Communication Studies Department becomes Greenspun School of Communication

The Department of Communication Studies has now become the Greenspun School of Communication Studies, at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

This was made possible by a \$2 million donation from the Greenspun family, which established the communication school and also gave \$50,000 a year for 10 years from their Prime Cable holdings to cover operating expenses for the university's new cable station UNLV-TV 31.

The change in title makes an incredible difference.

"It has more identity and autonomy than a department does," said Dr. Barbara Cloud.

The money received from the Greenspun family will create many new opportunities for the school. More programs will be available, in a larger variety. A

Barbara Greenspun lecture series will be started for the benefit of students. Also, opportunities will be made available for students to meet people actually involved with the media. Gage Chapel, communication studies chairperson, said he hopes the new status will "recruit more graduate students to the graduate programs." Students may also be attracted by an expansion in scholarships. Furthermore, faculty will be increased and improved. Funding will be available for research, in their chosen fields. Finally, \$180,000 has been given to the school's cable channel, to purchase more equipment.

The faculty of the new school is very excited by these prospects.

"There can be no problems, just opportunity here," said Dr. Chapel. The general consensus is that the new school is beneficial, and will bring good changes.

The decision was made to change the department's status

at a meeting of the Board of Regents in August. The department heads had wanted to expand the department into a school and, with help from the Greenspun's, were finally able to do it.

The school is not independent of the College of Liberal Arts and still reports to the dean, Dr. James S. Malek. Dr. Chapel explains that it is a hierarchy. First, a program is developed. It then becomes a department. Next it expands into a school. Finally, it becomes an independent college, which helps to form a university. The school does not yet have separate college status, but this is in consideration for future plans.

The change in status will not have any effect on credits already earned by students in the Communication Studies Department.

The Greenspun School of Communication Studies is expected to benefit students, faculty, and the community as a whole.

Professor uses humor to make students think about AIDS

(CPS) Dr. Reginald Fennell goes to great lengths to make his students think about AIDS.

For example, the bearded Fennell sometimes will arrive at his Health Education for AIDS class at Miami University in Ohio dressed in a green dress with a pink hat and shoes. He will call himself Abiline Bertha Stinence, or A.B. Stinence (as in "abstinence") for short.

"Some reports in journal articles say that humor is the better way to go" when teaching about AIDS, Fennell explained.

A number of schools recently have tried to demystify the subject by trying to make it "fun."

A gorilla-costumed "King Condom" has toured the University of Texas-Austin campus to show passersby how to put a condom on a banana. The State University of New York at Albany held a "Sexuality Week" that included a condom dance.

A private company called College Condoms sells condoms that come in school colors at the USC, UCLA, University of California at Santa Barbara, San Jose State University and other campuses in Arizona, Florida, Iowa and Kansas.

At Miami of Ohio, Fennell's students once handed out 1,000 coupons for novelty "Kiss of Mint" and "Gold Coin" condoms designed by Joan Scott, a Columbus Ohio

grandmother who first started decorating the devices to encourage her sons to use them.

And when cross-dressing isn't enough to get his students' attention, Fennell also has held contest to see who in the class can get a condom on a banana the fastest.

It's all to get students to feel more comfortable discussing

AIDS, said Fennell, who added the class has been full almost every semester since he started teaching it in January, 1988.

"I'm certainly not trying to make light of a serious disease like AIDS," Fennell said.

"I try to do things to make my students think."
