"I had applied for a promotion and the pressure was on me to withdraw my request. I was called at my home, at night and asked to meet with him, not in his office, but on campus grounds, where I was told that if I did not withdraw the request, it would be held against me when my tenure was due to be considered," he said.

"In a seperate incident, this same chairman also told a colleague of mine, 'If he were to just withdraw the promotion, everything would be fine. But he

This professor now said he feels that he has no choice but to approach the State Department of Labor with his frustrations.





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International poet visits UNLV

Poet Susann Flammang will be one of the several guests to appear during Animal **Awareness** Week", which will occur March 24 to 28

Flammang, who is active in human, as well as animal rights, has been publishing poems all over the world for the last seven years.

"I personally cannot bare to see human suffering at all," Flammang said. "I also believe all animals have a spirit in them...and they suffer just the way humans suffer."

Flammang expresses her concern for human rights in her poems. She has been writing since the age 10, but decided, at the age of 29, that poetry has a definite purpose, to raise people's consciousness about world hunger or animal rights or peace. That was when she decided to begin publishing her

Flammang is also the her poetry. founder and president of two organizations. She founded the "Family of God," an international peace organization with membership in 17 countries, two years ago. She also founded "World Harvest," a non-profit organization for world hunger, a year ago.

Flammang authored 30 books of poetry. She has also had many poems published in magazines, anthologies, newsletters and literary journals around the world.

Her latest book is called Poets for Africa which is similar to USA For Africa, except "this is actually for poets."

All proceeds from Poets For Africa will go for hunger relief in Africa.

Flammang said she believes one of the best ways to overcome the human and animal suffering in the world is by raising people's awareness of the problem. She said she chose to do that through

She has recently been a recipient of the 1986 Clark County Humanitarian Award.

Dr. Thomas Regan, a professor of Philosophy at North Carolina, who has been nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in his case for animal rights, will be a special guest lecturer Wednesday, March 25, at 7:30 pm in the Artemus Ham Concert Hall.

Flammang has been chosen to appear during the presentation to give a poetry reading.

According to Linda Levine, an active member of SETA, said Flammang was chosen as a guest poet because "world hunger is directly related to factory farming and animal abuse."

While thousands of people are starving, large quantities of grain are grown to feed the animals to be slaughtered for human consumption.

For the last month or so, the CSUN Constitution Revisionment Committee has been meeting in an effort to update and simplify the CSUN Constitution. I am a member of that committee.

Because of the legal ramifications that a document of this sort could have, our meetings have lasted an average of one to three hours. Needless to say, this is not a 'glamour committee'. We have had our disagreements, we have fought over the placing of a comma, but overall the committee has worked hard and has always kept the students in mind.

Two Thursdays ago we presented our findings to the entire CSUN senate. You see, for a CSUN Constitution to be changed, the senate must approve the new Constitution, then the Board of Regents, and finally it is put up to the students for their vote. It is a long and complicated process and one that has been put off for several years now.

Anyway, that senate meeting lasted from 4pm to 9pm — some senators even gave up going to the last Rebel home game of the season. See, your senators are working for you!

We went over two-thirds of the proposed revisions, and there were certain problems with parts of our new changes. The major one being the proposal that graduate students and special students be included in CSUN's membership.

I, for one, am totally in favor of including as many students as possible in our CSUN membership. Why? Simple. For one reason, CSUN is not exactly beating students away from its doors. We need to pursue every avenue available to try and get more students involved in CSUN committees, activities, etc.

For another reason, many of the things CSUN does, already involves graduate students. If we extend the library hours during finals, grad students can use it as well, if we fund the CSUN/UNLV Pre-School, grads can also use it, free Bud books, scantrons, typewriters and all of the other services CSUN offers are also available to grads.

One of my favorite reasons is: BECAUSE GRAD STUDENTS REALLY CARE ABOUT WHAT IS GOING ON AT UNLV AND AT CSUN! This theory was more

than proven last Wednesday and Thursday during the CSUN Executive Board elections. Many campaigners myself included, told stories about talking to an interested student about the issues in this election, having that student agree to go in and vote, only to discover they are grad students and CAN'T vote.

If this new constitution is approved, the only major change as far as graduates are concerned is that they could vote in CSUN elections and that the Graduate College would be given one seat on the CSUN senate.

Linda Mitchell: Linda is the current president of the Graduate Student Association(GSA). She recently issued a letter (sounded like a vicious, personal attack on Bill Haldeman) which said that she had read in the Yellin' Rebel that CSUN wanted to include the GSA in its membership.

WRONG

Read the article again Linda, it says we want to include GRADUATE STUDENTS in CSUN not the GSA!

And while your input as a GSA member is welcomed, whether or not we decide to include graduate students, depends on the CSUN senate, the Board of Regents, and the undergraduate students of UNLV, who will be the ones voting on the new Constitution.

Whether or not the graduate students take advantage of it or not, is up to them. But, I know they will.

For future reference please try to act a little bit more mature, and don't let your hatred for Bill get in the way of your thinking process. Bill Haldeman is a member of our Constitutional Revisionment Committee and although we've had our disagreements, he has spent numerous hours working with us and has provided valuable advice and input.

Next time, please think about the good of the graduate students first and about personal biases second.

Next week I'll share all the exciting, innovative ideas that CSUN students shared with me during the elections. The best part of CSUN elections is getting to know different students across campus (I was at White Hall this year and had a blast!) listening to their ideas, comments and criticisms.

Constitution explained

The proposal submitted by the CSUN Constitution Revision Committee to the Senate is to streamline the document and make it easier to use. The revision would also grant membership to special and graduate

The second goal seems to need some explanation. Only a few years ago, CSUN membership was limited only to matriculated undergraduates taking seven or more credits. This limited CSUN membership with all its privileges and services to only about 5,000 students (a little over half of the student body at that time). Through a Judicial Council ruling and later Constitutional Revisionment, CSUN membership was extended to matriculated undergraduates taking less than seven credits. Because of the large number of part time students at UNLV, this action has nearly doubled CSUN's size.

More students have the right to participate in CSUN functions and give their input in how CSUN operates.

Now, there is a new revision proposed that will extend CSUN membership to special and graduate students. CSUN will become obligated to serve the entire student body. CSUN will benefit by having input from anyone who is a member of the UNLV student body. No student will be prevented from participating in CSUN functions or receiving CSUN services.

This revision will not dissolve the GSA. The GSA will be every bit as necessary to represent the special needs of graduate students to the administration, faculty and regents; and to provide special services to serve those needs.

One important difference will be that the GSA will be free to put its limited resources more efficiently to

those purposes.

About 1,500 special students would receive representation, and a voice in the University of Nevada for the first time. Currently, special students may earn up to 15 credits and take as many classes as they like for their own personal benefit, but they have no voice in the system.

In both cases, CSUN will benefit by having a greater pool of human resources to draw from and a voice nearly 13,000 strong. It is not exactly as though people are banging on the doors to participate. CSUN needs members on its boards, committees and directorships to provide its services to the student body.

What I will say is that the only way the spread of disease can be prevented is the use of condoms, and the best way to get information to everyone about condoms and their use is to use the media in every way possible.

Advertising isn't the cure-all of course, the cure-all is the willingness of each and every person, men especially, to take responsibility for their own personal safety and for the safety of those around

Bill proposed for mandatory seat belt use

A bill proposing mandatory safety belt use will be introduced today in the Nevada Senate. Requested by the Subcommittee to Study Restraining Costs of Medical Care, the bill requires belt use in vehicles under 6,000 pounds to be secondarily enforced in connection with another violation, and to carry a fine of up to \$25. If

passed, Nevada will join 24 other states in making the use of safety belts mandatory.

The bill is supported by Nevada Traffic Safety Now, (NTSN) a statewide coalition chaired by former state Senator Spike Wilson of Reno. The Coalition's member-

ship is over 500 and increasing daily.

Susan Haase, Executive Director of NTSN, attributes some of the interest in the Coalition to basic economics. "Of course, everyone wants to see lives saved and needless tragedies prevented, but additionally increasing numbers of Nevadans view safety belt legislation as a practical solution to limited public resources. The taxpaying public assistance. For example, the National Head Injury Foundation, has stated the cost of lifetime care for a person who sustains a serious head injury in an accident could total between \$4 and \$9 million. These costs are born by society and that makes safety belts everyone's business."

Twenty-four states have manadatory seat belt laws. Those in the West include California, Utah, New Mexico, Washington, and Hawaii. On the island Oahu, the law is credited with reducing traffic fatalities by 50 percent. In California the Highway Patrol believes the law is responsible for decreasing traffic deaths in spite of increased travel and more accidents. New Mexico's passenger car traffic deaths decreased 18 percent at the same time traffic deaths involving pick-up trucks (not

covered by the law) increased 12 percent.

Courts around the country have upheld the constitutionality of safety belt laws, rejecting claims that the laws invade the individual's right to privacy. They cite the drain on private and public financial resources caused by highway accidents as legitimate reasons for society's interest in minimizing injuries resulting form such accidents. A Massachusetts court writes: "From the moment of the injury, society picks the person up off the highway; delivers him to a municipal hospital and municipal doctors; provides him with unemployment compensation if, after recovery, he cannot replace his lost job, and, if the injury causes permanent disability, may assume the responsibility for his and his family's continued subsistence. We do not understand a state of mind that permits plaintiff to think that only he himself is concerned."

'it's ironic that many people opposed to safety belt laws believe the laws are an attempt to force them to protect themselves, a decision they believe should be theirs alone to make," stated Haase. "In fact, belt laws may be society's attempt to protect itself from the unbelted driver; the financial burden he may become if he's seriously injured; the deadly threat he poses to pedestrians and everyone else on the road if he's thrown away from the steering wheel and unable to control his car in a collision."

Haase's major concern is that those supporting the bill will assume it will pass and not make their support known to their legislators. "Those who support this issue tend to think the facts in favor of belt laws are so overwhelming that they speak for themselves. Legis- lators look at facts, but they like to hear from constituents, too. Supporters will have to be visible and vocal."

Nevada Traffic Safety's goal is information and public education to boost compliance with the safety belt law after passage. For information, the group's toll free number is 1-800-334- 7477.



Three space sculptures on display at Alta Ham

Three Installations, an architectural sculpture and mosaic exhibition by noted New York artist Ned Smyth, will open March 16 in UNLV's Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall Lobby.

Thirty-six pieces representing the progression of styles in Smyth's work will be presented in this exhibition, which is being sponsored by the Nevada Institute for Contemporary Art and funded by a donation from architects George G. Tate and William E. Snyder.

Reflecting a strong architectural influence, the exhibition contains "installation sculpture" that is actually installed to fit in a specific site or environment and total architectural space.

Smyth interprets many historical styles and universal symbols in a contemporary manner to create an aura of reverence. Of his work, the artist said his primary aim is to evoke in the viewer "a gut reaction of joy and awe.'

As a child, Smyth spent many years abroad visiting cathedrals and museums with his father, Craig Smyth, a noted Italian renaissance art images

sculptures are large castconcrete geometric forms weighing hundreds of pounds. These appear in the first arrangement, which included colonades and fonts that refer to both early Italian religious art in their form, and to contemporary sculpture in their use of simple, modular concrete forms.

The second environmental installation is composed of colored concrete ings. It features "Stahahe Sphere," a 1,000-pound mounted globe of colored concrete, which was included in the Museum of national Survey of Recent Painting and Sculpture."

It will be surrounded by a number of columnar Manhattan. pieces and a series of patchwork fabric hangings which Smyth produced at The Fabric Workshop in Philadelphia.

Rebels took the PCAA title and will continue to the NCAA finals

There was a sense of deja vu around the Los Angeles Forum over the weekend. All of the seven other teams had been to the Pacific Coast Athletic Association tournament before to face UNLV and all had seen similar results

This year was no different than the previous four. The Runnin' Rebels ran away

The helpless victim this time around was San Jose State. The Spartans were

just fuel in UNLV's fire as they posted a 94-69 loss.

In front of 11,681 screaming fans, most wearing Rebel red, UNLV posted the widest margin of victory ever in the PCAA tournament final game.

San Jose State's Ricky Berry led the Spartans with 19 points, which allowed Berry to set a new school record for points in a single season at 546.

UNLV finishes conference play at 21-0 and is 33-1 overall. San Jose State falls to 16-14 overall.

Cal-State Long Beach and Cal-State Fullerton were the first two teams to put their heads on the UNLV chopping block, with the 49er's falling 105-70 and the Titans falling 99-65.

"The degree of intensity that our kids are capable of playing with is almost beyond belief," UNLV coach Jerry Tarkanian said, "I don't think I've ever had a team that plays as hard as this team plays."

UNLV burst out to a three point lead on a shot by Gerald Paddio from the 19 foot 9 inch line. UNLV was 11 of 23 in three-pointers for the game.

San Jose had a one point lead early on but it was all they could manage against the powerful Rebel defense.

For the game the Spartans shot 43 percent from the floor with only 32 percent falling in the first half.

All of this offense and defense was done without team general and floor leader Mark Wade, who is out with ligament trouble in his knee.

'For our guys to win like this without Mark is really incredible because Mark runs our ballclub, he's the heart of our defense. When I found out that Mark couldn't play today, I legitimately felt real sick about this game," Tarkanian

San Jose State committed 26 turnovers, tying a tournament record they set seven years ago, due to UNLV's pressure defense that worked with extreme precision.

"I thought the defensive pressure really hurt us, especially when we went to the bench. They did an excellent job of causing us to go out of our gameplan," said Spartan coach Bill Berry, Ricky's father.

UNLV built up the lead with about 10 minutes to go in the first half by holding San Jose State to 10 points in the last 10 minutes.

UNLV guard Freddie Banks had 15 points in the first half with Paddio adding 10 more. Banks was the games leading scorer with 20 and Paddio

finished with 18. The last six minutes were especially destructive for San Jose State. While scoring only 2 points UNLV added 14.

Jarvis Basnight and Stacey Cvijanovich each hit some free-throws to start off the run. Richard Robinson added a bucket, Basnight then got the steal and the layin. Paddio goes up to the big slam to put the Rebels up by 22

Anthony Perry added the final two Spartan points of the half before Paddio got another two points on a 17-foot jumper. Banks added three for good measure to open the gap to 27.

The second half was no different. UNLV was never down by less then 21 and no matter who was in, the Rebels had almost cleared their bench by the halfway mark of the first half, the defense held strong and the offense was always there outside or inside.

Even though UNLV practically walked untouched through the PCAA regular season, many thought that the PCAA tournament would bring a different outcome.


Well, Thursday night's first round game for UNLV against the Cal

State Long Beach 49ers did nothing but boost my confidence that the Rebels would come to the Forum and chew up and then spit out any team that got in its way to winning the tournament title.


