UNLV not buying KLVX

UNLV is not buying the television station KLVX, John Hill, station manager of Channel 10, said. He said the Clark County School District, which is the licensee of Channel 10, and the university are in the talking stages to discuss the utilizing of the production facilities by the Department of Communications Studies.

University President Robert C. Maxson said it was just a rumor and that UNLV has no intention of purchasing the station.

Bob Broniecki, president of the Clark County Teachers Association, said he suggested the idea of UNLV taking over Channel 10 to the school board because the district has outgrown it and that not many teachers use its facilities anymore.

He said that the university could take over the \$1.2 million cost of production and that the district could use the savings to benefit the teachers by lowering their contributions to their health insurance.

An Oct. 8 Las Vegas Sun article said District Superintendent Brian Cram does not want to lose Channel 10.

"Classroom TV can be an important aid to us in the future," Cram said the district has yet to capitalize

on its use, as a source of information about district activities for parents and district employees.

Broniecki said that television doesn't play the same role in the classroom it once did.

He said the school district should cast aside its role as licensee of Channel 10 and use the \$1.2 million saved for more pertinent needs.

In another Sun article on Oct. 11, Cram said that even though the station has not lived up to its full potential, he said he sees it being used more in the classrooms as a communication tool to the community, and the district employees.

Most involved agree that UNLV would benefit the most by operating Channel 10, but that has been put to rest and now the matter is in the talking stages of forming cooperative agreements.

Maxson said, "UNLV is only interested in working with the school district."

He said that the school district and the university are best friends and the only relationship he wants with the local district is one of cooperation.

"UNLV and the school district are responsible for education from kindergarten to Ph.D's in Southern Nevada," Maxson said. "If we could work through Channel 10 to accomplish our goals we'd be delighted."

Students demonstrate for choice

A black-draped figure wearing an Ayatollah Khomeini mask and carrying a sign saying "Vote for Anti-Choice and get Theocracy" attracted attention outside the Student Union last Friday morning.

According to the woman student underneath the mask, the two-hour demonstration was to make people more aware of the abortion issue.

She said that UNLV students need to think about the freedoms

they may lose if legislations is passed restricting or eliminating a woman's right to abortion.

"To have the freedom of abortion taken away is just the first step for these people," she said.

"The next thing they'll want to do is take away any right we have to birth control."

She chose the Ayatollah Khomeini costume because he represents fundamentalists and the principals of theocracy.

"I'm trying to draw a parallel so people will think about what could happen here," she said.

"It's (the Anti-Choice movement) all based on religious beliefs

and I can't believe that things have gone as far as they have and that people haven't seen this."

The student would not give her name and talked as little as possible during the demonstration, feeling that this would lessen the impact of the visual image.

Students still responded, however.

"Most of the people smiled and gave me the thumbs-up signal and said they really agreed with what I was doing," she said.

"I would say two-thirds to three-quarters of the response that I got for the entire two hours was positive."
