

There are nearly 2,600 graduate students at UNLV, with a budget of \$20,000 for the GSA. This budget is disproportionately low, Graf contends, to the University of Nevada, Reno's estimated graduate student budget of \$63,000.

We're entitled to our fair share," Graf said. "It's discouraging. How can we attract graduate students into our program when we can't even compete with research and travel grants?"

NAGS is a multi-purpose organization committed to making a graduate education a better experience. In addition to acting fits such as health care. "A lot of schools don't provide support networks for graduate students. At many schools, they're treated poorly," Graf said. He stressed that the lack of respect and recognition for graduate students is a driving force behind NAGS. "We're becoming a very powerful group.
