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### Elections constitution question Thurs. and Wed.

CSUN Senate elections for the 1984-85 term are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 17 and 18.

Seats in five of seven colleges are uncontested, according to CSUN Officer of Public Information James Ohriner. Two seats, one in the College of Education and one in Academic Advisement, will be vacant when the new Senate is seated Nov. 1.

Candidates in the colleges of Business and Economics, Education, Health Sciences, Science, Math and Engineering and Academic Advisement will be automatically installed, provided they receive at least one vote and the election is certified, Ohriner said.

Charles Jensen was disqualified as a candidate for the College of Hotel Administration last week because he failed to meet the 2.4 cumulative

GPA requirement, according to Elections Board Chairman Catherine Clay. Clay said Jensen did not protest the action.

Two of the three remaining hotel candidates, Andy Nichols and William Bacon, are promoting themselves as a ticket, while Tom Muir remains an independent.

According to CSUN Senate President Bill Haldeman, all matriculated undergraduate students are eligible to

vote in the election.

According to Ohriner, polls will be located at the Moyer Student Union (9 a.m. to 7 p.m.), Beam Hall (9 a.m. to 2 p.m.), Wright Hall (9 a.m. to 2 p.m.), Humanities Building (9 a.m. to 7 p.m.), Dickinson Library (9 a.m. to 7 p.m.), Education Building (9 a.m. to 2 p.m.) and White Hall (9 a.m. to 2 p.m.) Wednesday and Thursday. Students will be asked for "legal, state-issued ID with your

social security number on it," Ohriner said. Drivers licenses, UNLV ID and military ID are examples of acceptable ID, he said.

A revision of the student government constitution will also be on the ballot this week. According to Haldeman, the revision is the result of a directive from the Board of Regents. The revision was recently approved by the CSUN Senate and the regents. Passage requires a ma-

majority of those voting.

The revision sets a minimum funding level for CSUN at five percent of the per credit fee paid by students taking seven or more credits. It also allows executive officers to run for re-election, which the current constitution prohibits.

Copies of the proposed revision are available in the student government office in the Moyer Student Union.

### An open letter from the CSUN Senate President on the constitutional revision

The revision of our constitution you are being asked to vote upon this week includes numerous minor changes in wording and style, as well as several significant clarifications, simplifications, date changes to allow adequate periods between events, and the incorporation of existent fiscal procedure, as per a 1983 Board of Regents Directive.

The substance of the 1978 document has been left in tact, but six years of practice reveals flaws. The revision is largely to correct these flaws without weakening the strengths of the 1978 constitution.

The single most important changes will now be examined. In 1978, our membership was defined as those students paying CSUN fees, this limited membership to those taking seven or more credits (typically, some 5,000 students). However, those who did not pay CSUN fees did not pay any less. Their money simply went for the support of other areas of campus such as the library. Students taking less than seven credits and graduate students paid as much or more for their credits, yet were denied a recognized voice in the university system.

In the years since, the graduate students have developed their own organization to represent them, and due to alternation in the fee collection our Judicial Council ruled that all undergraduates are CSUN members. Under the new constitution it is established that all matriculated undergraduates upon payment of registration fees shall be CSUN members.

The fee constitution is reestablished, making our funding more certain. The new constitution includes a "floor" of five per cent of the per credit fee collected from undergraduate students taking seven or more credits.

In Article III, the protection offered by A.B. 411, and the responsibility to adhere to the Board of Regents policy are both recognized.

The next significant revisions, found in Article IV, democratizes CSUN by permitting members in "good standing" status to seek office. Previously, G.P.A. re-

quirements favored participation by students of some colleges over others. Additionally, the prohibition against executive officers seeking a second term of office was removed.

Election dates were changed to permit adequate time between primaries and general elections to settle election disputes.

An oath of office was added to establish accountability on the part of elected officers.

The next significant change occurs in Article VIII: the signature of CSUN Business Manager (or acting agent of the Dean of Student Services) shall conform to mutually accepted fiscal procedures established by CSUN and the Office of the President of the university. This safeguard assures that CSUN expenditures shall conform to responsible requirements, but shall not be subject to veto at the whim of the university signator. Cause for a CSUN expenditure not being permitted will have to adhere to agreed upon rules.

Eligibility for board or committee membership shall also be opened to CSUN members in "good standing" status.

By moving responsibility to selecting the Programming Director of KUNV to Radio Board and the Station Manager, the selection process will be less a political decision than a managerial one.

Due process is added to the impeachment specifications in Article X. In the past no set procedures for the impeachment of officers were in the constitution.

Other revisions are clarifications and incorporations of procedures in effect but not previously in the constitution. Please take the time to read the revision. I'm sure there are still improvements that can be made but they can best be revealed in practice. The 1978 document has served well these six years, yet anything can be improved. In submitting this document we believe improvement is at hand.

### New tax ruling may imperil college sports fundraising

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CPS)--A recent Internal Revenue Service ruling has college athletic directors huddling with lawyers and tax accountants to determine whether contributions to their programs are tax deductible for the donors.

The ruling, moreover, could wreck many college sports programs' fundraising efforts.

Until recently, a contributor could deduct the cost of his "donation" to a college sports department from his income taxes.

Many college sports programs, of course, use the tax deduction as a lure for contributions.

Without the play, of course, alumni would simply pay \$450 for season tickets, but get no tax break. Many athletic directors worry their donors will spend the money elsewhere without it.

"It would be devastating to our program if the donors were not allowed a deduction," says Wade Acosta, an IRS spokesman. "He paid \$300 for the right to buy tickets not available to anyone else."

While Acosta admits the case is a special situation, the IRS says the fundraising play is widespread.

Without the play, of course, alumni would simply pay \$450 for season

tickets, but get no tax break. Many athletic directors worry their donors will spend the money elsewhere without it.

"There may be some individuals who withdraw their support, but I hope not completely," says Athletic Director John Croughamel.

He assumes the ruling won't even apply to Syracuse contributors, but "that doesn't mean we won't be affected."

Acosta of the IRS insists the ruling isn't intended to affect the athletic programs, only to make the

contributors aware of the law.

"If you make a charitable contribution to anything you must subtract the value of what you got back in return," he adds.

UNLV Athletic Director Brad Rothermel said last week that university officials are investigating the possible effect on UNLV athletics of a recent IRS ruling.

According to Rothermel, UNLV officials have not yet seen or interpreted the ruling, but that it is "potentially devastating" to UNLV athletics. About forty-five percent of the UNLV athletic budget is generated in this manner, he said.



# Constitutional revision causes more problems than it solves

The CSUN constitutional revision was a gallant effort by Senate President Bill Haldeman. It also gave student government and the regents a chance to get together and agree on something, after a little compromising. It also gave CSUN a chance to see how President Maxson really feels about student government.

The regents and the president were supportive and cooperative. If there is any opposition to the revision, it hasn't been voiced publicly. Everyone has been so busy agreeing with each other that no one has bothered to really analyze the document.

People keep asking us when the Yell is going to "get controversial." This is it, guys. Revision has been suggested for years. It has also been avoided for years. Many claimed the document was unworkable, but some were afraid things might get worse instead of better if we changed it. They were right.

To begin with, the revision is poorly written. One of the major complaints about the present constitution is that it is vague and ambiguous. I predict this complaint will be amplified if the revision is approved.

The revision would allow executive officers to be re-elected. This presents at least two problems.

Granted, most of us will probably spend more than four years at UNLV, but even so, it seems unfair to allow one person to hold an office for more than a year when there are more than ten thousand of us and only three CSUN executive board positions.

The second problem is worse. Most CSUN appointments expire April 30, the day before the executive board takes office. The executive board nominates Elections Board members who will serve during their term, which includes the period during which new elections will take place. In other words, executive board members will be able to control the board membership for the period during which they will be running for re-election. They will also be able to control the flow of information and just about any other administrative matters.

Even more frightening is the fact that this amendment has been ignored in most discussions of the constitution. Speculation has it that this provision was included to appease CSUN President Kent Anderson. Speculation also has it Anderson will be running for re-election this spring.

Some of the amendments are simply reactions to past problems. At least one of them is more likely to create new problems. The revision would move the primary election for executive offices to the first Wednesday and Thursday of instruction in March. This, the authors believe, will eliminate the problem encountered last spring when some wanted to invalidate the primary election and hold a new primary. Unfortunately, the constitution did not allow for a new primary or for changing the dates of the general election. I believe one of the reasons for these provisions was to prevent a disgruntled Elections Board or Senate from rescheduling elections until they got a winner they liked. The new provision creates at least two problems.

Spring semester usually begins at the end of January, beginning of February. Even assuming a two week period for primary campaigns, which will require the blitz approach, and one week before that for filing, only one week is left for advertising the election and filing information. That gives prospective candidates only a week to get their finances and their campaigns in order. Also, the Senate is notorious for not being able to achieve quorum during the winter break.

The revision would schedule the general election for the first Wednesday and Thursday of instruction in April. It also allows for rescheduling the primary if invalidated. By the time a primary is held and invalidated and rescheduled, you're looking at less than a week during which the candidates would have to put their campaigns back together, gather additional funding, and explain to the student body why they are being asked to vote again. If the new primary is held in the middle of March, the general would be only two weeks later.

It's difficult enough to convince UNLV students to vote once. How are we going to convince them to vote three times?

The revision would allow the judicial council to invalidate elections. The decision would have to be rendered no later than two weeks after the election. Unfortunately, the new election would have to have begun two days before the council would have to render its decision (unless my calendar is different than CSUN's).

The proposed revision would clear up several points of conflict. The present constitution allows the Senate to break a Senate election tie but isn't clear about whether the old Senate or the new Senate has the honor. The revision gives the responsibility to the newly seated Senate.

The present constitution doesn't specify whether a Senate can choose a pro tempore for an incoming Senate. The revision would grant the duty to the new Senate.

But while the revision would solve some problems, it would also create new problems. Probably more problems. Questions of interpretation can be resolved by the Judicial Council. The complications that will result from the adoption of the new constitution may be more difficult to solve. The Judicial Council can't change the calendar.

Oversight is the key word here. In their rush to appease the regents and in their desire to claim they had done what past CSUN administrations hadn't been able to do, student government officials overlooked some very critical questions.

I want the constitution amended as much as anyone does, but not under these conditions (If you're going to do it, do it right). This is a sticky situation, because the regents are happy with the document and

President Maxson is happy with the document. But I'd wager they haven't considered these points. They were more concerned with authority to distribute funds and funding formulas.

As much as I like having them all on the side of student government, I believe we are wiser to turn down the constitutional revision this week and go back to the drawing board (An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure). We can adopt the revision in the name of cooperation but what are we going to say when these problems surface in the coming year (or two)?

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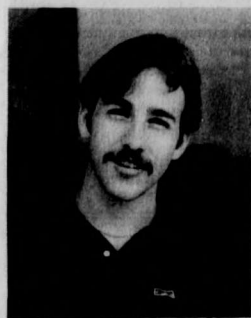

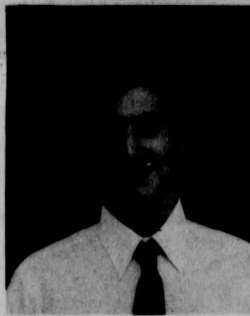

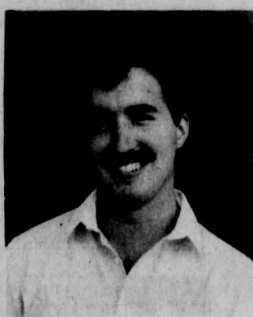

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## CSUN ELECTION RULES

The CSUN Fall elections will be held on October 17th and 18th. There will be polls set up in the following locations: Moyer Student Union, Thomas and Estella Beam Hall, John S. Wright Hall, Flora Dungan Humanities Building, John Dickinson Library, Carlson Education Building, and Janita Greer White Hall. The polls in MSU, FDH, and JDL will be opened from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. All other polls will be open from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. on both days of the election.

Students must present legal, state-issued I.D. with social security number printed and name (i.e. drivers license, UNLV I.D., or military I.D.). All students may vote on the constitutional question, but a student may vote for senate candidates only on the ballot for the college of which the student is a member. The number of votes in the senate election will depend on the college. There are three votes allowed in Academic Advisement, 4 in Arts & Letters, 5 in Business & Economics, 1 in Health Science, 2 in Hotel Administration, 2 in Education, 3 in Science, Math & Engineering. More than one ballot cast by any voter in the same college will result in invalidation of those ballots.

Voters are instructed to use the utensil supplied to punch out the chip on the supplied computer card ballot. If the ballot is damaged, bent, or otherwise distorted, it may be deemed invalid. For any further information concerning the election, see Catherine Clay, Election Board Chairman, through CSUN offices.

## CSUN SENATE *Inside*

AT THE LAST MEETING OF THE SENATE...the Senate closed nominations to fill the vacant Senate seats in Academic Advisement, with Ron Mortensen and Denise Andersen as those who will be seated at the next Senate meeting, serving through October 31st. Mortenson has filed with no contest to retain that seat; Andersen will not be running to retain her seat.

THE SENATE APPROVED A BILL...S.B. 2 proposed by B&E Senator Gus Varona that limits "double-dipping" by not allowing the chairman or department head not to collect wages for other services of his committee or department while also receiving a stipend (monthly salary). The motion, seconded by Senate President Pro Tempore James Ohriner, passed without objection.

TKE WAS GIVEN \$150...for the clean-up work after the NSA Voter Registration Drive. It was stated that, although there may not have been a lot of work involved, NSA had agreed to give them the amount.

TWO DONATIONS WERE FINALIZED...one donation to the Communications Computergraphic project of \$1,000.01 was approved with no opposition (avoiding an override of a veto of that amount less one cent by Vice President Fischer, who did so as acting President during President Anderson's absence). Also, \$1,200 donation was made for a documentary called "Lost City." There was no opposition on it either. These two votes, although finalized without "no" votes, were discussed for nearly one and a half hours, with objections and clarifications to both projects.

5 ORGANIZATIONS WERE APPROVED...including the Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternities, the History Club, the Heterosexual Society, and Women in Science and Engineering. In other organization items, the Senate approved a \$142 request from the Student Council for Exceptional Children for their fall reception held earlier this month. The idea of charging \$5 for non-recognized organizations to use CSUN mail boxes was not discussed, there being no appetite for the proposal.

A \$5,000 TRANSFER...to the Yellin' Rebel account was made from the contingency account. According to Editor Karen Cohen, the loan was needed to avoid cash flow problems. The Senate was informed the Yellin' Rebel was in a better financial position than anticipated, but that the loan was needed due to Controller's Office accounting methods.

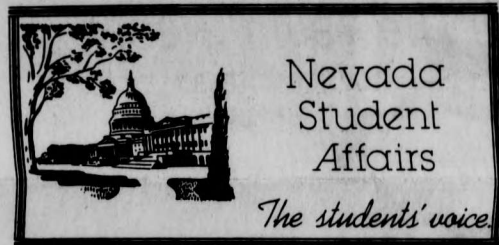
IN DISCUSSION...Senator Holm, Arts & Letters, cited a need to develop an investigative body for the Senate to look into the contracts, donations, and other matters. Senate President Pro Tempore Ohriner offered to help author such a proposal, which is likely to be considered and acted upon at the next Senate meeting.

Nevada Student Affairs is the department developed by the CSUN Senate to act as the political arm of the students in relation to other political entities affecting the students of UNLV. Some of their scheduled activities include surveys of students and the needs expressed; and the development of a lobby group to work in Carson City lobbying the Nevada Legislature for the needs of UNLV and the students.

Some of the major complaints of citizens, and students in particular, is that government is not responsive to the needs of the people. NSA hopes to coordinate some of these needs into a plan of action and fight for UNLV. The State Legislature will be considering several vital issues that could well determine the solvency, credibility, and growth of UNLV for years to come. The establishment of an accredited, well-supplied engineering school at the UNLV campus is one key issue NSA will be working on. In addition, funding for faculty, capital improvements, etc. will be items that NSA will be attempting to work for.

Of course, the NSA activities are not limited to these projects. Work with the UNS Regents on several issues concerning student housing, expanding to scope of student involvement, tuition costs, and growth of community life on campus will be of special concern.

The NSA, directed by Michelle DeTillio is in need of students who wish to serve as staff members, assigned to work on these various programs. It could involve something as trivial as interviewing, typing, and recording survey material to the excitement of going to Carson City to lobby the Legislature or participate in a local Regents meeting.

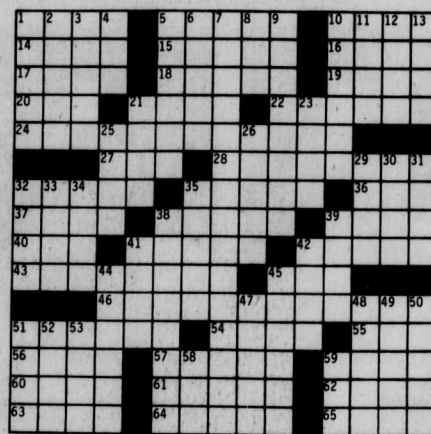

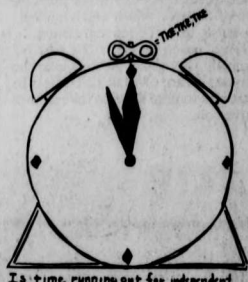

# The Dining Room opens in Black Box Theatre

Opening in UNLV's Black Box Theatre last weekend was A.R. Gurney Jr.'s *The Dining Room*. The play centers on a fading part of American tradition, the large wooden table that was frequently the center of activities such as family reunions, heart-to-heart talks, major family decisions and dinner parties.

It's not just the history of one table and one family, but rather of the happenings around a typical table in the dining room of upper-middle class New England W.A.S.P.s.

This makes for constantly changing scenes (some even overlap), characters and situations. The only things consistent throughout are the table, the New England W.A.S.P. attitude and the fine performances by the six UNLV actors in portraying 36 or so characters.

Director Paul Harris does a pretty good job of getting the cast to differentiate among characters. With occasional exceptions, the cast did a creditable job in age differentiation. One actress, for example, portrayed a child of eight in one scene and a 70 year-old in the next. It's fun for the audience and challenging for the actors. Mark-Louis Walters does an outstanding job as a very old, rickety and somewhat feisty grandfather whose young relatives constantly hit him up for money. Robert Welsh plays the nervous and timid grandson who wants funds to go to a private school - good scene.

Another good scene occurs under

the table. Jon Albrecht plays a man who comes to fix the table of a woman played by Deborah Eggars. It seems there will be more than just a repaired table, as the electricity between the two gradually increases.

The scene that got the biggest response from the audience involved Maite Garcia, as a well-to-do aunt,

and Robert Welsh as her nephew. The aunt brings out all the standard eating equipment such as finger-bowls, fine goblets and pistol-handled knives, while the nephew captures the action with his camera and his note pad. Later, he reveals he's engaged in an anthropology project on a vanishing culture,

specifically his aunt's WASPish dinner ritual.

Linda Woods does a commendable job as a senile old woman who seems to have forgotten everything at a Thanksgiving dinner. She also steals the scene as a feisty maid in an earlier act.

Performances are scheduled for Oct. 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, and 27 at 8 p.m. and Oct. 21 and 28 at 2 p.m. Call 739-3801 for reservations.

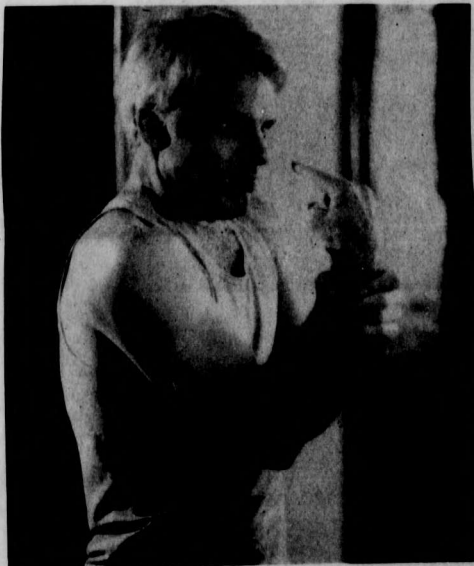
isn't very thrilled and sets about to get rid of her.

## Vinyl view: Azymuth's Flame strong

Keyboardist Jose Roberto Betrami, bassist Alex Malhieros, and percussionist Ivan Conti, known collectively as Azymuth, have just released their sixth album.

Those of us who anxiously awaited the follow-up to the powerhouse album *Rapid Transit* now have something to listen to. True, *Flame* falls a bit short of the intense energy found on *Rapid Transit*, but *Flame* is nonetheless a strong showing for the Latin-fusion wizards we've come to know and enjoy.

Having heard most of Azymuth's albums (save three releases available only in Brazil), the band seems to have peaked with *Rapid Transit*; *Flame* is merely a leveling off. Technically, *Flame* is Azymuth's best release to date, but it lacks the hard driving punch of such tunes as *Rapid Transit*'s "Make Mine Guanana." The trio is joined by some rather heavy company on this new album. Latin trumpeter Marcio Montarroyos helps out, and Brazilian vocalist Flora Purim is heard on "Textile Factory," which she cowrote. Flamenco guitarist Luiz Octavio Bernier is heard on and off with his perky guitar licks.

### TFN Character Profile: Dr. Johnson Smith

Have you ever said to yourself, "I oughta write a book?" Well, you needn't bother, because the subject's probably already been covered by the world's most prolific author, Dr. Johnson Smith.

Dr. Smith (Johnson to his friends) divides his time between counseling the TFN staff, writing books, and appearing on talkshows. 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# Rebels hold off go-for-broke Idaho State

The UNLV Rebels, with the help of five interceptions, held off a go-for-broke Idaho State squad Saturday night, 33-20.

Running back Kirk Jones rushed for 115 yards (his third consecutive game over 100) and ran for two touchdowns to lead the Rebels. Quarterback Randall Cunningham had his best night of the year as he completed 21 of 26 passes for 274 yards and one TD.

UNLV took over with 10:12 in the first quarter after winning the toss and choosing to kick-off to the Bengals. The Rebels immediately marched 76 yards in just seven plays to score the first points of the game. The first play, Cunningham passed to Michael McDade for six yards. The second, Randall gave the ball to Kirk Jones for eight. The third, he completed a pass to Tony Gladney for 17. Down the field the Rebels marched. Kicker Joey DiGiovanna had his extra-point blocked to leave the score at 6-0.

With 6:13 in the first, defensive back Ed Saignes of UNLV intercepted Vern Harris' pass. On this possession, it took the Rebels just three plays to travel 80 yards for their second TD. Cunningham handed off to Tony Lewis for eight, scrambled for 35, and then completed a 37 yard pass to Tony Gladney for their se-

cond score. Cunningham then scored on the conversion to bring the Rebel lead to 14-0.

But the problem was that that was the end of the good fortune for UNLV in the first half. Idaho State scored with 1:12 after Randall fumbled on the Bengal 14 yard line. The PAT was good and the first quarter score was 14-7.

Idaho quickly scored again in the second quarter. They went 80 yards in only six plays to tie the score. Vern Harris connected with receiver Nick Olsen for a 44 yard TD.

UNLV could do nothing for the second straight possession of the quarter. Finally, Randall was intercepted by Idaho safety Paul Koetter. The Bengals capitalized on the interception and Perry Larson booted an awesome 47 yard field goal.

The Rebels retaliated with a 22 yard FG by DiGiovanna but in turn, Idaho State kicked one with two seconds left in the half.

Trailing at halftime, the Rebels came out determined in the second half. On their second possession, UNLV took the ball 80 yards in 10 plays to score. After a pass completion to Michael McDade for 20 yards and then a reverse to McDade for 26, Tony Lewis took the ball into the end zone from the one.

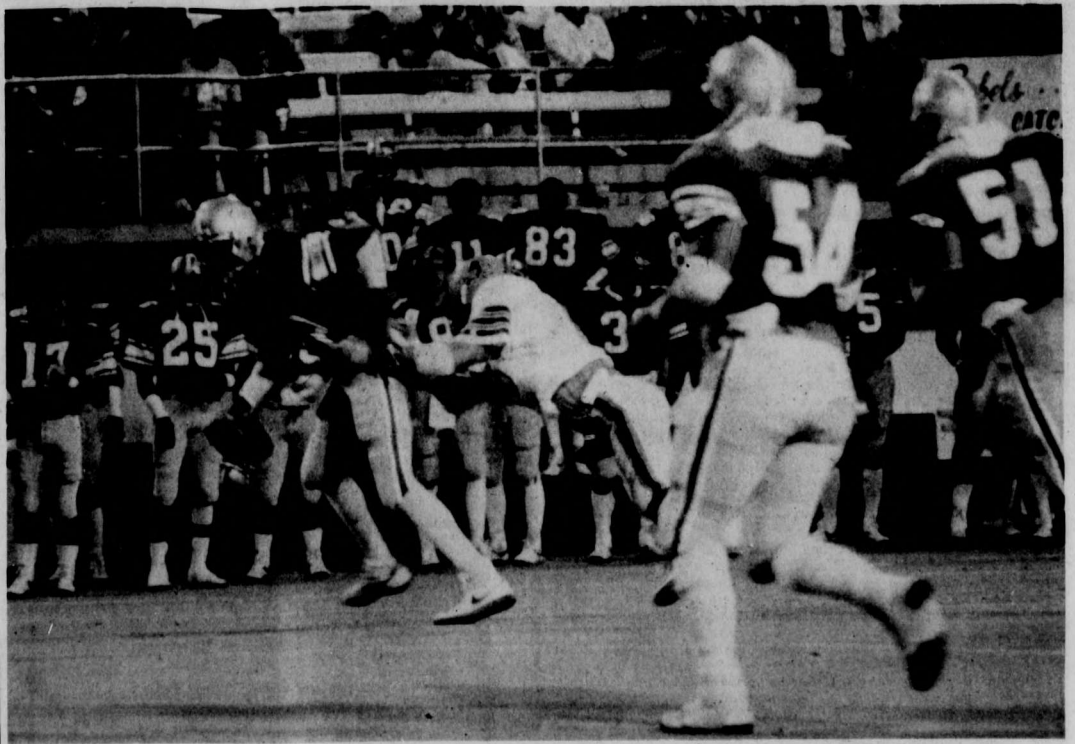

## Men's cross country: best showing ever

The UNLV men's and women's cross-country teams returned from the prestigious Stanford Cross-Country Invitational this past weekend. The men's squad had their best showing ever, taking seventh in a field of over 30 teams. The Rebels finished with 212 total points. The team winner in the men's division powerhouse Arizona, compiling 27 points.

Individually, the Rebels were led by junior Ron Castonguay. Castonguay captured 20th with an excellent time of 31:39.7. He was followed by teammate Tony Moseley who finished in 26th with a time of 32:05.7.

"I was very pleased with both Ron's and Tony's performance," Coach Strong said. "They are progressing better than I had hoped. Now all we need is for the rest of the team to catch up with them...but everyone is improving daily."

The individual winner of the men's division was Peter Brett from Fresno State University. He outdistanced all other competitors with a time of 30:21.1.

The winner of the women's division was host school Stanford with 23 points. The Cardinals were led by Regina Jacobs who broke the school and course record with a first place time of 16:15.6.
