## "CROP Walk" to begin from UNLV

A 10 kilometer walk to aid the homeless in Las Vegas will take place March 3, 1991, beginning at 1:30 p.m. and will start from the UNLV campus.

The event, organized by Church World Services, provides relief for the needy throughout the world. This is the eighth year the event has taken place and will be the second consecutive year which it has started from the UNLV campus.

Those wishing to register have until noon the day of the walk to do so. Money will be raised by a pledge per-mile system. Secretary of The Church of Christ, Jeannette Walsh, who is helping to organize the event, said more than 30,700 was raised from last year's walk. Walsh said that 25 percent of all money raised will stay in Las Vegas to help the homeless.

Walsh called last year's event a success noting that 25 local parishes participated in the event. Pledges raising \$100 or more will be awarded badges and for those raising \$1,000 or more a certificate will be issued.

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## New playground slated for UNLV preschool

For the last 10 or more years, the UNLV preschool's playground, located in back of the Carlson Education Building, has had the same play equipment. Not only is the equipment old, but there is very little of it, and many of the items are becoming unsafe and perhaps a bit boring to the children who come to UNLV's preschool.

Midgene Spatz, M.Ed., director of College of Education/CSUN Preschool, listed reasons for the necessity of new playthings for the youngsters. She said that the swings are not safe because the metal will soon erode and break

and also because there is no safety zone around the set.

There is a shed full of tricycles on the site. Spatz said that the children love the "trikes" the best. However, it is hard for the children to have fun on the playground fighting the soft grassy and multilevel surface with their vehicles.

The merry-go-round is also in need of replacement after years of solid use.

The above equipment on the playground, along with the few other pieces not mentioned, will be sold at very reasonable prices to private parties.

Spatz said, "Dennis Swartzell has already drawn the plans. There will be a new landscape,

new sprinklers, and the area of the playground will be increased."

In deciding what type of equipment the preschool will get, Spatz said that, in their considerations are these factors: safety, durability, appropriateness for the age group, adaptability for use by children with special needs, and the liability insurance offered by the equipment manufacturer(s).

The bidding process took place on Jan. 16. The preschool did receive their equipment, and it has been secured until installation.

The process of getting the playground renovated was started in September, and the renovation, including landscape and new play equipment, will be done, "at the

soonest possible date."

Drawings of the playground design and pictures of the equipment will be on display at the Carlson Education Building.

Using the UNLV playground each week are about 90 to 100 children. These are the children of UNLV students using the facility, children from Children's Behavioral Services (CBS), and children from the UNLV Cooperative Early Childhood Program (CCSD).

Spatz said that the children do not yet know of the new playground stating, "If you tell children that something is coming, they usually expect it the next day."
