

Public safety programs at UNLV

The Department of Public Safety begins a series to introduce the UNLV Department of Public Safety and some of our crime prevention programs and resources.

The UNLV Department of Public Safety consists of the following Divisions:

UNLV Police Division. A full service, twenty-four hour police agency staffed by seventeen sworn, state commissioned peace officers. These officers are certified by the same state agency that certifies all police officers in Nevada and have the same authority on campus as Metropolitan Police Officers have in Las Vegas. Support personnel include dispatchers, administrative personnel and student employees. Response time to emergency calls is generally two minutes or less, to any location on campus.

UNLV Reserve Police Force. Approximately thirty state certified peace officers, who

staff special events and augment the patrol services of the UNLV Police Division.

University Student Security Services. Approximately twenty-five students, who work full or part-time, providing additional on-campus protection by acting as eyes and ears for the Police Division. Student Security also provides an escort service for members of the university community. Although a relatively new program, this division has proven itself very effective, by increasing overall university security.

Student Shuttle Service. This Division offers a free shuttle service to staff and students, who desire escort from University buildings to their vehicles, during evening hours. They may be contacted through the UNLV Parking Enforcement Division at 739-1300 or Police Dispatch at 739-3668.

Parking Enforcement.

While you may not think of parking enforcement as part of the University protection effort, this Division is very valuable and effective by providing security in the parking lots and surrounding areas. Undoubtedly, due to their observation and reporting of suspicious activities, many criminal efforts have been thwarted.

Call Boxes. There are six emergency call boxes on the campus. All are in highly visible locations and have been painted bright yellow; take time to locate them as you travel the campus grounds. In the event of an emergency, you may speak directly to a Police Dispatcher by opening the call box door and pressing the red talk button. The exact locations of the call boxes are as follows:

- Southwest side of James R. Dickinson Library
- Northwest side of Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall
- Northeast side of Marjorie Barrack Museum of

ture of the offenses, often detailing locations, times and the method of operation used by the suspect(s). Information on how you can greatly reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim is also provided.

Members of the university community can take an active part in the protection of persons and property on this campus. Please report any suspicious activity immediately. Victims of a crime should promptly report the incident. Based on prior reports, police can often track the activities of a suspect, predict a target and make an apprehension.

The UNLV Department of Public Safety conducts many crime prevention presentations during each semester. Among these are: sexual assault prevention programs, orientation presentations, University Staff training classes, newspaper articles and crime alert bulletins.

Training classes are announced, during each semester in various university publications. Specific recurring crimes are addressed in newspaper articles and crime alert bulletins. Program to assist CPA candidates announced

UNLV's Center for Management Programs is presenting a CPA Review Program this fall to assist CPA candidates in preparing for the Uniform Certified Public Accountant Examination.

Students may enroll in the whole course, which begins Aug. 31 and runs through Nov. 3, for \$795.

The practice-and-theory portion of the course, Aug. 31 - Oct. 6, costs \$500.

The auditing course, Oct. 12 - 20, costs \$200.

Business law, Oct. 26 - Nov. 3 is also \$200.

This is a weekend program. Classes meet Fridays 6-10 p.m. and Saturdays 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., with a one-hour lunch break.

Each course section provides a thorough review of the essential material that must be mastered to successfully complete the CPA exam. Ses-

sions are taught by professionals in their fields.

Students who sign up for the entire course will receive free access to the MicroMash interactive computer study program for use in the College of Business and Economics microcomputer lab.

The program uses the popular, three-volume, 1990 Bisk/NIA CPA Review manuals. Their cost is included in the registration fee.

All classes are taught in the College of Business and Economics at UNLV.

Students who take the course and do not pass the CPA exam may repeat the class free of charge, with certain conditions.
