UNLV's fraternities and sororities kicked off Greek Week Friday, April 12 with a human pyramid in front of the Moyer Student Union. Student services Vice President Robert Ackerman and university President Robert Maxson also participated in the pyramid.

Mark Vieregg, co-chair of Greek Week, said he thought it would be good to get all the Greeks together involved in something for the community.

"At first the general feeling was, 'wait a minute,' the Greeks mainly sponsored sporting events," he said. "Now they're willing to take on a more philanthropic event."

Vieregg said that the Greek

Week competitions become very competitive. The 10 fraternities and five sororities on campus are involved in the week's activities.

"We could be a bigger force on this campus," he said.

Only 2.75 percent of UNLV's student population is involved with the Greek System and Vieregg said he would like to see it become a bigger involvement.

"Some schools have 60 or 70 percent participation," he said.

Greek Week is highlighted with a softball tournament, a picnic for more than 70 children of St. Jude's, a volleyball tournament, and a Greek Showcase talent show. The individual chapters will compete in many individual, team and co-ed events, including billiards, an obstacle course and a co-ed tug-of-war.
