

# Seven UNLV professors come down against Bork

With the nomination of Robert Bork to the Supreme Court came sharp cries of protest from individuals and groups

concerned with civil and private rights.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Nevada ran an ad in the Sunday, Oct. 4, *Review Journal* with a list of reasons why Nevadans should urge

Senators Harry Reid and Chic Hecht to reject Bork's nomination.

The ad also listed the names of many of the state's prominent citizens who support the ACLU's stand, including seven

professors at UNLV.

Since Bork was voted down by the senate judiciary committee, speculation abounds around Washington that he will remove his name from the nomination.

Several of the professors expressed different reasons for opposing Bork.

Dr. Christopher Hudgins said, "Bork's academic writing and previous judicial decisions show that he is insensitive to matters of civil liberties."

Hudgins also said Bork would tilt the court towards the political right.

Dr. Michael Bowers, Assistant Professor of Political Science and ACLU activist, disagrees with Bork's argument that there is no right to privacy under the constitution and

with his interpretation of the equal protection clause.

"I don't think Bork ought to be confirmed," said Dr. Gary Jones, also a political science instructor. "Probably the basic reason was summed up by Joe Biden when he said that Bork thinks the only rights people have are those specifically stated in the constitution."

Other professors whose names were in the ad include Ronald W. Smith, Frederick Preston, Satish Sharma and Vernon Mattson.

Help for new businesses is available through the UNLV office of the Nevada Small Business Development Center.

Sharolyn Craft, NSBDC director, said a fulltime professional staff is available to assist small businesses with management problems.

In addition, the Center can arrange for other assistance such as aid from faculty members in engineering, agriculture and business administration, as well as the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE) and other private sector volunteers.

Craft said the Center, funded through UNR and the U.S. Small Business Administration, focuses on growth and development of small businesses in

Nevada and on helping businessman develop and maintain management skills.

The Center can provide assistance for management problems such as marketing, cash flow analyses, new business start-ups, and international trade, according to Craft.

Seminars can be arranged on writing, supervisory skills, clerical and office skills, occupational training and computer-related training. The seminars are held at UNLV and Clark County Community College.

"Any small business interested is welcome to a one-on-one confidential counseling," Craft said.

Center services are free and those interested can call (702) 739-0852 to set up an appointment. The center is open 8am to noon and 1pm to 5pm, Monday-Friday.
