Police help to nab UNLV vandals

According to Detective Lonnie Barrett, the university police and the University Student Security System are working hand in hand to improve safety and decrease crime around the campus.

Recently the teamwork effort proved effective in a case involving car vandalism, Barrett said. A female student parked near Juanita Greer White Hall repeatedly found her car smeared in shoe polish with obscenities, swastikas and references to a white supremacists known as skinheads.

The Department of Parking and Public Safety was notified and the usual procedure would have been to file a report. This case was taken one step further.

A member of the student security set up surveillance of the car equipped with a 35mm camera and a radio. When the suspects ar-

rived to vandalize the student's car for the fourth time, pictures were shot, the police radioed and the evidence given to Detective Barrett.

The evidence incriminated the male and female students involved, and they were apprehended, charges were filed and the two were given citations, and a court date. Their names were withheld as both are juveniles.

This effort of working together will "increase efficiency of the program, and eventually create a decrease in the unreported crimes, and awareness in the crime rate," Barrett said.

The combined number of policemen will increase to fourteen, with the addition of two new fully commissioned police officers from the State of Nevada. There are approximately fifty students on the campus security system, and according to Barrett, these students in the future "will be the eyes and ears of the university police."

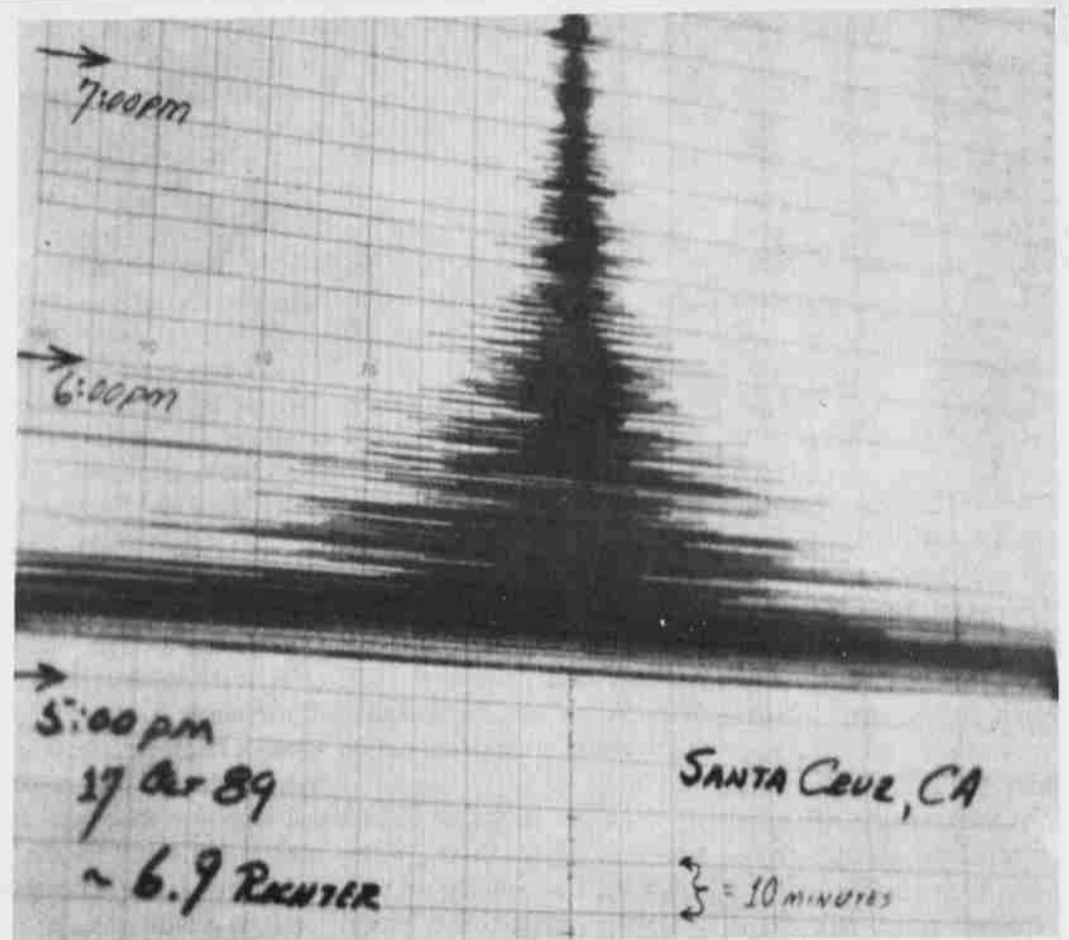

Debate and forensics program wins two awards at invitational tournament

The UNLV Debate and Forensics program returned to Las Vegas after taking two novice awards at the Aztec Invitational Forensics Tournament at San Diego State University, October 13-15, 1989.

Craig Cone, a freshman from Sioux Falls, SD, took 4th place in Novice Oral Interpretation. Oral interpretation involves the interpretive reading of poetry, prose, or drama.

Michael Stock, a sophomore from Las Vegas, was the 4th place speaker in Novice CEDA. CEDA, the Cross Examination Debate Association, is the sanctioning body for debate tournaments in the United States.

In addition, UNLV was repre-

sented by three debate teams in the Novice Division. Stock and Matthew Skurow, a sophomore from Boulder City, had a win-loss record of 3-1 in the division. Their record placed them among the top of the 30 teams in the division.

Also competing were Danielle Collier, Monica Wille, and Nicole Stewart, all freshmen from Las Vegas.

Stock also advanced to the semifinals of the Novice Impromptu speaking event.

Forensics director Tom Murphy was pleased with the performance of the squad. "We have very young group, but they are highly motivated and willing to learn," he said.

"Even though most of our students have never before participated in debate and forensics, they will soon be competitive with other colleges and universities in our region," Murphy predicted.

The Aztec Invitational attracted over 40 colleges and universities from several states, including the University of Texas-EI Paso, University of California-Berkeley, USC, UCLA, Arizona State University, Pepperdine University, and Southern Utah State College.

The squad's next tournament will be the Color Country Classic at Southern Utah State College on Nov. 3-5, 1989.
