According to O'Neill, in missile crisis, the government was spending lots of money on civil defense and the shelters were stocked with empty water barrels, crackers, candy and medical and sanitation kits.

Since then, said O'Neill, most of the stock is gone except for water barrels and sanitation kits. Now less money is spent and there are no replacements so people would have to bring their own supplies.
