The Big West. A Big Deal? Maybe.

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association's decision to change its name to the Big West Conference appears to be a step in the right direction towards gaining recognition for the fledgling conference. But only a small step.

The greatest benefit the conference may gain from the name change is a possible basketball television contract with ESPN. The Big West would have the third game of a tripleheader on Monday nights that ESPN calls "Big Monday". In past years Big Monday was doubleheader that included one game from both the Big East and Big Ten conferences.

If the television contract becomes a reality it will no doubt offer the conference some badly needed publicity as well as giving other Big West schools, outside of UNLY, a chance to appear on national television.

The Big West Conference will also have a television contract with the Prime Ticket Network, a southern California cable channel. Prime Ticket will televise a total of 51 Big West events including football, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, baseball and

The name change will also make it easier for the average fan to remember the name of the conference. The initials PCAA are difficult to decipher from the many other confernces across the country, for example, WCAC, ACC, SEC, MAC, SWC, ECAC. And if you were able to find someone who remembered the letters PCAA there was little chance that they actually knew what it stood for.

The Big West is short, concise, to the point and best of all, comprehensible.

A name change may solve the problem of name recognition, but it will not change the quality of the product. The problem with the PCAA in the past was that with the exception of UNLV basketball the conference was not competitive on a national level. If the Big West wants to achieve more popularity they must become competitive at the two major sports in college athletics, basketball and football.

This can only be done by having each member school put forth the necessary finances and by scheduling a higher level of competition. It will no doubt take time to achieve these goals, but the Big West Conference has the resources and the name that is needed.

The heart and "Seoul" of United States basketball comes to the Thomas and Mack on August 27 at 8 p.m. as the 1988 U.S. Olympic team takes on a group of NBA all-stars. The game will be the final contest in a series of exhibition games that will be played in different cities throughout the country.

The exhibition will allow Las Vegas residents to catch a glimpse of many of the country's finest basketball players, both amateur and professional, as well as offering the Olympians a final challenge before competing for the gold at the Summer Olympics in Seoul, South Korea.

The current Olympic Team roster is composed of 17 players. This number must be trimmed to 12 roster players and two alternates by September 2, but according to officials at Georgetown University, site of the basketball trials, the final cuts will be made prior to the series of exhibition games.

Some members still on a great chance to become the Olympic roster include UNLV sophomore Stacey Augmon, J.R. Reid of North Carolina, David Robinson of Navy, Danny Manning of Kansas, Hersey Hawkins of Bradley and Brian Shaw of Cal-Santa Barbara.

Although Olympic Coach John Thompson has refused to make comments on individual players or their chances of making the final squad, Augmon has been the most impressive defensive player at the trials and appears to have

the first UNLV player to compete on an U.S. Olympic Basketball Team.

The NBA roster for the exhibition tour is currently unavailable as the pros will be hand-picked prior to each game.
