Board policy stressed

A revised set of standards stating that an organization must meet to be recognized by CSUN and be in accordance with university policy will be implemented this semester, BJ Willard, CSUN vice president, said.

Willard said that any organization of more than ten members can be recognized by CSUN, providing that they meet the following requirements:

—The organization members must maintain an average GPA of 2.0

—The organization must sub-

mit both a letter stating they do not discriminate and their constitution and by-laws.

—Members from each organization must attend Organization Board meetings and cannot miss more than three in a semester.

—New organizations must also perform a community service project.

If an organization does meet any of these requirements, they will not be recognized by CSUN, Willard said.

All current organizations will be up for review by the end of the month.

Three new organizations are on campus now, Willard said.

Maxson stressed the importance of the creation of a law school here on campus. The Law School Advisory Committee, he said, was "composed of many of this state's finest legal minds and most distinguished citizens."

The Architecture program, Maxson said, will move along the lines of the Engineering program of the past.

"During the next few years I see it becoming a school and within the decade, a free-standing college."

Maxson said the university will continue in its attempt to obtain a supercomputer. "We are confident that we will be successful in these attempts and that we

will establish an international supercomputer computational center modeled after those at Princeton, Carnegie Mellon, the University of Illinois and Berkeley," Maxson said.

Maxson said that much construction is planned for the campus, including the expansion of the Chemistry Building, by up to as much as double its present size; construction of an architecture building; expansion and renovation of the John S. Wright Hall; construction of physics and math building; construction of a new library, or dramatic expansion of the present building; conversion of Tonopah Hall to an office complex and construction of additional facilities for the planned new College of Fine

and Performing Arts.

Academic freedom at UNLV will be continued to be protected with a strong commitment, Maxson said. "We will continue to foster a climate in which our artists and writers are encouraged to create their art, to do their writing, and to encourage their students to do theirs as well," he said. "We will continue to encourage our scholars to search for the truth and to express their diversity."

During the next decade, Maxson said, there will be Ph.D. proposals from each college.

Maxson said that a separate College of Fine Arts and Performing Arts will be created, effective in the spring semester of this year.

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Board accepts proposal

A proposal on the creation of a college for the fine and performing arts was recently approved by the Academic Affairs Committee of the University of Nevada System Board of Regents, John Unrue, UNLV Vice President and Provost, said.

The board will vote on the committee's recommendation during the next meeting, to be held next month, Unrue said.

"It's a very important step for the future of fine and performing arts and insures a very bright future," Unrue said.

Unrue, who met with the respective department chairs over the summer, said that they were very supportive of the idea of a separate college.

"A fine and performing arts

college is a natural break for us," he said.

Rick Soule, the chairman of the Music Department, said he felt that the formation was a step in the right direction, and will help departments in funding of their programs.


"When we find a potential donor, the money will be easily earmarked for special programs," Soule said.

Unrue said there is no discussion at this time of any split in the humanities, or letters, area of the college.

A committee made up of faculty members will conduct a search for a dean soon, Unrue said.

Unrue said that he believes that the Board of Regents will accept the recommendation, but added that he didn't want to "pre-judge."
