UNLV may receive more state funds

UNLV will benefit if the 1989 State Legislature passes the Board of Regents proposed \$454.1 million budget, Regent Carolyn Sparks said.

"In the long run, UNLV will get their fair share," Sparks said. "We're hoping

that by 1991 things will be in the proper perspective."

"The budget will fund us more on a per student basis than a per program basis," Sparks said.

UNR has more programs than UNLV, but UNLV has 4,000 more students, so the basis for funding benefits UNLV more than it has in the past, Sparks explained.

One of the challenges the regents faced in formulating the new budget was that student enrollment was 5.5 percent above what was projected, Sparks said. The regents are requesting \$8.1 million just to fill in that gap, she said.

There are still inequities in the area of institutional support, Sparks said.

Salaries for institutional support people lag behind UNR salaries, Sparks said, and President Maxson is forced to take money from other funds to bring salaries up.

UNLV is still lagging behind UNR when it comes to replacing equipment, Sparks said.

UNR received over \$2

million for equipment replacement while UNLV received approximately \$1 million, Sparks said.

The regents are going to request 100 percent funding this year, Sparks said.

"We're not going to ask for less than 100 percent. What they (the legislature) gives us may be something else,"

Sparks said.

"Our students have waited long enough for their turn. We want UNLV to have their fair share."

The new dorms are turning the university into a full-fledged campus, Sparks said, and UNLV requires items in its budget that have never been needed before.

Student receives Ned Day Memorial Scholarship

A UNLV junior majoring in political science is the first recipient of the Ned Day Memorial Scholarship, named for the late Las Vegas newsman Ned Day.

Stacey Hanlon, 21, of Las Vegas was selected to receive the \$1,500 scholarship by a committee composed of

representatives of KLAS-TV 8, the Las Vegas Review Journal, Sigma Delta Chi professional journalism association, the Las Vegas community, and UNLV's College of Arts and Letters. She is interested in news broadcasting.

The death of the well

known newspaper and television reporter shocked the Las Vegas community on Sept. 3, 1987. The scholarship fund in his memory was established to continue the tradition of solid journalism, unbiased reporting, and unwavering support of the First Amendment and the respon-

sibilities of a free press.

"Ned Day was a highly principled journalist who took his responsibilities to his community and his profession very seriously," UNLV President Robert C. Maxson said. "We are proud to remember Ned by presenting this scholarship in

his name, and we are confident that Stacey Hanlon and future recipients will make their own contributions to the profession of journalism."

The Ned Day Memorial Scholarship is available to undergraduate students majoring in political science, communication studies, or

English, and who demonstrate a strong interest in pursuing a career in broadcast or print journalism.

Contributions to the Ned Day Memorial Scholarship Fund may be made through the UNLV Foundation.
