Editorial

Perhaps the biggest problem facing the impending consolidation of the City of Las Vegas and Clark County is the realization that nobody knows what they're doing. Last month's televised flasco proved that.

One man who does understand what is going on won't be around: Clark County Administrator David Henry.

Last week Henry presented his resignation to Commission Chairman Jack Petitti, effective September 21.

The Clark County Grand Jury is currently investigating a charge that Henry acted illegally and/or immorally in receiving several pay raises over a period of eighteen months.

The raises were, of course, approved by the County Commission and Henry's pay was not out of line with that given to other administrators of municipalities of similar size.

The reason Henry had to go was simply that certain County Commissioners were not eager to be told by a professional how to proceed with consolidation.

They were especially not eager to be told that they are going about consolidation ass-backwards.

Perhaps the merger of the governments will proceed smoother with David Henry gone; but as the various officials spend the next two years establishing power bases and fieldoms, we may discover-to our dismay-that Henry was right all along.

Lennon

The U.S. Court of Appeals is taking under advisement a motion by attorneys for rock musician John Lennon to overturn a deportation order from U.S. Immigration officials.

Lennon claims that the Department of Immigration is singling him out.

He claims that the Nixon administration ordered the ex-Beatle thrown out because of his radical political beliefs.

The lawyers claim that the government's action was based on a memo from the Senate Internal Security Committee which falsely linked Lennon to a plot to disrupt the 1972 Republican National Convention.

The stated reason for denying Lennon permanent U.S. residence was a 1968 English conviction for possessing a small amount of cannabis resin, which is used to make hashish.

Lennon has remained in the United States pending the outcome of the three-year old case.

The folks up north must be doing something right if they can turn out artists of the calibre of Dick Peitz.

Born in Garden City, Kansas, Peitz studied lithography, graphics, etching and drawing with Tony Ko and James McCormick. His work has been extensively shown in the Reno and Sacramento areas.

It is a bit hard to describe Peitz's work except to say that it moves you. Whimsical at times, but always expressive of deep inner things that touch some aspect of our innermost thoughts. Some of his works on display give the impression of looking at woodseyhued microscope slides. Other examples feature timeless pyramids floating on blue-silver hori-

zon or crumbling to decay. His use of contrasts in portraying some pyramids make them feel almost tangible. One work, entitled "Cosmological Metaphysics-Search for Geological Rememberances" has a certain primevil eminence, as does a similar work entitled "Origins."

It is invigorating to realize that the Nevada State Council on the Arts, whose grant made this showing possible, and the Art Department here at UNLV care enough to bring in such exceptional talent for our enjoyment and enrichment. Even more so, it's nice to know that Peitz is indeed a product of the University of Nevada. It proves once again that this State has much more to offer than just gaming, shows and tumbleweeds.

University Senate

The University (faculty) Senate is scheduled to meet September 9th in room 399 of the Education Building at noon.

Among the items on the agenda is a proposal by Paul Burns to divest from the University College all responsibility for interdisciplinary

programs.

Chancellor Humphrey has asked the Senate to ratify a proposed ammendment to the University of Nevada System Code to permit full-time Community College Division faculty to be eligible for tenure.

The Senate will also receive from the Chancellor's office the following memorandum regarding grants-in-aid income tax implications:

GRANTS-IN-AID INCOME TAX IMPLICATIONS

According to recent news articles, the Internal Revenue Service has substantially increased the number of audits of colleges and universities. The issues raised included tuition remission for children of faculty and withholding of taxes on fellowship award distributions.

Internal Audit has completed research into the areas of grants-in-aid for professional staff and dependents; grants-in-aid for non-academic employees, and grants-in-aid for graduate assistants/fellows. We expressed our opinion based on decisions set forth in the I.R.S. Revised Rulings and tax court decisions. Our source material is subject to other interpretations and, by its nature, could lead other users to a different

The Revised Ruling C.B. 1973-1,53 is an interpretation of sections six and 117 of the Internal Revenue Code and the application of section 1.117-3(a), (c), and 1.117-4(c) of the Income Tax Regulations. Applicable sections of the revised ruling that pertain to grants-in-aid follow:

"Section 61 of the Code provides that, unless otherwise excluded by law, gross income means all income from whatever source derived including, but not limited to, compensation for services.

"Subject to certain qualifications and limitations, section 117(a) of the code provides that gross income of an individual does not include an amount received as a scholarship at an educational institution or as a fellowship grant.

"Whether an amount received by an individual is excludable from his gross income under section 117 of the Code depends upon the facts and circumstances under which the payment is made. The exclusion provision applies only to scholarship or fellowship grants. Under section 1.117-3(c) of the regulations, a fellowship grant is an amount paid or allowed to, or for the benefit of, an individual to aid him in pursuing his studies or research.

"Section 1.117-4(c) of the regulations provides, in part, that any amount or amounts paid or allowed to, or on behalf of, an individual to enable him to pursue studies or re-search shall not be considered to be an amount received as a scholarship or fellowship grant if such amount represents compensation for past, present, or future employment services, if such amount represents payments for services that are subject to the direction or supervision of the grantor or if such studies or research are primarily for the benefit of the grantor. Any of these conditions will negate the existence of a choleschip or followship or followship or the services defined in scholarship or fellowship grant as defined in these regulations.

GRANTS-IN-AID, PROFESSIONAL STAFF AND DEPENDENTS

According to the Board of Regents Handbook, Title 4, Chapter 14, page 3, the grant-in-aid is provided professional staff members who are full-time employees of the University System. A person must continue as a full-time employee during the entire period of his enrollment in courses in order to qualify for this priviledge.

Under Section 1.117-4(c), a grant-in-aid for the professional staff member and his family would not be excludable from gross income due to the fact that the grant-in-aid represents compensation for past, present, or future emplyment services.

GRANTS-IN-AID, NON-ACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

According to the Board of Regents Handbook, Title 4, Chapter 14, page 4, the grant-in-aid is provided non-academic employees under exceptional circumstances for the good of the University and may be allowed to take courses with a grant-in-aid for the payment of the regis-

Under Section 1.117-4(c) of the Income Tax Regulations, the grant-in-aid would not be excludable from gross income due to the fact that it represents compensation for past, present, or future employment services. It represents services which are subject to the direction or supervision of the grantor, and the studies are primarily for the

benefit of the grantor.

GRANTS-IN-AID, GRADUATE ASSISTANTS/FELLOWS

Due to the complexity of the tax law concerning graduate assistants/fellows, a broad interpretation cannot be given. Each situation has to be reviewed using the particular facts of the case. However, under the Board of Regents Handbook, Title 4, Chapter 14, (10) (4), "A graduate fellow at the University of Nevada, Reno, who, in order to complete his degree requirements by September has to register for credits of thesis in the summer session, shall receive a grant-in-aid for the payment of fees for the summer session as a condition of employment during the previous semester."

The above statement would indicate that the grant-in-aid is given as a condition of employment and, under section 1.117-4(c), would not qualify as a scholarship and would not be excludable from gross

Claudine Review

How many of you remember the television series Julia, starring a svelt Diahann Carrol who attempts to cope with life in middle-class suburbia? Well, her appearance in the starring role of Claudine, in the movie of the same name, is, to say the least, a departure from more staid roles. Teemed with James Earl Jones, who portrays "Roop", a street-wise garbage collector, Claudine attempts to cope with raising six kids in an undersized apartment right in the guts of harlem. Her bouts with the welfare system, her sixteen-year-old daughter's pregnancy, and her eighteen-year-old son's militant attitudes, and her trying to squeeze in a love affair with Roop, all make the screen crackle with some marvellously funny moments. (At one point, her desire to make love noticably declines when Roop corners a rat in the bedroom, for example.) for example.)

Apart from the humor, the 1974 John Berry-directed flick portrays the hard realities of life in the ghetto. As Claudine says about living on welfare, "You know us ignorant black bitches...grindin' out babies for the taxpayers to take care of."

Add to this a hip score written by Curtis Mayfield and sung by Gladys Knight and the Pips and you have a movie well worth watching.

Newsweek aptly sums it up by saying:

"Claudine...wins because it uses not only its head and its heart, but the all-out energy of its immensely gifted inhabitants."





Outlook

Fate, fortune, destiny—whatever the future holds for Northern lowa football in 1975 crucially depends on success of rebuilding the interior offensive line and the cleverness of potential All-America quarterback Bill Salmon.

This is the first time UNLV will have ever faced coach Stan Sheriff's Panthers, who had a nucleus of 30 returning lettermen. If replacements in the depleted areas adhere quickly enough, Salmon continues heroics with the option, the receiving corps reaches its potential and the backfield matures, the yard-eating squad could become one of the most effective in the North Central Conference.

Salmon racked up 2,157 yards in total offense in 1974. While the defensive unit was having an overhaul in 1974, the new season promises a more cohesive group with fine potential. Mel Campbell will lead the defense, along with captain Randy Erion, a tackle.

Idaho State should be a much better football team in 1975 than the one that lost to UNLV, 31-7, a year ago. Primary reasons for the improvement are 35 returning lettermen, some top-notch transfers, and the added experience of quarterback Steve Tosches, who passed for 209 yards and a touchdown against the Rebels in 1974.

Nine defensive starters return, including the entire secondary and linebacking corps. Two-year all-conference safety Dave Benko keys the pass defense, while all-conference Wayne Hill is the top linebacker. Three tough defensive ends are John Roberts, Greg Taylor and Pat Beck.

Offensively, ISU has Tosches calling signals and a crew of experienced receivers led by Dave Shulz and Craig Norby. Running backs Kevin Crocker, Louie Mitchell and Scott Butterfield also return.

The University of Montana recorded a discouraging, yet encouraging, 3-6-1 season in 1974. Included in the Grizzly losses were two in the final seconds, one of them a 20-17 setback to UNLV. Although 13 starters were lost to graduation, Montana has many experienced young players returning, including two superstars in the defensive unit. Greg Harris, a powerful and aggressive 6-3, 240-pound middle guard, and free safety Greg Anderson, the nation's Division II punt and kickoff return champion, return in the defensive unit along with ends John Buxton and Bill Gulbranson and cornerback Greg Carter.

Halfbacks Del Spear and Wyatt McCraw, tight end Duane Walker and guard Dan Sullivan (6-6, 230) are back on the offensive unit again this year. The Grizzlies are known for being a hard-hitting, neverquitting outfit and 1975 should be the same

Rebuilding is the word echoing out of Jackson, Mississippi as the Jackson State University Tigers prepare for the 1975 football season. Robert Hill, beginning his fifth season as head Tiger coach with a remarkable 33-9-1 record, must find replacements for 11 graduated starters, including two first-round draft picks in Walter Payton and Robert Brazile.

While Hill and his staff don't expect to have the experience of last season's 7-3 squad, they do expect an abundance of talent at some positions. The offensive line returns four veterans, led by senior tackle Mac Miley (6-4, 270) and senior guard Jackie Slater (6-5, 255).

Fullback Joe Lowery is considered to be a top professional prospect, while junior Jeremiah

The University of Nebraska at Omaha goes into the 1975 season with a new head coach, a new offense, and a determined outlook to put aside last year's 3-7 season. Bill Danenhauer, Maverick assistant for six years, will take over the reins this year and will have 33 lettermen on hand although only nine were starters last year.

On offense, the biggest job will be finding a replacement for all-time leading ground gainer Saul Ravenell at running back and replacing three linemen lost through graduation. Heading the list of running backs will be Scott Mason and transfer from Nebraska, Kim Mix. Fullback will be held down by junior Johnny Harrison and quarterback will be junior John Bowenkamp. Defensive aces are tackle Jim Sledge (230 pounds), and tackle Mickey Woodside (240).



Outlook

Boise State is ready for a heart transplant and if head coach Tony Knap has his way, the operation should be successful. The Broncos lost the "heart" of their offense and defense due to graduation last spring in All-America quarterback Jim McMillan, defensive linebacker Ron Davis and safety Rolly Woolsey. The team loses six defensive starters and five starters on offense.

"Replacements must be found if we are to have any kind of team at all. All the other areas remain strong," Knap said. The Broncos were 10-2 last year, advancing once again to the NCAA playoffs, and the BSU team won its second straight Big Sky title with a perfect 6-0 league mark. Upcoming senior quarterback Lee Huey passed for 617 yards last year. The lone returning starter in the backfield is senior halfback John Smith, who led the Big Sky in scoring in 1974 with 17 TDs.

Experience, depth and size should help parlay the University of Idaho football program into a Big Sky Conference title contender in 1975. When Ed Troxel took over the reigns a year ago, he said that '75 would be Ul's year to battle for the crown and he still feels that way. In the 2-8-1 rebuilding campaign last fall, the Vandals were in the race until late in the season. In fact, they were in all games but the opener and most of the starters (28 lettermen) are returning, including two all-conference performers in J.C. Chadband and Steve Duncanson.

Fullback Chadband ran for 758 yards in nine games last year and Duncanson is considered by many to be one of the top tight ends on the entire West Coast.

UI will also have senior quarterback Dave Comstock ready to run the Veer-T offense. The defense must improve, but big tackles Craig Crnick (6-5, 250) and Jeff Skelly (6-5, 245) will be there to help.

Football at Northern Arizona will have a new look which will be rather young this fall. New head coach Joe Salem will have a lot of hold-overs from the freshman-sophomore category, and he and his staff recruited heavily from the high school ranks.

It's been since a 7-3 finish during the 1969 season that NAU has enjoyed a winning season — over the past five years, NAU teams have gone 15-34 on the field of combat, so no one is expecting Salem to work miracles overnight as a massive rebuilding job appears to be the first big task. Some of the key players for NAU include linebacker Mike Mauger, offensive tackle Charles Brunk, offensive guard Larry Friedrichs, and defensive back Randy Ferrell.

John Gregory is beginning his fourth season as head coach with an overall record of 17-15-1. The offensive hopes in 1975 will rest on the ability of talented quarterback Bill Mast. They will also have the services of hard-charging runningback Jim Kram, speedy tailback Dick Weikert, and placekicker Dan DeLaHunt, who made 35 of 35 PATs last year and booted eight field goals.

The defense will be a very strong unit anchored by tackle Ron Christensen, end Bob Gissler and linebacker Mark Huelskamp.

programs in the country.

1964. Following that year, Meyer then coached for six years at his alma mater before going to the Dallas Cowboys as one of four talent scouts. In 1972 Ron Meyer took over at UNLV and in two years coached the Rebels to a 20-4 won-loss record.

Aside from watching a little television, although I did find out that he likes war movies, especially Combat-type; Meyer is an outdoor person. He loves to snow ski, fish and water ski when he finds the time. How good of a water skiler is he? His wife says, "He doesn't think he is as good as Coach Carder or Kennan, but he does alright.

Ron Meyer is also a fine golfer. He's about a 13 handicap, somewhere in the mid 80's

What are some of the personal goals Ron Meyer has right now? His immediate goal is for UNLV to capture the national champion-ship. "I would like very much for UNLV to become national champions and for the university to grow into a football power," he

It's a good think for UNLV and especially his family that Ron Meyer, in the 7th grade, decided to become a football coach instead of a gardner.

Otherwise Ron Meyer could very well be collecting unemploy-ment.

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas football team opens their 1975 season this Saturday night at the Las Vegas Stadium when they host Northern Iowa University

The Rebels begin their third season under Ron Meyer in search of a national championship that eluded them last year. UNLV finished the 1974 regular unbeaten and advanced to the semi-finals of the Division II Play-offs

The Rebels appear to be in good shape for what Coach Meyer calls "our toughest season opener since I've been here." No major injuries have been sustained, with main concern being quarterback Glenn Carano's knee. Carano suffered a torn cartilage in spring practice and has recuperated 100% since the operation. He will wear a brace on the right

knee only for protection.

Meanwhile, Northern Iowa comes into the game having already played last week. The Panthers played host to Eastern Illinois but the YELL


went to press before the score was reported.

Leading Coach Stan Staffer's Panthers is the return of Senior quarterback Bill Salmon. The 6-1, 190 lb. captain passed for 1699 yards and 11 touchdowns in guiding NIU to a 5-4-1 mark. Salmon's favorite target is wide receiver David Schooley. Schooley led the North Central Conference last season catching 35 aerials for 892 yards and nine touchdowns. touchdowns.

The one problem Staffer faces in his 16th year as head coach is the inexperience of the offensive line. The Panthers lost 15 players through graduation including three starters off the offensive line. If the line can pull together and give Salmon the time he needs, NIU could present a real threat in upsetting the Rebels.

A few streaks are riding on the line for the Rebels when they take the field at 8:15 p.m. Saturday night. UNLV has won their last 11 regular season games and have not lost on the Astro-turf of Las Vegas Stadium since Utah State upended the Rebels 7-3, on September 29, 1973.



ASK YOUR LIBRARIAN.





You don't need a survival kit to use the second floor of the library; all you really need to know is the alphabet and the location of the service desk. Since students learn the alphabet in first grade (don't they?), and the desk is easy to see, you are all set to use the periodical files, newspapers, microforms, and audio visual materials.

The periodicals are arranged alphabetically by title around the room with the latest issues on yellow display shelves, and older issues, bound, in the same range of stacks as the current issues. The key to periodical and microform titles held by the library is the computer produced print out, located at the service desk. There is another copy of the print out at the reference desk on the first floor for your convenience. The print out lists all the periodical titles in the library, and gives the holdings for each title. Also available is a Nevada Union List of Serials, with titles held by various libraries in the state; if UNLV doesn't have the journal you need, you may find it is available in some other Nevada library. Undergraduate students at UNLV are fortunate in that they may use interlibrary loan service to obtain materials from other Nevada libraries; many larger universities do not accord that privilege to undergrads!

So, you need recent information, with bibliographic citations, for that term paper which will be due all too soon? You know, of course, that the most current information on many topics will be found in magazines (or journals, if you prefer the more scholarly term), but the question is, how to find it without spending hours browsing through the journals in your subject field. With 2500 alphabetically arranged titles to choose from,

how do you even find the journals in your subject field? And how do you pick up the articles on your topic which are in other types of journals?

Don't despair! Stop on the first floor for help; all of the indexes to periodicals are housed close to the reference desk. And don't stop with that old stand-by, Readers Guide. Your prof will be much more impressed with citations of journals indexes in Resources in Education, or Paul Science of the state of the s or Psychological Abstracts, or PAIS, or any of the other 275 (give or take a few) indexes available. We don't have all the journals indexed in the various abstracting and indexing services (what library does?), but it is worth a try. If you are totally unfamiliar with the indexes, ask one of the persons at the desk to help you.




Armed with your list of citations, you are now ready for the second floor. If you have trouble finding what you need, ask for help at the service desk. A staff member will show you how to read the print out, how to find your material, demonstrate the microform viewing equipment, and try to make you feel "at home" in the library. You may use the periodicals in the library, or if you concentrate better with background music and food or drink at hand, you may wish to xerox copies of your materials to take home. Since current periodicals are not

loaned out, each student has an equal opportunity to all resources.

Occasionally you may find that another person (the inconsiderate so-and-so!) has destroyed part or all of the very article essential for your paper. This is a serious problem in most libraries, and it causes much frustration for both you, the library patron, and for library staff. You are generally hacked because the material is not available and you have to wait, if you have the time, for a copy from another library. The librarian is upset, not only because you do not have what you need, but also because the process of trying to obtain a replacement issue can be long, expensive and often unsuccessful. Would you believe that a single replacement issue of some titles may cost as much as \$50? Too many replacements at that price play havoc with a fixed budget! In a recent study at the Kent State University Library, the reasons most often given for rip-offs were lack of time, either to read or copy the material, and lack of copying facilities. Allow enough time (and it usually takes longer than you expect) to find and use or copy your material; the library has good copying facilities.

Also on the second floor: a smoking room with tables, carrells, and lounge furniture; study tables and carrells which will easily seat 175 persons; local and national newspapers; a xerox machine; microform copying facilities; phono-records, tapes, audio visual reserve materials along with equipment to play/see/hear them; and the special collections room. You'll hear more about AV and the special collections in later

And there are personnel who are available to assist you in any way they can. Don't hesitate to ask questions!

Enrollment Up

Enrollment at both campuses of the University of Nevada are up

sharply over a year age.

At the University of Nevada, Reno, registrar Jack Shirley says the total At the University of Nevada, Reno, registrar Jack Shirley says the total for the first four days of registration was 7,670, compared to 6,960 last year. Shirley had anticipated an increase of up to five percent. Instead, UNR enrollment is 10 percent above a year ago.

As The Yell reported last week, the University Business Office recorded 6,660 fee payments through the opening week of registration. If late registration equals last year's total of nearly 1,500 students, UNLV's fall enrollment could reach 8,000 students.

A year ago, UNLV had a total enrollment of 6,918 and last spring enrollment was 7,227.

Reno Language Boycott

The registration boycott of foreign language classes at the University of Nevada, Reno, seriously affected enrollment.

Student leaders at UNR had urged students not to sign up for foreign language studies in an attempt to force the University to eliminate the rule that requires all College of Arts and Letters students to take the courses for graduation.

Department Chairman Gerald Peterson said that enrollment of first and second-year students this year was down by about 30 percent compared with last year's numbers.

He said that, without the boycott, enrollment would have been up 10

Bill Brown, ASUN leader of the boycott, says he plans to attract alumni and student support for a legal battle against the requirement. It is also planned to put pressure on the Curriculum Committee of the University Senate to vote on a change.

A business professor from Kentucky has been appointed to direct the new Center for Business and Economic Research at UNLV.

Dr. Betty Yantis, formerly of Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green, becomes the first administrator of the center which starts operation this fall on cam-

Her appointment was announced by Dr. George Hardbeck, Dean of UNLV's College of Business and Economics.

The Nevada Legislature last spring appropriated \$85,000 to establish a Center for Business and Economic Research here. agency will perform applied re-search on a range of subjects important to business and government in the State with emphasis on the Southern Nevada area.

"Until now, there has been no local center for business and economic research in Southern Nevada,"Dr. Yantis commented.
"Such research become imperations and seconomic research become imperative in an area such as Las Vegas which is experiencing rapid gro-wth. We also hope to perform a service for the community by maintaining a collection of fre-quently requested data on the economy of Southern Nevada."

She said the center will also perform basic research on specific economic topics, on a contract basis, for individual businessmen

or government agencies.

Potential research topics include studies on tourism and the Nevada economy, the impcat of new hotels upon the local eco-nomy, analyses of Southern Ne-vada's labor force, transportation and population profiles.
