But, when the action starts, it is in the best tradition of Cornelius Ryan's historical works on the Second World War, exciting and personal.

After finishing the work (725 pages), I put it down and began to think about the current Arms treaty and how even Reagan could have been duped into letting his guard down and giving the Soviets the military edge they need to conquer the world.

B.M.O.C. stands for Big Men On Campus and they are the newest of the post-Beastie line of white rappers. Their new 12 inch release Play That Funk, on Sire records, has just been released. Meanwhile, the Miami Sound is hitting Vegas. I have been making contacts in the record world with record companies out of the Miami area, and this stuff is great. One record in particular has caught my attention in a grand way. It was actually released last year, but as always, it took a while to get to Vegas. Jealous Fella's by Dimples Tee (on Bass Station records and recently moved to Sun Town Records) very simply put - kicks butt! If you liked Push It, this will blow you away. Once again, it is female rap, but unlike Salt and Pepa, Dimples Tee has a driving beat coupled with some good production work. Production award of the week (not an actual award, but it sounded good) goes to Mercury Records for their release of Sweet Talk by Angela Chapin. The song is O.K., but the production effects on the remix are excellent.

For alternative music, Canadian Artist's Chris and Cosey have a fairly new album on the Nettwerk label (which, by the way, are putting out some great stuff lately.) The album is entitled Exotica, and though this column usually centers on 12 inch releases, this entire album is mentionable. My two favorite tracks on this are Vengeance and Confusion.

A member of Cameo has released a solo effort on Epic records. Charlie Singleton (with Modern man) has a single entitled Nothing Ventured, Nothing Gained, and it has a definite Cameo funk style. Two other tracks that are worth mentioning in the New Music genre are Agent of Liberty by Mike Mareen (on ZYX Records), and No Stars by Figures on a Beach (on master records label Sire). All in all, some great material is being released in the dance scene. Hopefully, more of it will get exposure in Vegas so it will be available for your ears.
