that consisted of mainly beans and corn.

"Many say it's more difficult to make the readjustment after two years", he said, referring to America's fast pace and availability of so many consumer goods.

When volunteers return to America they receive a readjustment fund of \$200 for every month served.

In addition recruits receive a monthly stipend that covers cost of living in the country, transportation, health insurance and vacation.

lenbeck continued. "If it had been left up to the players, none of this would have happened."

Jeff Wells, director of Campus Recreation-Intramurals, said, "It was an unfortunate incident that the Intramural program can not and will not tolerate."

He said he did not know all the details yet because the investigation is still ongoing, he said and explained that it was a competitive game between two good teams and names were called.

Wells said that on the Saturday following the incident, he sent a memo to all 36 team captains asking for cooperation from all cap-

tains and players to keep some balance of order on the game field and with those persons on the sidelines to try and prevent another incident.

Student Services Vice President Robert Ackerman said he did not know much yet either but is waiting for the investigation to conclude.

Ackerman said that besides the criminal charges, some students will be disciplined for inappropriate behavior on the university campus.

He said the situation was very troubling and disappointing because of the aspects of why the fight was started and how an intramural game could end up this way.

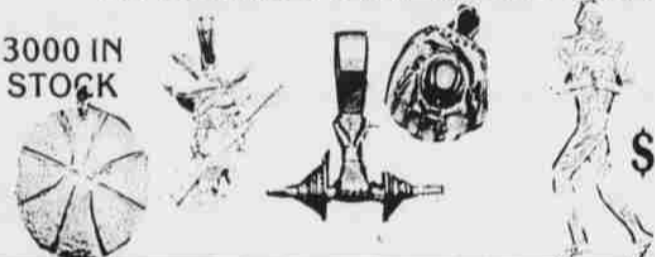

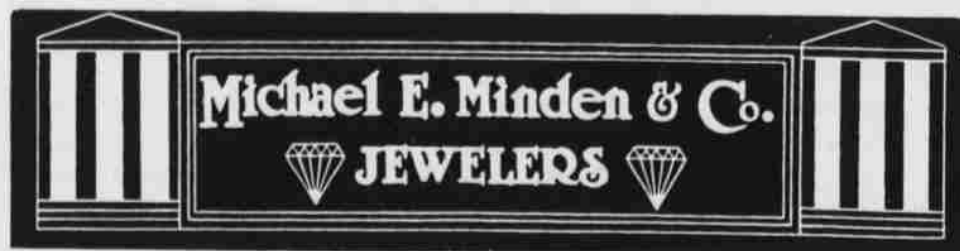
