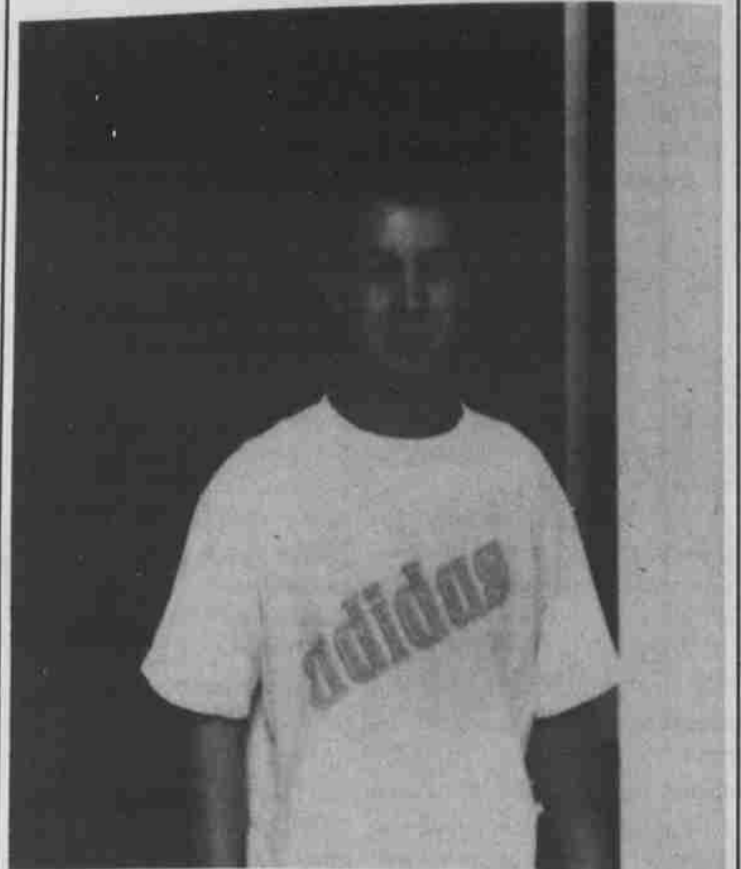

Doug Borgel makes soccer an All-American sport

UNLV Spotlight with Billy Naftaly

Besides being an All-American soccer player, 5'9" 150 lb. senior forward, Doug Borgel, is an all-american type of guy.

"When I play (soccer), I'm interested in it, but other than that, I'd much rather watch basketball or football," explained Borgel.

Borgel has an avid interest in playing soccer and finds himself playing soccer year round.

This past summer, he participated in the 1990 U.S. Olympic Sports Festival. In this important soccer tournament, Borgel led his West squad to the gold medal.

"My greatest accomplishment in soccer away from UNLV, was when I was named Most Valuable Player at the Sports Festival. That was with all the guys my age, competing for a spot on the Olympic team. So, it was pretty big."

"Also, my main goal right now is to play on the Olympic team, once the UNLV season is over. As of now, I'm on the team," stated Borgel.

With all of Borgel's talents

for the game, soccer wasn't his number one sport. It wasn't until high school, that soccer replaced his love of baseball.

"When I was younger, I wanted to play baseball, but my dad put me into soccer instead. I then started to play both sports, but I excelled at soccer, so I stuck with it," he said.

Being named All-American is a feat very hard to accomplish, but duplicating it a year later can be even more difficult. Borgel, however, is confident that he can do it again.

There's a good chance of it because we have a much improved team this year. A lot of it has to do with my having a great season, but if your team makes the playoffs, you have a much better chance at it," he explained.

Another aspect of Borgel's game is his constant improvement each year. He had a total of seven points in his first year, 16 in his second year, and last year, he racked up 45 points. Can he surpass last seasons' total?

"Yes, so far I think so," he stated. "Last year I was inexperienced at the forward position, I used to play midfield, and everything was new to me. Now, I'm much more comfortable with the position and we'll score a lot more goals this year. So, I'll have many more chances."

Borgel is already well on his way toward beating last years total. In only four games, he has scored three goals, giving him a total of six points thus far.

He has his mind set on playing for the US on the Olympic team, but what about after that?

Borgel's goal after that, is to play for a professional soccer team

as a career.

"I want to play professional soccer here in the US as much as possible. If something doesn't work out, money wise or play wise, I'd be willing to play in Canada or abroad," he explained.

Borgel has thought about what to do in life, if he can't play soccer. His major is business management and he's willing to put it to use.

"If professional soccer doesn't

work out, I want to definitely try to get my own business combination soccer shop. I would hopefully combine soccer with my degree in management," he said.

Perhaps one day, Doug Borgel's name will be known around the world. For now, Borgel will have to be content as an All-American and star of the Rebel's soccer team.

Golf team finishes second in Japan tournament

University of Nevada, Las Vegas' golf team took second place on Friday in the Shiseido Cup International collegiate golf tournament in Tokyo, Japan.

The split squad of Rebels, (UNLV was also competing with another team in the Tucker Invitational in New Mexico at the same time), finished 12 strokes behind Nihon of Japan. UNLV's three day total of 863 shows the team is as strong as coach Dwaine Knight hoped they'd be.

"Overall, it was a good event for us. We had low team round, low individual round and the low U.S. score. Nihon is a great team and had a great tournament. Las year an 875 won."

UNLV's highest individual finisher was hub Goyen, who finished fifth with a three day total of 215. The individual champion, Chad McGee of Texas Christian shot a 210 overall.

While the first team was in

Japan, the second team finished 11th in the William H. Tucker Invitational in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Arizona won the tournament with an overall score of 859. UNLV shot 894 to finish in a tie for 11th place with Air Force.

UNLV was led by freshman Craig Howard, who shot a 217; good for 14th place overall, individually.
