UNLV students, are you wondering what ARA has been doing lately with all the changes in the food concepts at the Dining Commons?

The university has selected ARA's "Restaurant Concept" for the Dining Commons.

It is a traditional Board Plan Menu, with several options including:

CAFE FEATURES - This is the traditional board menu. It will include three entrees and three vegetables. One of the entrees will be vegetarian. At various times we may move the vegetarian entree to other areas to provide more variety.

Pot of gold brings new building

There will be a new building on the UNLV campus. Thanks to the gift of \$1.5 million from the Newmont Gold Co. of Elko, Nevada, plans for the Newmont Student Service Center are now underway.

The center will be located west of Frank and Estella Beam Hall next to the softball field.

"We have an interest in taking the various Student Service departments and bringing them together for two reasons," said Dr. Robert Ackerman, vice-president of Student Services. "One is so that people who need to interact with Student Service programs would not have to shop around campus to find out where they are. Then, secondly, we can help the University by recovering

some space that they could use for more specific purposes." Currently, Student Services has departments such as the Registrar and Admissions located in Frazier Hall, Career Planning and Placement in Beam Hall, The Student Development Center in Dickinson Library, and Financial Aid and administrative Offices in the Humanities building.

Additional funds for construction are needed so that the building will house all of the Student Services departments.

"When Newmont gave us \$1.5 million they recognized the fact that we would not be able to build all that we needed, so they in-effect challenged us to supplement that. Unfortunately the Student Services building is not on the University's priority list. The priority list is a list of buildings the University needs that goes to

the State Legislature in hopes of funding. So we basically have to pass the hat in hopes of getting the money we need," Ackerman said.

"We also may be in the position where we have more space than staff, Ackerman said. Right now, the Student Development Center has two people to advise about 2,000 students. They are grossly understaffed. The Student Services Department is going to the Legislature this session in hopes of obtaining funds to alleviate its staffing shortage.

It will be at least a year before any ground breaking on this project occurs. Ackerman said, "What we've got is a little bit of time to try to solve our dilemmas and if we could get some firm commitments for funding this project would be completed much quicker."
