

# The end of apartheid in South Africa

Dr. Robert Bigler, a UNLV professor of political science, will discuss "The End of Apartheid and South Africa's Prospects for Democracy" on Nov. 27 at 7:30 p.m. in UNLV's John S. Wright Hall, Room 116.

The free, public lecture is part of the University Forum Series, which is sponsored each semester by UNLV's College of Liberal Arts.

In his lecture, Bigler will explain the origin, nature, and development of white racial domination in the Republic of South Africa. He will analyze the reasons why the system of apartheid is now being gradually dismantled, and the role of the United States in this process.

Bigler will also discuss American and Western interests at stake in South Africa, and the impact of the reforms undertaken recently.

To conclude the lecture, Bigler will present possible scenarios for the transition from white minority domination to a multiracial, multicultural, and multilingual democratic South Africa based on the equality of all its citizens.

Bigler specializes in comparative politics and comparative foreign policy. He was educated at the University of Budapest, Hungary, and at the University of California, Berkeley, where he

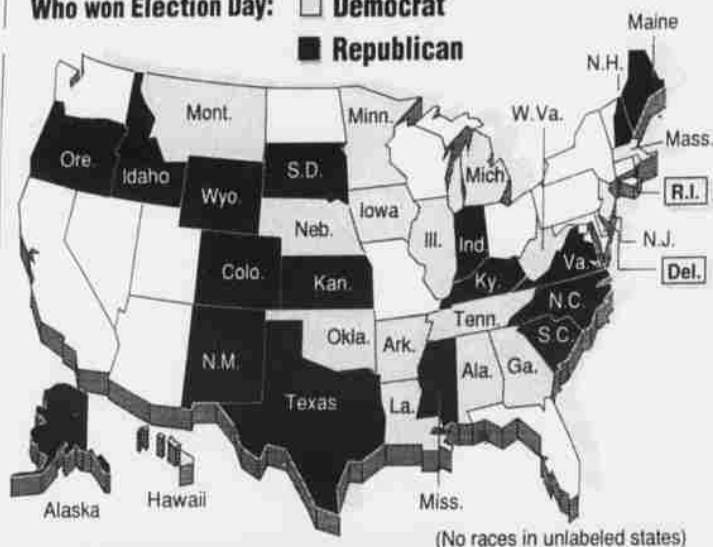

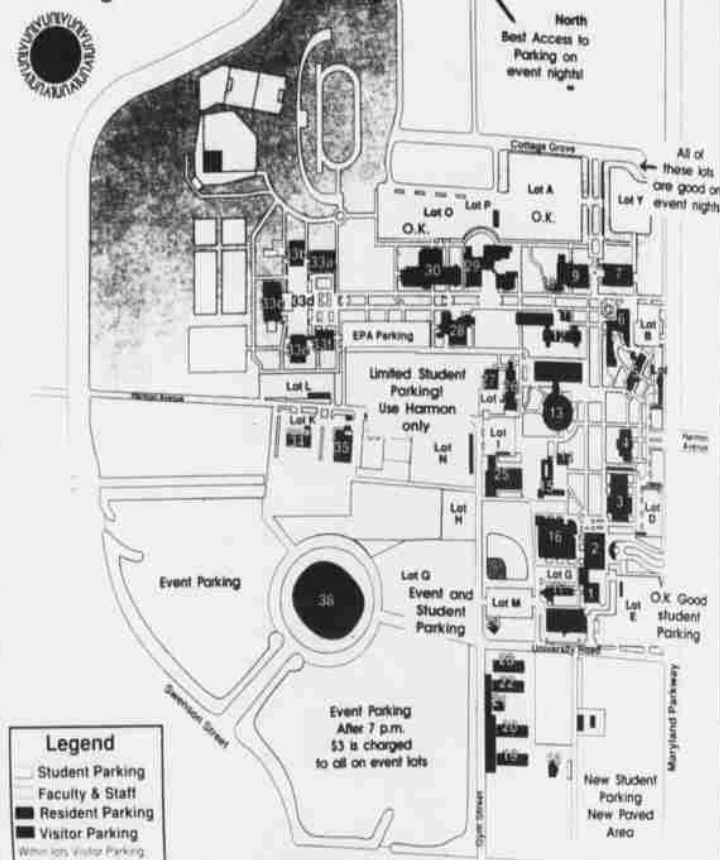
Parking at the Thomas and Mack Center will be limited due

it practically impossible for those on crutches or in wheelchairs to access this entrance.

The entrances to the Judy Bayley Theatre (JBT) and the Artemus Ham Concert Hall (HCH) are situated at the top of a number of steps, four flights of five steps each. Those who are handicapped are required to go around the building (approximately 1/4 mile) to the north side to get to the ticket office and entrance. Furthermore, the building has no handicapped seating. Amend said the entire cam-

pus needs to be involved in correcting the situation.

"I would be glad to set up what is needed with Anita (Stockbauer) to determine what we can do on campus," Amend said. "I would like to form an oversight committee to review the deficiencies and try to resolve them."
