

Jane Goodall to speak May 2



Noted zoologist and anthropologist Jane Goodall will address Las Vegas in the next presentation of UNLV's Barrick Lecture Series May 2 at 7:30 p.m. in the Artemus

W. Ham Concert Hall.

Her lecture, titled "Dr. Jane Goodall and the Chimpanzees of the Gombe," is free and open to the public, but tickets are required.

Tickets will be available to the public beginning April 21 at the UNLV Performing Arts Center Box Office. Box office hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays. For more information, call the box office at 739-3801.

Goodall earned a doctorate in ecology from England's Cambridge University in 1961. Four years later, she established the Gombe Stream Research Center, where she studied one community of chimpanzees for nearly 30 years.

Her research on the Gombe chimpanzees is the longest unbroken field study of a group of animals in their natural habitat.

Goodall's findings have influenced scientific thinking in many branches of the behavioral sciences.

Today, Goodall spends about three weeks every couple of months at Gombe to continue her research and to help students who come to the research center from around the world to study chimpanzees and baboons.

Goodall's UNLV lecture is part of an annual lecture tour she presents in an effort to raise funds for the Gombe research center, and to share the results of her study with as many people as possible.

Goodall has written several books about her experiences in the African jungle, including "My Friends, the Wild Chimpanzees," "In the Shadow of Man," and "The Chimpanzees at Gombe."

The UNLV Library will conduct a user survey during the week of April 23 to April 29. Anyone who uses the library will be asked to fill out the survey one time during this week.

The purpose of this questionnaire is to aid the library in developing a 10 Year Master Plan dealing with such areas as library services, automation, materials and building needs and to determine what improvements the library users themselves would like to see. All responses will be confidential.

A "Library Survey" box will be at the exit counter for deposit of the questionnaire as you leave the library.

Questions will be designed to

establish priorities as to what changes or additions can be made with the money available.

The time date and reason for your visit, the services used during visit, difficulty in finding desired material, the suitability of seating arrangements the problem of noise, the helpfulness of the staff, what improvements in equipment or staff would we like to see and our position at UNLV, including the department a person is enrolled or teaching in, are some of the areas the survey will cover.

Dean of Libraries Mary Dale Deacon said, "We are asking the cooperation of everyone who uses the library in this survey so we can improve and expand in the most advantageous manner for the majority of library users."
