## Voting Expected Light

As polling began yesterday, the student turnout to vote in CSUN-Senate elections was expected to be light, reflecting the lack of interest shown by prospective candidates in the race.

With voting set to end at 5 p.m. today, Friday, UNLV students in most colleges are having little choice among candidates because so few filed to run for the 22 available seats.

From the College of Business and Economics and the College of Education not enough candidates filed to fill the available seats.

Three candidates filed for the three available positions in the College of Science and Mathematics.

In most other races barely enough candidates filed to fill available spots, but write-in voting on the part of students seeking more of a choice was rumored.

One exception was the College of Allied Health Professions with six students filing for two seats.

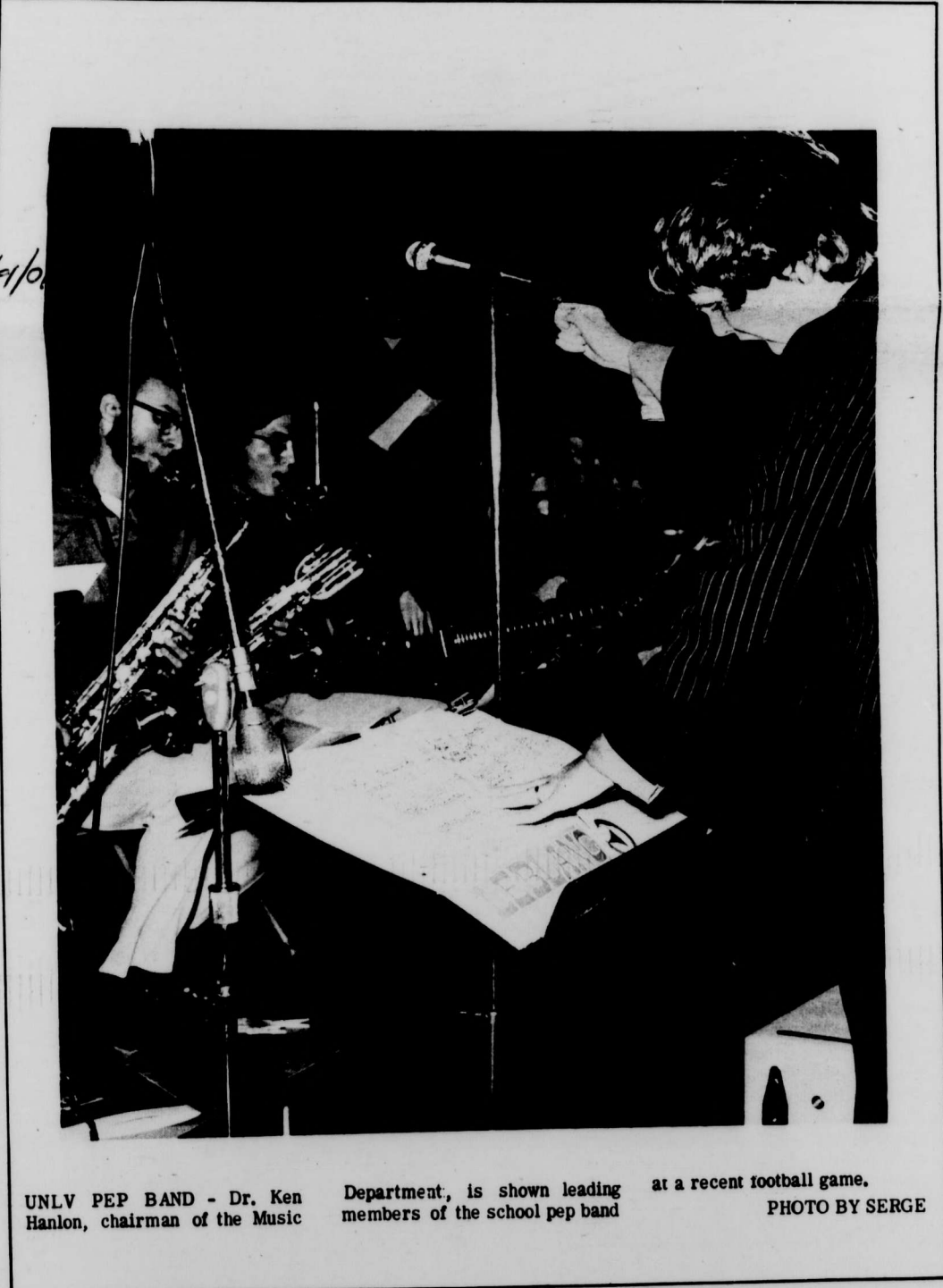
## YELL Is Bi-Weekly

## Students Said Arm Of Regents

Student body governments are not "an independent, autonomous association" according to a "letter of advice" from the state attorney general's office.

Procter Hug, Jr., deputy attorney general, in an opinion requested by the university administration says the student body is simply an "administrative arm of the university" and therefore "under the control of the board of regents."

The basic reason for the administrative request is the growing controversy over who has control of student funds, the university administration or the student governments.

That issue was the subject of a 90 minute meeting of the Chancellor's advisory cabinet this past Tuesday at UNLV.

UNLV student body president, Dan Wade, was in attendance and he said "nothing was resolved" during the discussion and "anything we asked wasn't answered."

Chancellor Neil Humphrey told those in attendance that he will "recommend that the legal and accounting advice received (from Hug) be followed for all student body funds, effective July first of next year."

The new accounting interpretation of Hug's advice, according to Humphrey is, "that although it is appropriate for student body funds to be on deposit with the university (as an agency account) such monies should be in a fund group which

# UNLV Regents to Consider Attorney General Opinion

affords even greater university involvement."

Humphrey also said he will recommend at the regents meeting next week that "further discussions be undertaken with student body presidents to develop a clean and written understanding of the responsibilities of all parties involved."

The chancellor says the object of "such discussions would be to develop procedures which would allow the board of regents to meet its legal obligations for student funds."

At the same time Humphrey says this should be done "with

a minimum of disturbance of the autonomy of student governments." As far as deputy attorney general Hug is concerned, "Student fees collected at registration are actually university funds allocated to student organizations for expenditure." Hug's ruling went on to say that even "a gift to the student body organization is on the same footing as any gift to any department of the university."

Acting UNLV President Dr. Donald Baepler, who was also in attendance at the Tuesday meeting said he believes Humphrey's recommendations will not be spent illegally."

But Baepler added that he did not feel there would be "any questions asked about how the money is spent by the students unless it is a legal question."

After the meeting, Wade said he felt that a rewriting of the student constitution would solve the various problems including the question of expenditure of student funds.

However, since any new constitution will still have to be approved by the Board of Regents, there is still some question about whether or not student governments will continue to be "an administrative arm of the university."

## Recycling Project Organized

Students in a UNLV speech class have decided to organize a clean-up contest in the Vegas Valley for a class project.

The class of 19 students taught by Dr. Steve Nielsen will promote their project using local television, radio and newspapers to reach elementary and sixth grade center students in area schools.

At present, Dr. Nielsen's class is obtaining bikes and other merchandise to be given as prizes.

The project, which will promote the collection of recyclable material, will be between October 29, and December 9, with collection points at three Las Vegas high schools.

Money gained from the sale of bottles and cans will be donated to a local charity or the university scholarship fund.

## Medieval Colloquium

The Medieval and Renaissance Colloquium was organized in the Spring of 1972 by a group of persons interested in furthering the understanding of the Medieval and Renaissance periods of western development.

The Colloquium meets in the Gold Room, Room 112, of the Social Science Building on Monday and Thursday evenings at 7:30 p. m. The format for the meetings is generally broken down into presentation, either a lecture by a faculty member or a panel discussion, followed by a refreshment break and then an open discussion.

The other hotly contested race is for the two Freshman class positions on the CSUN Senate, with nine names on the ballot.

The proposed amendment to the CSUN Constitution would add three more Senators to represent the college to the current total of 28 members.

More than 2000 students are eligible to vote in the Freshman race. They are almost all members of the University College on campus, which gives Freshmen a general class schedule to follow for the year at UNLV until they decide on a major.

Voting booths are located in four areas on campus; inside the Student union, the patio area east of the Social Sciences building, inside the Math and Science building, and in the area generally between the library and Judy Bayley east of the Education Building.

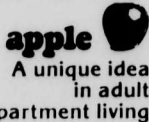
Presently the University College has no representation on the student Senate, but an amendment to change that situation is on the election ballot.

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# Shape of Things to Come?

The YELL and the campus it represents must occasionally be jolted out of their collective insularity. The following article was written by the nationally

known and syndicated columnist William F. Buckley, Jr. It appeared in the October 9 evening edition of the Las Vegas Review-Journal.

Two or three years ago a reclusive and scholarly man of many parts wrote an article suggesting that the United States colonize Libya. Stated thus baldly the proposal is shocking, though of course it is a little less so if understood in a particular context. If it were projected by the statesmen of the world that to permit a stretch of territory to carry on as an international tinderbox would mean world war, it would presumably be better to take control of that country than to suffer the consequences of not doing so. If the head of the United States Secret Service had been mayor of Sarajevo in 1914, who knows, forty million lives might have been spared.

The author of the Libyan proposal argued the stabilizing influence in the Mideast of an American colony, or protectorate, or what have you, and stressed greatly the impact upon Mediterranean naval balance that would result from it. He failed however to stress a distinction which now, with the threat of King Faisal to withhold oil for the west, reiterated by the Arab lobby, it is timely to stress, as we give attention to the inherent rights of nations.

It is an axiom of Christian social thought that the individual human being has the right to live. Translated, let us say into a community in which on the one hand there is abundance and on the other hand starvation, the starving man is not— according to Christian principle— guilty of theft when he takes a loaf of bread from the man who has a loaf to spare. The possibilities of abuse in the application of this rule are obvious: the starving man may take to stealing loaves of bread in preference to working in order to earn the money with which to buy the bread.

And it has a national application. Here we run instantly into what is an injustice of sorts, an injustice which, however, there is nothing to be done about. Just as a weak thief cannot succeed in taking a loaf of bread by force from a strong baker, so a weak nation cannot take oil from a strong nation for the simple reason that the strong nation can successfully resist the effort.

And then the distinction between taking from someone without compensation, and taking from someone with compensati(c). In

national practice, as an exercise of power by the government over its own citizens, the distinction is carried in the words to "nationalize", and to "confiscate." The former is acceptable moral practice, the latter unacceptable.

We come then to focus these points on Mideast oil. As a matter of morals, an industrial nation dependent upon oil to avoid instant mass unemployment, the immobilization of its defense, and ultimately the starvation of its people, has the moral right to force a supplier to sell it the oil it needs. In days gone by, statesmen would be amused at the thought that anyone would painstakingly make the point, so obvious was it. But in days gone by the accepted practice, where Nation B had rice, or wheat, or timber, or gold, was to pit the armed forces of Nation A against those of Nation B for purely acquisitive reasons.

Somewhere along the line, the nations of western Europe should make a preemptive moral strike against hardening Arab policy. It would take the nature of saying: Mideast oil must be made available.

What if the Mideast countries should say no? Should threaten, and perhaps proceed, to close the pipe lines?

Who says A — one should not tire of repeating — must say B. If western Europe has to have the oil, then it has to take whatever means are necessary to acquire it. Yes, that means that the Western military must, at the margin, be prepared to, let us say, land an expeditionary force in Libya.

But having done so, and having turned the faucets back on, the morally distinguishing feature of their enterprise is that they must buy the oil, not take it. Must continue as in the past to pay for the oil to the treasury of the Libyan people. Just so one might have imagined that if it had been essential to western security, the British fleet might have kept open the Suez Canal by force — while continuing to pay tariffs to the Egyptian government.

That analysis should be pressed, quietly and with civility, in the chancelleries of the world. The best thing about making such arguments is that it often results in not having to put the theory into practice.

Few Candidates

### Ho, Hum, CSUN Election Time

As this issue of THE YELL appears on campus, the results of yesterday's and today's CSUN Senate elections is not yet known; since the polls will be open for another several hours.

In light of the pitiful number of candidates running for office this fall, one has to ask what difference it makes whether the polls open or close at all.

In many cases it didn't matter whether students voted or not because there weren't enough (or many more) candidates than there were open senate seats. Seven senators will take office merely by having their names on the ballot. Three more will have to be appointed after the elections since no one filed for the positions.

Of the remaining 12 (out of the 22 senators being elected) only 4 will have faced any kind of tough race to win their office.

What is the reason? One explanation heard from some people involved in student government, is that many incumbent CSUN Senators are not running for re-election; thus reducing the overall number of candidates.

That idea has to rate as about the flimsiest excuse possible. The notion that CSUN can't exist without some of the same old faces is really laughable.

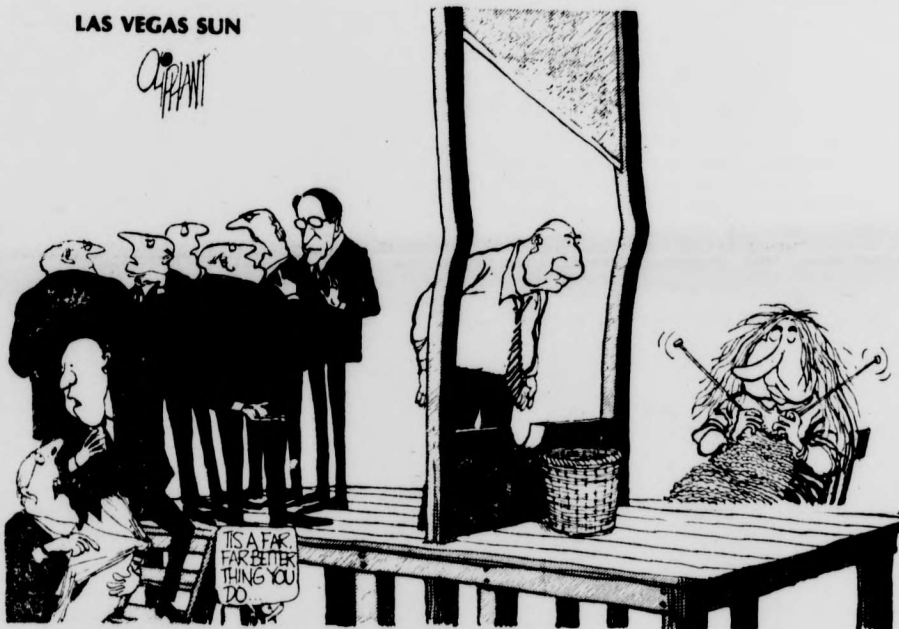
Those interested in, and supportive of, student government might like to believe that another more valid cause is to blame.

Namely, that the elections were organized, announced, and held before students really had a chance to find out what was going on.

This might well be the case, since notice was not given to students until less than two weeks before the elections.

If so, then responsibility for the low candidate turnout is due to student government negligence. If not, do students realize that CSUN needs individual participation to function properly? Do students care?

### Are Nevada Democrats Due for a big fight

Former governor Grant Sawyer was back in Washington, D.C. this last week gathering support for the upcoming senatorial race in Nevada. He was there to see Senator Cannon as well as Senator Bible. This will create some very serious problems.

Almost everyone realizes that Governor Mike O'Callaghan must run for the senate this time or he will be forced to wait until Senator Cannon decides to retire. The problem is that Grant Sawyer actually got the Governor started in Nevada politics. Ex-governor Sawyer made Governor O'Callaghan the first director of the newly created Department of Health, Education, and Welfare for the state of Nevada (now the Department of Human Resources).

From there the Governor went to Washington, D.C. to head the Job Corps program for President Johnson. From there he went to the Governor's Mansion. His performance in all of these positions has been excellent.

The problem is, Grant Sawyer is not getting any younger. This may well be the last chance he has to run for the U.S. Senate. In Nevada, the Senate is the prized carrot that all of the asses strive for. This leaves him with either convincing O'Callaghan not to run or risking a bloody primary, benefitting the Republican ticket.

This opens the box to other candidates for the senate. Former governor Paul Laxalt will run against anyone except Mike O'Callaghan. How pow-

erful is Paul Laxalt? Seven years ago he lost to incumbent Howard Cannon by 54 votes. He also was the Republican to knock off Grant Sawyer in his third term attempt. Governor Laxalt has very strong support up north and moderate strength down here. I believe he could knock off Grant Sawyer or any other democrat, other than the Governor.

The problem is for Grant Sawyer to decide whether he or his party is more important. As his actions last week proved, he wants to try for the Senate regardless of his chances. He must try now because Senator Cannon will probably not retire for many moons.

What could be going through Mike O'Callaghan's mind now? Obviously he wants to be a senator and he has the support from both political parties to be elected. The only problem he has is Grant Sawyer. Will he decide to run against his old friend or will he let him have the nomination? If they both go into the primary, there will be blood spilled. We need only remember the Bilbray-Baring conflict last year.

Whether Grant Sawyer is merely testing the political water or seriously committed to this attempt remains to be seen.

I believe, if he runs against the Governor, he would face the very real risk of being knocked off in the general election by Paul Laxalt. Even if he does win, which is very doubtful, I believe he will be keeping the best man out of the job. Namely Mike O'Callaghan.

Well folks, just in case you haven't yet discovered it, or unless you simply forgot it existed, here it is yet again- seemingly fresh out of the darkroom (or wherever movies come from) in super brilliant color, not looking a day over 1 or 2 years old- let alone 33!

In 1941, old Walt must have been burning leaves in Tiajuana or maybe he was just born with his head floating one mile above his body.

FANTASIA set animation to a wide variety of classical music designed to please even those who hate classical music.

It all starts with BACH'S TOCCATA and FUGUE in D-minor. (all selections

# Carnevale: International Viewpoint of Law

Dr. Jessie Carnevale seems to live life as does one of those super quick, hyper athletes UNLV imports to play basketball.

She covers the court of life, projecting herself into every play for the whole game.

Dr. Carnevale comes to UNLV through the educational and legal system of Arizona. A graduate of the University of Arizona, she received her MA, with high distinction, and law degrees from the Tucson campus.

Dr. Carnevale's background is a testament to the breadth of experience and expertise that the Law Enforcement Department hopes to achieve. She boasts a background in probate law, juvenile law, and medical and environmental law.

"I'm a crusader," says the lady lawyer, and right now it's

medical and environmental law that is getting most of Dr. Carnevale's considerable energy and talents.

As the sole female "fellow" in the International Academy of Law and Sciences, she presented a formal paper on medical malpractice at the Academy's annual meeting last January at Puerto Rico.

One international conclave led to another as Dr. Carnevale received an invitation to give another formal paper. "The Legal Right to a Healthful Environment" was presented by her to the Third World Congress on Medical Law, last August at Ghent, Belgium.

The Third World Congress is a truly international organization whose main concern is with the legal aspects of health and the environment.

"Pollution is a trans-national problem, we cannot treat it piecemeal.." said Dr. Carnevale, in explaining part of the mission of the Third World Congress.

Dr. Carnevale cited the legal steps being taken in the United States to curb pollution. "The United States, in the last three years has developed a tremendous body of constitutional and statutory law; the Ninth Amendment being used to imply the right of the individual to a healthy environment.

She sees the problem differently when applied to the developing nations. "We must allow them a certain level of progress and achievement toward their stand-

ard of living before they have to conform to what we, in America, might have to conform to. They can learn from our experience."

The Third World Congress also dealt with forensic (legal) medicine, which explains Dr. Carnevale's presence in the Law En-

forcement Department. In fact, the most controversial issues where abortion, euthanasia, and the criteria death per organ transplants.

Charles Morgan, a civil liberties lawyer who has handled landmark cases ranging from reapportionment to jury integration to the defense of Muhammad Ali, will speak at 8 p.m. Friday in the Student Union Ballroom at UNLV.

The event, free and open to the public, is sponsored by the Southern Nevada Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union. Morgan came to public light in September 1963 when he addressed a Birmingham, Ala., businessmen's group in the wake of the killing of four young black girls in the bombing of a local

church.

Morgan, a white Southerner and resident of Birmingham, himself, told the group, "Every person in this community who has in way contributed during the past several years to the popularity of hatred is at least as guilty as the demented fool who threw the bomb."

Besides Ali, he has defended Capt. Howard Levy, accused of making comments critical of the Vietnam war, and represented Julian Bond in his suit to be seated in the Georgia State Assembly.

About the Coach; why do you yell at the players so much when they drop the ball or make a mistake? We sure don't see you out there fighting for it.

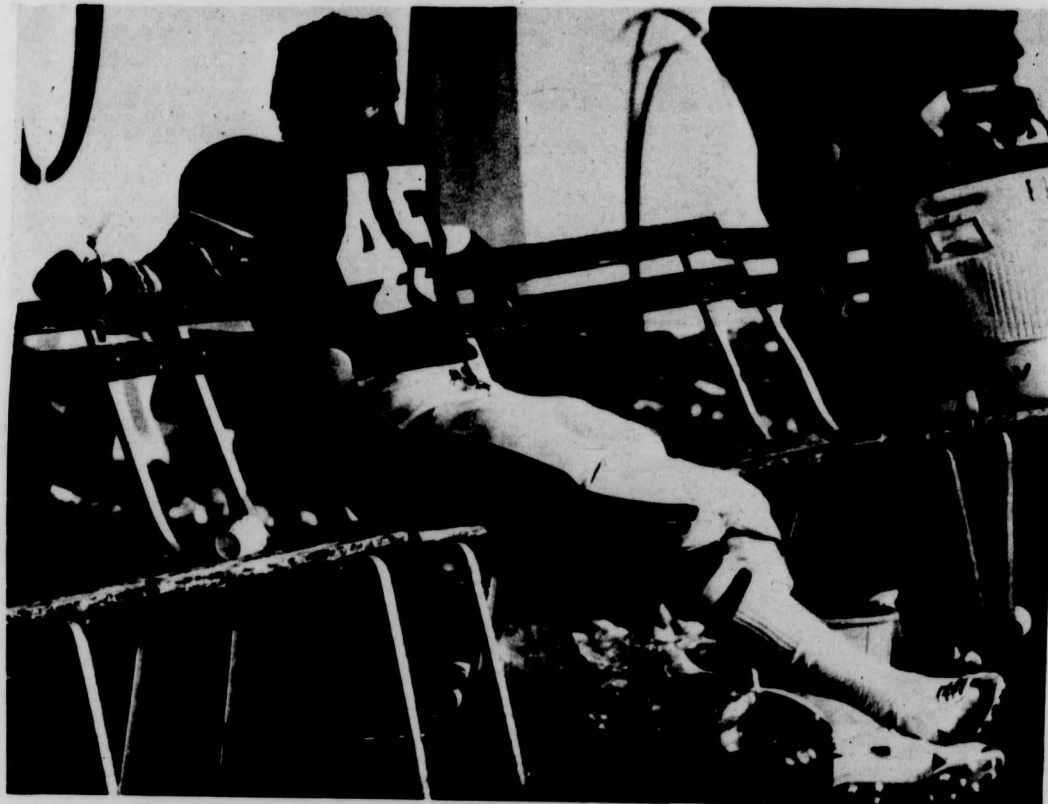
Enough for the action on the field. The big stuff happens in the stands. Everybody knows the Saturday night football game is the social event of the week.

# Bell and Henry out of lineup



Ronnie Bell, a 5-10, 178 pound starting cornerback for the University of Nevada, Las Vegas football team, has been lost for the remainder of the season because of a broken left ankle he sustained in last Saturday's 26-0 victory over Northeast Louisiana University at the Las Vegas Stadium.

Bell is resting comfortably in Sunrise Hospital today after being operated on by Dr. Gerald Higgins to repair his left fibula and torn ligaments in that area. The diminutive dynamo was a walk-on to the Rebel gridiron program and lettered last year while seeing limited action.

Not ready to make the start in the opening game against State College of Arkansas, Bell has started the other four games the Rebels have played and against NLU was having his best game of the season before being injured in the fourth quarter. The former Western High (Las Vegas) star had five tackles, 14 assists and one pass break-up for UNLV this year.

Hospital reports indicate that Bell should be able to report back for Spring Practice with the Rebels.

Also admitted to Sunrise Hospital over the weekend was Rebel center Steve Henry. Co-captain Henry was admitted for further examination and treatment of a severed hamstring muscle pull in his left leg.

Each week the challenge seems to get stronger and this Saturday the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (4-1) must host fifth-ranked and undefeated Boise State College in an 8:15 p.m. (PDT) game at the Las Vegas Stadium.

UNLV's Rebels under aggressive first year coach Ron Meyer, upset 14th-rated Northeast Louisiana University, 26-0, and are proving to be the best team in the six-year history of Rebel football.

Despite the fact that UNLV has played two major college teams and the highly-regarded NLU team, the Rebels are dominating opponents both offensively and defensively. The most prominent figure is that while the UNLV offense is averaging 28 points a game (140 total in five games), the Big Red defense has held opponents to 5.8 points per game

including holding all five opponents scoreless in the first and fourth quarters.

All-America candidate Mike Thomas, 5-10, 188, continues to lead the UNLV rushing and scoring attack. In five games he has carried the ball 115 times for 637 yards, a 5.5 per carry average, seven touchdowns, and a long run of 62 yards.

Thomas also is the leading kick-off returner with two for an average of 25.5 yards per return and senior safety Lenny Lucas is the top punt returner with a 17.0 average return. Jimmy Andrews and Sonny Brockman, both teammates at Pasadena City College last year, have each picked off three passes and Andrews returned one against Northeast Louisiana for a 23-yard touchdown.
