevada residents "get-ting a break." Rather we just won't be penalized for living in Nevada.

The Board of Regents has app-ointed a committee to study the proposed law school.

This week's elections will be for the college representives and the two Freshman Senators. In the college of business only one candidate filed for the three seats open.


With four seats open in the College of Education, three students filed to run.

In the College of Hotel Administration, the two open Senate spots are being contested by three candidates.


Besides the Freshman class race, the only other close contest will be for the two College of Al ied Health Professions seats, Six students have filed to run from that college.



That action provoked outrage from students and the community. What is alarming, is that the Regents may be forced into a decision that is political y motivated; therefore detrimental to the future of the University of Nevada,

No mistake, the mixture of heroin, prominent students, and

schlorship money is a very serious thing. The punishment sho-uld fit the crime. The economic repression of 15,000 college students, in the state of Nevada, is over-doing it. The Board of Regents wants to look good; so does the Governor and the UNLV Administration. If they take a "get-tough" stance, budding political careers will not only be salvaged, but given a board boost.

That, is what this editorial is all about. While the placing of CSUN funds in a Regent controlled agency account is prima facie absurd, its consequences are dire for the future for the future of the Nevada universities.

Politics is the crux of the matter. Anyone who has followed local politics knows that the Board of Regents is being used as a political stepping stone.

A lot of money has gone into recent Board campaigns, and the electioneering rhetoric used evoked images that had nothing to do with such a conservative campus as UNLV.

Not just the CSUN money decision, but all future Regent actions will have to be examined closely due to the recent politicalization

will have to be examined closely due to the recent politicalization of that body. If, CSUN funds are to be controlled by the Board of Regents; and if the Board continues to be a political creature, the Nev-ada universities will become political footballs, subject to the caprice and ambitions of its governors,

The solution is threefold: 1) Each campus must see to it that gross illegalities do not occur. 2) Those Regents who do not respect the non-partisanship of the Board should resign. 3) The Board of Regents should become an appointive body.

Present members who indeed respect the non-political intent of the Board of Regents should remain. Criteria for new appoin-tees should include a demonstrated lack of interest in political glory.

You exercise YOUR power or,


2. Someone else will exercise theirs.



1 package powdered pectin (such as Sure-Jell) cup lemon juice


4 1/2 cups sugar







NEED TUTORIAL ASSIST ANCE????? Public Law 91-219 contained significant liberalizations of the

Veterans Administration educational programs. Increases in benefits were granted to al students enrolled in such educational programs. In addition, some provisions of the law introduced new programs related to special needs of certain veterans. One of these programs was tutorial assistance.

If you are a veteran attending school here on a half-time or more basis, and you are heading toward failure in one of your

classes, then this program is just right for you. The tutorial assistance payments ar in addition to the regular monthly rate of educational assistance allowance and does not involve any charge against your entitlement.

You may receive up to \$50 monthly until a maximum of \$450 has been paid during your eligibility. These payments are in addition to your regular monthly payments. The purpose of this allowance is to help the student avoid

failure in a course which is necessary for the attainment of his

objective. It may not be used to improve satisfactory grades in ord r to raise academic standing.

Why fail a course, or receive a grade of "D", because you could not afford a tutor when a program such as this is avila ble? If you could use the assistance of a trained tutor and desire to receive VA benefits, here is all you need to do: (1) Contact your professor if you are in danger of failing a course.

Your professor will recommend a qualified tutor and certify

that you are deficient in the subject. (2) Visit the Veterans Counselor, Mr. Nick Paul, and obtain the necessary form required to receive your benefits, Mr. Paul's office is located on the third floor of the Humanities Building.

(3) Locate your tutor and arrange for individual instruction at a time and place convenient for you.





fundamental errors of execution. So, in preparing for the Indians of Northeast Louisiana, Coach Meyer and his "slave-driven" staff set out to correct those errors. But more important, they were determined to reassure the players of their abilities and point out the dozens of things they did right against Utah State.

The weekly schedule is basically the same in any given week once the season begins. It is part of an overall plan diligently prepared for the Rebel football players. The plan includes the mailing of 8 letters between May and August to the placers keeping them informed on the upcoming season. Once they begin practicing as a team, they get, among other things, guidelines and counseling on studying, nutrition and suggestions for conduct.



There are few "strict" rules, such as curfews or a ban on smok-ing or drinking. "We counsel the players that smoking and drinking are hazardous to their health," says Meyer, "and that their rest is vital for maximum performance. They are expected to follow these common-sense guidelines. If for some reason an individual is hurting himself and the team, then I will take ad-ministrative action." This could be putting a man from first team to second team, second to third

It's all part of an effort to go first class. As an illustration, Coach Meyer used the upcoming Hawaii trip. "If somebody, for example, comes in with cut-offs and a body shirt and no shoes, I'm going to ask him if he thinks that's first class, if he'd dress like that, say, to meet a prospective employer. If he wouldn't, I'm going to expect a change. If he would, we're going to have to sit down and discuss it, with

The Rebels haven't disappointed Meyer. "The men on this UNLV team know what first class is and have conducted themselves in a way in which this staff, team and University can be proud." The beginning of the Rebel pre-paration against Northeast Louisiana for Oct. 6th came Saturday night, the 29th of September. in Las Vegas, the team tries to put the loss against Utah State behind them. In Louisiana, a UNLV scout watches Northeast Louisiana University.



On Sunday morning at 7:00 a.m., the game films are picked up. There are two sets of prints, each on four reels, and one is sent to Northeast Louisiana in exchange for a copy of their film. While the Rebel coaching staff spends the morning evaluating their game, the UNLV scout grades and charts the game he had seen the night before.

At 1:00 p.m. the injured players report to the trainer and at 3:00 p.m. the team meets for practice, something not commonly done in most football programs. The practice is short, designed basically to force the lactic acid out of the muscles and keep everyone stretched out. At 3:45 p.m. the players hit the showers and around 4:00 p.m. they watch the films from the night before, get-ting a general analysis of the game from the coaching staff. Betwen 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. the team eats dinner. In Louisiana, our scout is on the way with an evaluation of our upcoming opponents. Starting around 8:00 p.m., and finishing in the early morning hours, Northeast Louisiana is analyzed and reanalyzed, each coach concentrating on his responsibility.

On Monday morning and early afternoon, the Rebel players filter into the football office to discuss the previous week as well as the upcoming week with the coach who has the responsibility for him.

Practice begins at 3:00 p.m. It is a light practice, a little bit longer than Sunday's, to prepare the players for the rigorous program on Tuesday and

Wednesday. Each day there is a particular thought which the team tries to focus on, and they change from week to week. Today it's positive thinking, concentration and the fundamentals.

After practice, the team eats dinner together, as they do every day of the season.

Tuesday and Wednesday are the most demanding practice days for the team. This is when the heavy contact is made and the players closely simulate game conditions. The practice runs well over two hours and includes individual improvement, team calisthenics and scrimmage contests where the defense and offense practice game situations. Midway in the practice is a water break, in whichthe players wet their whistles and catch a breath. The thought for Tues-day is improvement and Wednesday is aspirations.

Following practice on Monday and Wednesday, the "heavies," the linemen, leinebackers and so on, work out with weights. This is basically done to conserve the strength they are constantly tearing at during practice over the course of the long season. On Tuesday and Thursday the safeties, recievers and the men

who rely on their quickness, con-verge on the weight room. Thursday's thought is knowledge of direction, creative thinking, dissolving emotional blackouts and generally understanding one's self. The workout runs approximately two hours, and the hitting is subdued. The allout contact is over until the contest Saturday night.

Integrity, adherence to a code of values, and analyzing whether or not one is giving his utmost are the things the team considers on Friday.

The practice is short and by about 4:00 p.m. the team has showered and packed for the game the following day.

On Saturday, the team meets at 3:00 p.m. and is together for the rest of the day. The stress is on the growth of the total human being and the players drive toward competitive greatness. At 4:30 the team have their

pre-game meal and at 5:15 an outside speaker, such as Lt. Governor Harry Reid, makes a brief presentation.

At 5:30 the team is on the bus and on their way to Las Vegas Stadium. At 6:30 the players are taped up and begin dressing and at 7:30 the team stretches their muscles in the locker room. At 7:40 Coach Meyer makes some comments and the team hits the field for calisthenics. Around 8:05, the UNLV captains meet with the captains from Northeast Louisiana for the toss
