# UNLV Debate teams place at tournament

Two debate teams from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) took second place trophies in their divisions at the Utah Fall Scrimmage hosted by the University of Utah, September 21 and 22.

Marc Sperberg (sophomore, Las Vegas) and Jennifer Cole (sophomore, Las Vegas) took second place in the Novice CEDA Division while Paul Rooker (freshman, Provo, Utah) and Wendy Finmark (freshman, Las Vegas) when the first rankings are replaced second in the Junior CEDA Division.

According to Tom Murphy, director of UNLV's Debate and Forensics program and the debate coach, "Our students, made a strong showing at the Scrimmage. Because this is the first tournament of the season, it gives us a lot of credibility."

Murphy also said that the 20 points earned by the squad in the CEDA sweepstakes system should "put UNLV among the top ten schools in the United States" when the first rankings are released.

The tournament, which took

place last weekend, attracted over 20 colleges and universities from several western states including Arizona State University, the United States Air Force Academy (USFA), the University of Denver, Colorado State University, the University of Wyoming, and Loyola Marymount University.

Sperberg also received an individual award as the Second Place Speaker in the Novice CEDA Divisions. Speaker awards are based on individual points earned in rounds.

Sperberg and Cole defeated

teams from Denver University, Northwest Community College, Ricks College and Arizona State University in the preliminary rounds. Seeded third in the elimination rounds, they defeated a team from Ricks College in the semifinals, losing to another Ricks team in the final round.

Rooker and Finmark defeated teams from USAFA, College of Eastern Utah, Colorado College and Carroll College in the preliminary rounds. Seeded eighth in the elimination bracket, they defeated teams from Southern

Utah State University in the octafinal round, College of Eastern Utah in the quarterfinal round, and the University of Denver in the semifinal round before losing a split decision to Boise State University in the final round.

Murphy praised the performance of the squad.

"In terms of total squad performance, this was a great way to open our season," he said. The next tournament is the Raisin Center Invitational at California State University, Fresno, October 6-7, 1990.

# Greek Fest '90 to benefit Children's Miracle Network

Greek Fest '90 is taking place this Saturday, Sept. 29 with the event benefitting Children's Miracle Network.

"This is the kind of party most college students look forward to when they enter college and the best thing about it is we're helping a good group," said Jim Stuart, Sigma Chi event coordinator. "Students of the Greek community are coming together with University Medical Center as a support team for the many families needing assistance in establishing a neonatal unit at UMC."

Stuart explained that 56 percent of babies born have the need for intensive care after birth. This could be the result of a diffi-

cult pregnancy, an underweight mother, a drug addiction, or many other problems. A higher rate of child abuse is found among these families due, perhaps in part, because of the separation between babies being treated now in Southern California.

University Medical Center and Children's Miracle Network aim to protect and serve this fragile family unit by keeping the babies close to their families. Money, in the amount of \$750,000, is needed to undertake this project to begin a neonatal unit at UMC.

Sigma Chi has been given charitable donations by Quicksilver Sportswear, St. Tropez Mar-

ket and Bud Dry to help sponsor the event. Wienerschnitzel has donated 1500 hot dogs as well.

A \$5 donation is needed to attend. Live music with DJ "Travel Agent" from radio station KUNV will add to the festivities including a two man beach volleyball tournament and a sorority talent showcase which offers a \$200 winning prize.

All Greeks on campus are welcome to attend. The event will be held at the Sigma Chi House.

Mike Mixer, alumni of UNLV, said, "This is a very worthy cause for all Greeks and it should be a lot of fun."
