## New student security

security service.

Outside security will still be needed for events with a large box office take or for other large money collections. Enoch said that a new firm would be retained for those times.

The system is expected to cost \$35,000 in its first year, providing 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. campus coverage. The Thomas and Mack Center is not included in the \$35,000 figure.

Hollenbeck hopes to receive between \$15,000 and \$17,000 (43% to 49%) of the program's cost from CSUN, and said "we'll try and earn the rest." CSUN President Joe Bunin said that the senate has already approved funding for the program, and that a \$14,500 budget allocation should reach Public Safety before school starts on August 28. This represents 41% of the program's estimated requirement of \$35,000. The remainder of the program will be paid for by fees from Thomas and Mack, Ham Hall, and other users of the service, and by Public Safety funds.

Enoch said that TMC is paying \$6.50 per hour to the student workers, and getting approximately 500-600 hours of coverage per month. USSS is making a "slight profit", according to Hollenbeck, from the

Thomas and Mack Center, which pays now about what they were paying to outside security firms. The difference between the \$6.50 per hour paid to USSS and the \$4.00 per hour paid to student workers is used to buy uniforms, to buy equipment and to fund coverage to the rest of the campus, Hollenbeck said. That would be \$15,000 to \$18,000 net income from TMC, approximately 43% to 51% of the \$35,000, if TMC kept coverage at the current level, but TMC is now working on acquiring an electronic security system including cameras, card-keys and motion detectors, and may cut back on security system hours.

In addition, the Department of Public Safety has spent about \$15,000, or 43%, so far, Hollenbeck said.

Hollenbeck said that the program will never be self-sustaining, and still requires a substantial allocation of funds, but can cut costs to the rest of the campus.

"We haven't received any specific funding for this and frankly I'm taking a kind of a gamble here with our funds," he said. "I think that this is an important program, so I'm taking a gamble that we're going to be able to put all of this

together financially. We have used students to assist the Department of Public Safety in the past."

Many current parking enforcement personnel are students, and students have assisted with Division of Traffic and Parking administrative tasks like entering citations and registration information into the computers.

Hollenbeck said he also anticipates the absorption of the CSUN-run shuttle cart/escort service into the system. Hollenbeck said that police can't do their job without community support, and that this is a "great opportunity" to let UNLV students participate.

Enoch expressed a desire to continue working with the USSS, despite TMC's plans to automate security, because students have been better motivated, and TMC is "pleased" with the students' work so far. Enoch did stress that a consistent quality of service is important, and only time will show the full ramifications of the transfer to the system.

Bunin said, "[The USSS] will quite legitimately make the campus more secure while employing students, as well as freeing campus police from being bogged down with mental tasks."
