Earth, Wind and Fire latest Concert Under the Stars

bring its first tour in five years to the outdoor arena at Caesars Palace on Saturday night, Aug. 13.

With their newest album Touch the World certified gold only three weeks after its release, and single System of Survival a number-one hit on dance and rhythm & blues charts, the vocal/instrumental group is taking its \$1 million spectacle to 80

Earth, Wind & Fire will cities on three continents.

Like their live performances in the 1970s and early '80s, EWF's current musical happening comes complete sophisticated lighting, flashy costumes and special effects. Working with designer/producer Stig Edgren, who stage the finale for the 1984 Olympics, and Michael Peters, who choreographed videos for Michael Jackson, Earth, Wind & Fire continues a tradition of musical extravaganzas which began more than a decade ago.

From 1971 until 1983, they landed 30 singles on the pop charts, selling 40 million records and winning six Grammy awards. In live performances, they were the first touring rock band to employ lasers and recruit entertainment specialists to conceive grandiose magic feats and recorded solo LPs -- one special effects. Their success meant a new direction live pop/rock entertainment.

But in 1983, with no fanfare, no announcements of turmoil or retirement, EWF quietly disappeared. Leader and vocalist Maurice White made a solo album and produced for artists like Barbra Streisand and Neil Diamond. Vocalist Philip Bailey also which won a Grammy for Best Inspirational Performance. Group members went in different professional directions for the most part, White explains, because "We had been on the road for 10 years and needed a break."

In 1987, convinced that they could bring their music to another level, the group reunited, releasing Touch the World in November. The special musical magic they had sought was back, both in the studio and in the spotlight. At Caesars Palace, Earth, Wind & Fire performs one night only in the resort's outdoor arena. Showtime is 8pm, with a no-host poolside cocktail party scheduled at 6:30pm. Tickets are priced at \$15, \$20 and \$25, on sale now at Caesars Palace and all Ticketron outlets.
