"We're trying to get the word out to people and let them know what's going on," Rodriguez said.

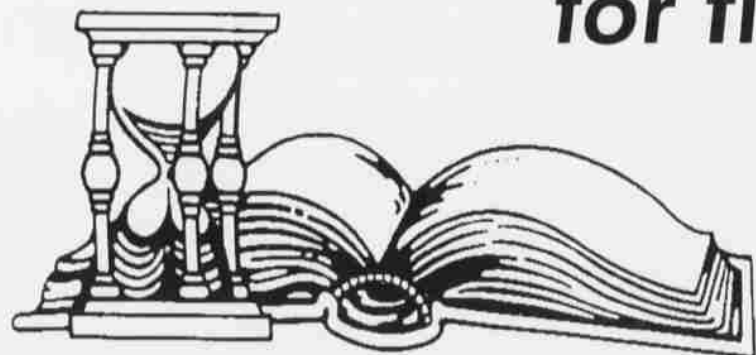
He said there were sign-up sheets for students to get involved with the Peer Health Education Program and BACCHUS (Boosting Alcohol Consciousness Con-

Thanks to the funding support received from Student Government, the library will maintain special extended hours during the spring 1991 final exam period beginning Friday, May 10 through Friday, May 17.

The reserve reading room will be open continuously as a study hall. This is a designated quiet study area. The first floor lobby area will also be available. Students who wish to use the library as a study hall after the full-use hours will be required to move to the reserve reading room.

Special collections and the curriculum materials library will maintain their normal hours during this period. The computer lab and reserve room materials will not be available during study hall-only hours. Following is the schedule of hours for both full library use and study hall use.

Security personnel may require students to show their student identification during study hall hours.

At the main campus entrance lies a new building. This new addition is known as the visitor booth.

According to Carolyn Leggins, parking enforcement supervisor, money used to build the booth and the beginning operations of it came from the Alumni Association.

The total cost of the visitor booth, including the building, the conversion of the lot and the striping of the parking spaces, amounted to \$30,000.

Parking enforcement mans the booth because of the Alumni Association's revolving charge. The revolving charge contains 30,000 credit hours on it, which simply means that participants attending any function involving the Alumni Association and parking can use the booth services for free.

"The revolving charge will be in effect until all the credit hours are down to zero, then the money will be going into the Parking Division funds and not the Alumni Associations," Leggins said.

She said she feels the booth is adequate, "but this type of service

needs to be expanded to help other people who visit other areas of campus."

The visitor lot contains 45 spaces. The lot is not available to students or faculty/staff members who have current parking stickers on their vehicles.

The cost at the booth is 50 cents per hour and 25 cents each additional 30 minutes.

Leggins said she doesn't see any future parking projects down the road such as a parking garage for students who would rather pay for parking than put stickers on their vehicles.

"Students wouldn't want to pay the cost of a parking fee simply because the cost to build the garage is so expensive," Leggins said. "The student parking fee would be astronomical."

For the time being, the parking situation on UNLV's campus will stay as is.

Eldorado senior honored at conference

Kristoffer Belkofer, an Eldorado High School senior, has been honored at the 16th annual High School Science and Humanities Conference at Northwestern for producing the nation's best high school paper in mathematics and applied physics.

He is one of five U.S. high school students who will attend the International Youth Science fortnight in London, England next summer.

Last spring Belkofer and two other Eldorado High School seniors, Brian Cullins and Michael Baker, were chosen to present papers at the Third Annual Nevada Region Junior

Engineering, Science and Humanities Symposium at the University of Nevada Institute of Technology.

Belkofer's paper was one of 66 presented at the national conference.

Belkofer built his own microcomputer system in order to complete his project, which was

titled "How to Minimize Errors in a Three-Body Problem."

Bob Jones, a math and science instructor at Eldorado High School, guided Belkofer through his project. Anthony Ashmore, Ph.D., professor of physics at the University of Nevada, Reno, directed the regional competition. Ashmore will accompany Belkofer to England.
