Phi Beta Sigma fraternity adopts new pledge-free orientation program

As a means to deter these types of practices, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity Incorporated has, in conjunction with the other membership organizations of the National Pan Hellenic Council, adopted a new pledge-free orientation program for new members.

Phi Beta Sigma fraternity's

western regional director, Darnell Cooley, is in full support of the new orientation program and stated, "As Phi Beta Sigma fraternity enters into the '90s, the old practice of hazing as a form of initiation must give way to a new consciousness of social responsibility.

Induction of new members into the fraternity had been put on hold until Oct. 1, 1990, because Cooley had designated September as the month for training the membership on the new policies and procedures of orientating new members into the fraternity.

Cooley "hopes that this move on the part of Phi Beta Sigma fraternity will create a stronger bond between parents, communities, and university campuses, and that this will encourage prospective members who otherwise wouldn't consider joining a fraternity to take a closer look at the positive things our organization does."
