Fellowship aid available for American Indians

The American Indian Graduate Center (AIGC) of Albuquerque, New Mexico, has announced that applications for fellowship grants for the 1991-92 year are now available for American Indian and Alaska native graduate students in all fields of graduate study at the master's, doctorate and professional degree level. To be eligible, a student must be from a federally-recognized tribe, attending an accredited graduate school, and be enrolled as a full-

time graduate student. AIGC fellowship awards are based on a student's unmet need after they have applied for aid at campus financial aid offices. The deadline for the 1991-92 year is June 3. DOE offers research to juniors and seniors



For juniors and seniors studying computer science, engineering, physics, environmental and life sciences, mathematics or physical science, the Science and Engineering Research Semester (SERS) offers hands-on research with some of the nation's top scientist at one of six national research laboratories during the academic year.

While the emphasis is on research, SERS also includes an educational enrichment component. Participants attend seminars and symposiums sponsored by the divisions at their laboratory and have the option of enrolling in a course at a nearby university.

To be eligible for participation in SERS, students must have completed their sophomore year at an

accredited U.S. college or university and be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident alien. A limited number of appointments are also available within six months after graduation for students not enrolled in graduate school. Guidelines suggest an overall grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

While in the program, SERS participants will receive a weekly stipend of \$200 per week, housing, and travel reimbursement for one round trip to the appointment site. 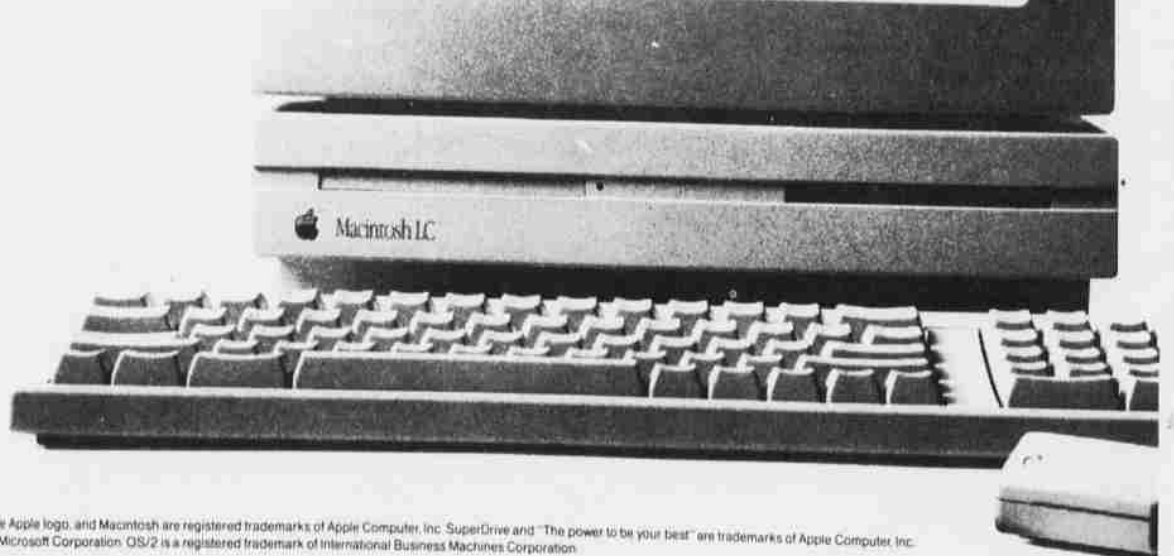
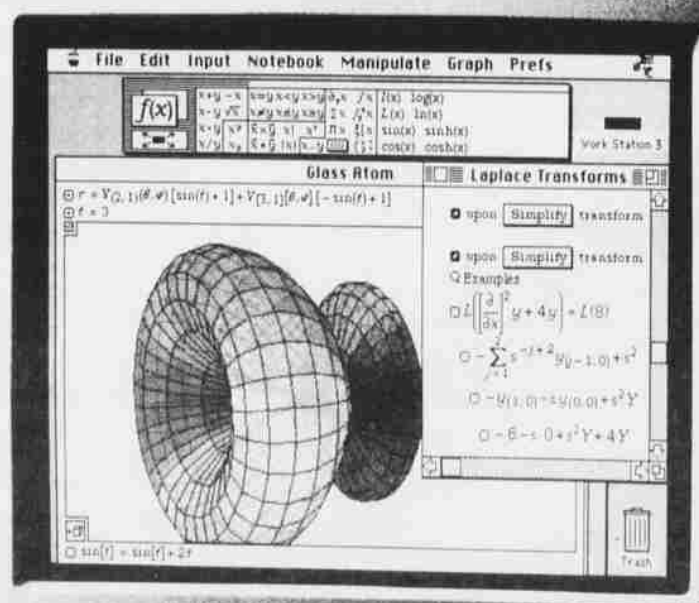
