University System receives NASA grant

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration has approved a University of Nevada System proposal to establish a Space Grant State Consortium under NASA's Space Grant College and Fellowship Program.

Nevada is one of 26 American university groups selected to receive \$600,000 over a four-year period to improve the quality of aerospace research and education. The system's seven components—UNLV, UNR, Desert Research Institute and its four community colleges—will add \$300,000 in matching funds and support for the program.

Half of the NASA grant will be used to enhance campus re-

search infrastructure and educational programs and the other half will provide fellowships and scholarships for graduate and undergraduate students.

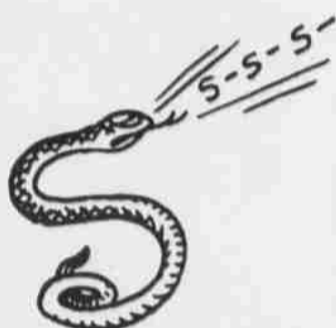
Snowfest winter carnival

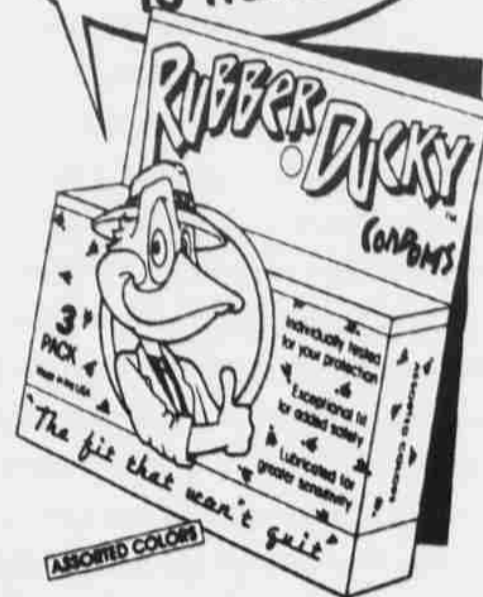
