### Insurance Class

UNLV is offering basic insurance classes for agents, brokers, and solicitors who need to fulfill pre-licensing educational requirements.

"Life and Health Basics" and "Property-Casualty Basics" are offered monthly on the UNLV campus. The next month-long sessions of both classes are set for May 2-28.

Presented by the insurance program of the finance department in the College of Business and Economics, "Life and Health Basics" covers general principles of life and health insurance.

"Life and Health Basics" will meet Mondays and Wednesdays, 5:30-8pm, in Flora Dungan Humanities Building (FDH), Room 239; and Saturdays, 8am-noon, in FDH 216.

"Property-Casualty

Basics" will meet on the same days and times in Frank and Estella Beam Hall, Room 123.

"Property-Casualty Basics" focuses on coverages, policy provisions and concepts common to property and casualty insurance.

Both classes are taught by instructors who have been certified by the Nevada State Insurance Commissioner. Successful completion will earn students 3.6 CEUs for each class. The fee for each class is \$100.

A cooperation event co-sponsored by the College of Science and

Mathematics and the College of Engineering at UNLV, Clark County Community College, and UNR's Mackay School of Mines and College of Agriculture, it is designed to recognize the science teachers who prepare students for entrance into programs at the sponsoring institutions.

### C.A.R.S.

Starting April 18th, the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, will mail more than 15,000 CARS pre-registration packets to all currently enrolled UNLV students, all on-file returning students, and all newly admitted graduate students.

CARS (Computer Advance Registration System) is a computer method for requesting courses for the next term, Fall 1988. The system is unique in that students can complete all their registration through the mail and avoid having to run around campus for approvals and stand in the inevitable long lines.

The initial mailing packet will contain the CARS Course Request Form, a schedule of classes, an address verification form, and a stamped return envelope. Students complete the Course Request Form and return it (without payment) to the Registrar's Office by the July 1 deadline.

A computer scheduler determines the students' class schedule and automatically prints it along with a bill. Students' schedules and bills are sent approximately July 25, complete with a stamped return envelope. Students can then mail their payment or pay in person at the cashier's window in Maude Frazier Hall by Aug. 26 without late payment fees, but at latest by Sept. 2, subject to late fees.

Students participating in CARS will have the opportunity to adjust their schedules (drop/add) before non-CARS students are allowed to register.

Newly admitted undergraduate students will have the opportunity to pre-register using CARS if they participate in the early orientation sessions. (Call 739-0866 for orientation information).

Any returning or special students who are not currently attending may pre-

register by coming into the Registrar's Office after April 25 but before July 1 and completing a CARS Course Request Form.
