

Former Prime Minister of Pakistan to speak on campus

UNLV's Barrick Lecture Series will present Her Excellency the former Prime Minister of Pakistan Benazir Bhutto Jan. 28 at 7:30 p.m. in Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall.

Her lecture, titled "Foreign Policy in Perspective," is free and open to the public, but tickets are required. Tickets can be obtained at the UNLV Performing Arts Center box office. For more information, call 739-3801.

Bhutto was sworn in as Prime Minister of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan in December 1988, after a courageous personal struggle against 11 years of military dictatorship and repression, becoming the first woman leader in the Islamic world.

She led the fight for the restoration of democracy in Pakistan from her prison cell.

Declaring that "democracy was the best revenge," the new prime minister acted forcefully to restore consti-

tutional freedoms. She lifted the ban on student and trade unions imposed under the military dictatorship, imme-

diately restored freedom of the press and initiated measures providing for the separation of the judiciary and executive arms of government.

On Aug. 6, 1990, Bhutto was removed from office in a

military-backed constitutional coup. Bhutto is currently the leader of the opposition and continues to wage a struggle to achieve lasting democracy in Pakistan.

After completing her early schooling in Pakistan, Bhutto was educated at Radcliffe College and at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford. In 1977, she completed Oxford's diploma course in International Law and Diplomacy. She received the Phi Beta Kappa Award from Radcliffe College in 1989 and an honorary Doctor of Law degree from Harvard University.

Bhutto is the author of two books, "Foreign Policy in Perspective" and "Daughter of Destiny." She was the recipient of the Liberal International Woman of the Year Award in 1989 and the United Nations Development Fund for Women Award in 1990.

Rob Rosenthal, KUNV Radio Station manager, said the teach-in is informational.

"People who will be speaking will have certain points of view but the purpose of the event is informational. It is to allow people to be able to make informed decisions as to supporting or opposing the war," Rosenthal said.
