### Panel

The Army's Current Affairs Panel will present *U.S. Goals and Interests in Central America* as part of the next University Forum Series presentation Feb. 29, 7:30 p.m., in Frank and Estella Beam Hall, Rm. 242.

The free, public event is sponsored by UNLV's College of Arts and Letters.

The six-member panel is comprised of five U.S. Army War College students and a faculty moderator who visit more than 25 college campuses each year. Established in 1969, the panel tries to encourage dialogue on national security issues between the Army's senior military educational institution and the nation's college students and community members.

### Spring enrollment

Once again UNLV is posting a record enrollment as unofficial, preliminary figures for Spring Semester 1988 indicate a headcount of 13,316, up from 12,368 last spring. That represents an increase of 948 students (7.7 percent) in credit courses.

"We didn't anticipate so large an enrollment increase this spring," said President Robert C. Maxson. "We have set another record, as we did last spring."

Last fall's enrollment also broke the previous record, with a total of almost 14,000.

"I see this as a wonderful endorsement of our academic programs at UNLV," Maxson said.

"We are continuing to attract the best, brightest students not only from Nevada's high schools, but from the general population as well."

Maxson noted that continued record enrollments are beginning to cause a space problem at the university, *but it's a good problem to have.*

### Play Auditions

Auditions for the UNLV production of *The Boy Friend*, a spoof of 1920s musicals, are set for March 2, 7-10 p.m., and March 3, 4-7 p.m., in the Judy Bayley Theatre.

### Hilton Donation

Hilton Hotels Corp. gave UNLV's College of Hotel Administration a \$10,000 donation Tuesday during a recruitment-fair luncheon in Frank and Estella Beam Hall on campus. It is the first part of a \$20,000 donation to be made over a two-year period.

"The support of good corporate citizens like the Hilton Hotels Corp. has enabled us to build one of the most outstanding hotel-administration programs in the country," said UNLV President Robert C. Maxson. "This kind of support is a vote of confidence in our academic programs by one of Nevada's leading businesses."

The donation, which may be used in the college at the discretion of the dean, was presented by John Giovenco, president of the corporation's Nevada Division; and William McDonald, senior vice president for human resources.

on the College of Hotel Administration as concrete evidence of our continuing commitment to a growing and vital university."

College Dean Jerry Vallen noted, "This is another example of the Hilton's partnership with us. ### UNLV demands fair slice of funds

Members of student government say UNR gets the gravy

With a "pin" the watermain requested the (face) list but on the table. "This is what happens to UNLV," said Steve Evenson, president of the student senate at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. "We get equalized in terms of funding. "We want to get our share of the watermain." The student senate was part of a press conference at which several members of the student government announced their intention to work to ensure UNLV receives an equitable share of state money for student services. Evenson and student senators Jennifer McGinty and Jack Spicer provided statistics to back up what they say is an unfair allocation of state support between UNLV and the University of Nevada, Reno. There are 100,000 in campus security, financial aid, health ser-

UNLV, he said. "Students would be willing to pay a health fee, but without the available space, which requires state funding, there can be little improvement in the service, he said. Spicer called UNLV's health of a "rotted service" that is incapable of providing more than the basics of services because of the lack of staff and space. The library also suffers from an epidemic, Evenson said. Based on the number of full-time students, the Reno campus library receives about \$100 more each year for each student than the Las Vegas campus, he said. "The library needs to grow and it needs to grow desperately," Evenson said. Patricia Galloway, public information director for the chancellor's office, countered that in some student services more money. Please see PAGE 10
