Scholarship

Academic scholarships are offered to UNLV students through various UNLV departments, outside agencies, and community organizations. Information regarding the following award may be obtained through Student Financial Services on the 3rd floor of the Humanities Building.

SCHOLARSHIPS: American Association of University Women Las Vegas Branch Scholarship

REQUIREMENTS: Applicants must be:
-female residents of southern Nevada
-enrolled at UNLV or CCCC a minimum of 9 credit hours

-have attained at least sophomore status

TERMS: This scholarship will be awarded based on need and merit. The recipient is eligible to apply for other AAUW scholarships.

The recipient is required at the end of the semester to make a report to the Scholarship Committee on her use of the scholarship. The form and content of the report will be determined by the recipient.

PROCEDURES: Application information can be obtained in Student Financial Services, 352A Humanities.

DEADLINE: The deadline for receipt of the completed application is a May 1 postmark. The recipient will be presented to the AAUW members at the May meeting, and funds will be disbursed after registration. Non-recipients will be notified in writing.

Presentation

Ken Knipe, the photographer for the Jacques Cousteau oceanic expeditions, will speak at UNLV March 29 at 8pm in the John S. Wright Hall

Auditorium.

The slide-illustrated presentation, titled "Rediscovery of the World," is sponsored by UNLV's Moyer Student Union Outdoor Recreation Program. Admission is \$3. For more information, call 739-3575.

Knipe will talk about the Cousteau Society expeditions and the adventures the crew faced during its activities. The presentation covers an ambitious five-year program in which the crew circled the globe to study how humanity is impacting the environment worldwide.

Conference

UNLV will host an astronomy conference, titled "New Advances in Spectrophotometry," March 28-30 at the Alexis Park Hotel.

More than 45 astronomers from around the world will attend the

conference. Approximately 25 sessions will be conducted on a variety of topics in this field of study, including "Stellar Winds and the Spectrophotometry of Hot Stars" and "Spectrophotometry and Eclipsing of Binary Stars."

Astronomers attending the conference will also discuss applications of new technology that will improve the instruments used in this area of study.

Spectrophotometry, which is the study of the relative intensity of light in different colors, is used by astronomers to examine stars. Using information from this field of study, astronomers can determine a great deal about stars, such as their temperatures and gravity.

Studies

UNLV will host an Early Studies Night for high school students interested in the university's Early Studies Program.

The event is set for May 3 at 7pm in the Moyer Student Union Fireside Lounge.

Students and their parents are invited to attend this information session. High school juniors with a 3.00 or higher GPA and sophomores with a 3.50 or higher GPA will be eligible for the program after completing this school year.

UNLV's Early Studies Program, administered by the Academic Advising and Resources Center, enables high school seniors and juniors to begin university study one or two years prior to high school graduation.

Reinstatement

The Academic Standards Committee Policies regarding Reinstatement after University Suspension:

As required by the Catalog, the student must have secured acceptance or reacceptance into a college or AARC (AARC may accept students with more than 29 credits.)

The Academic Standards Committee will not consider a reinstatement without a strong study plan. Such a plan must show no overload including work, etc., and appropriate repeats of "D" and "F" courses.

Academic Standards Committee generally approves reinstatement if all the following are satisfied: first time suspension; not more than semesters on probation; study plan showing appropriate repeats and a reasonable load (credits, work, and extracurricular activity); GPB is not worse than -25, and a student will probably be off suspension within 15 credits and off probation with 25; the appropriate College Dean approving; nothing in a record requiring special attention.

For a second suspension, the ASC generally approves reinstatement if a student has made good progress since the first reinstatement, according to a plan approved by the ASC, or if no plan was made at the time of first reinstatement, and all other requirements of the first reinstatement.

Academic Standards Committee considers reinstatements that do not meet the conditions of the former mentioned, but typically disapproves or sets very careful conditions on its approval.

Peace March

The Great Peace March is back again. After completing their 1986 march across the U.S. in protest against the arms race, they went to the Soviet Union in 1987.

Two hundred and thirty Americans were joined by as many Soviets in their 450 mile march from Leningrad to Moscow.

The first segment will be a walk between Washington D.C. and Philadelphia, Pa. The second part will consist of walking through the central plains and the whole state of Iowa. After flying from Iowa to Los Angeles, Ca. they will walk and bus to San Francisco, Ca.
