## Actress—Playwright Grammy Award Winning Lou Rawls Next Artist for "Rap With Artist" Session

Grammy Award-winning Lou Rawls, who'll perform Jan. 24 and Feb. 13 at the Desert Inn, will tape a "Rap With the Artist" session for the archives of the Arnold Shaw Research Center for Popular Music at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

"With the addition of Rawls to our collections, the archives are quickly becoming one of America's major storehouses of musical artifacts," said Joe Delany, who'll host the taping session.

Rawls is not just another singer. He has been active for years raising funds for Black colleges. And, in addition, he has provided his distinctive vocal styling for three animated Garfield TV cartoon specials and one Garfield soundtrack album released in conjunction with the first TV special.

"Rap With the Artist" will be at 2 p.m. Jan. 29, 1991, in Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall at UNLV. It will be free to the pub-

Rawls' latest album "Family Reunion" recently yielded a hit single "Too Bad You Belong to Somebody Else." Another single, "When Love Walked in the Door", has also been released from the album, which was produced by the renown tearn of Gamble and Huff.

In addition to his recording and performing career, Rawls is the corporate spokesperson for Anheuser Busch; his name is virsynonymous Budweiser. Through the brewery's sponsorship of "Lou Rawls' Parade inaugurated the UNLV interview of Stars" telethon, begun in 1980, Rawls has railed more than \$50 million for 42 black colleges.
